

DR. HELENA TULEYA-PAYNE'S RETIREMENT FROM MILLERSVILLE UNIVERSITY

We would like to express our heartfelt best wishes to

DR. HELENA TULEYA-PAYNE on

her recent retirement after her 29year service as a faculty member and Graduate Program Coordinator of the School Psychology program. In



Dr. Tuleya-Payne joined Millersville University in 1992. She chaired the psychology department from 2001 to 2013, and she served as Interim Dean for the College of Education and Human Services from 2013 to 2015. She held leadership roles in numerous committees and was a team member for both the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education Accreditation and Program Approval and the Pennsylvania Department of Education Self-Study for School Psychology Program in 2005. The students and faculty who have had the pleasure of working and learning with Dr. Tuleya-Payne describe her as "amazing!," caring, diplomatic, knowledgeable, available and helpful. The countless school psychologists who have gone on to state leadership roles are a testament to her skill and dedication as a graduate trainer.

Through her work as a PPA School Psychology Board member and the Communications Chair for the PPA Pennsylvania Psychologist newsletter, she has been a staunch advocate for

the profession of school psychology.

In 2006, Dr. Tuleya-Payne received the Pennsylvania Psychological Association Award for distinguished contributions to school psychology. She, Drs. Sam Knapp, Jason Pedersen, Tammy Hughes, Susan Edgar-Smith, Shirley Woika and other PPA members have met with PA. Dept. of Education representatives to argue for expanding the career ladder for school psychologists. She participated in preliminary hearings concerning

revisions to Chapter 49, served as a member of work groups organized by the PDE in revising the framework for training of school psychologists, met with officials from PDE to identify strategies for making changes to regulations, and assisted in developing a crosswalk document demonstrating the significant overlap in core competencies for teachers in special education and school psychologists.

Dr. Tuleya-Payne was an invited member of Governor Wolf's School Safety Task Force. As part of this task force, she not only advocated for the importance of school psychologists, counselors and social workers and stressed the larger public health needs and systemic role of school psychologists. She was quoted in a local newspaper article stating the following at a panel presentation to state legislators: "Creating a school that every student feels a part of, as opposed to isolated from, is a vital step in creating a safe, secure learning environment for everyone." An outcome of this task force was to form a Special Council on Gun Violence, of which she was a key member.

Dr. Tuleya-Payne has undoubtedly left an indelible mark on the field of school psychology in Pennsylvania and will be sorely missed within the Millersville University community.

DR. AMELIA LOPEZ'S RETIREMENT FROM MILLERSVILLE UNIVERSITY

our gratitude and warmest wishes to DR. AMELIA LOPEZ on her recent retirement! She is retiring this year after 20 years with the Millersville University School Psychology graduate

program. She has served as both an Assistant Professor and as the School Psychology Graduate Program Coordinator. In addition to these positions, Dr. Lopez has also served an important role in various accreditation processes that are key to the School Psychology Program at Millersville University. Through these roles, she has helped to shape our program, maintain important accreditation status, and prepare many students for roles in the School Psychology field.

Dr. Lopez began her career in psychology shortly after moving to the United States at the age of 17. She received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from DeSales University, and a Master of Education Degree in Counseling Psychology with a Certification in Secondary School Counseling from Temple University. After this, she went on to earn her Ph.D. in School Psychology from Lehigh University, where she was trained by the late Dr. Edward Shapiro, who made many contributions to the field of school psychology.

During her career, she was impacted by disparities, poor educational outcomes and overidentification of disabilities amongst diverse individuals. In these roles, she was able to continue working in the field, especially with children with limited English proficiency, while also working to train upcoming school psychologists.

Students describe her as passionate, knowledgeable, energetic and

determined, and often note her dedication to the field and passion for helping all students. Dr. Lopez indeed has a strong love for the profession, and a passion for raising awareness for diverse learners.

Dr. Lopez's retirement is bittersweet for us at Millersville
University, where she will be sorely missed. We are happy
to see her move on and continue her work in the field, but
we will miss her passion and drive as both a professor and a
faculty member. She has worked tirelessly and made a lasting
impression on the field of school psychology in Pennsylvania

Literacy Coaching Endorsement

The Language and Literacy Education Program of Millersville University is pleased to announce the addition of a Literacy Coaching Endorsement. Housed within the Department of Early, Middle and Exceptional Education, the Language and Literacy program offers a master's in language and literacy education leading to reading specialist certification. Reading specialist students and those with an existing reading specialist certification earned from any university will be able to add the Literacy Coaching Endorsement with the completion of four courses (12 credits). Those with a Literacy Coaching Endorsement have the knowledge and skills to help teachers recognize what they know and can do to assist teachers as they strengthen their abilities, and offer support to teachers as they incorporate literacy in the classroom.

Research on Social Isolation in a Local Rural Area

BRITTANY LEFFLER, Specialization Year MSW student, presented at the March Millersville University Council of Trustees Meeting on research on social isolation in a local rural area. Ms. Leffler and MSW Generalist Year student Rachel Preibisch are research assistants for Dr. Jennifer Frank and Dr. Laura Brierton Granruth from the School of Social Work through the Center for Public Scholarship and Social Change.

From Hobohemia to Housing First: A Critical Reflection of Homelessness in the U.S.

In spring 2021, DR. JENNIFER FRANK created and taught a special topics MSW elective on homelessness in the United States. The course, From Hobohemia to Housing First: A Critical Reflection of Homelessness in the U.S., provided students with a historical overview of homelessness as a social problem in the United States. Students examined the disparate conceptualizations of homelessness over time and the individual, community and policy approaches intended to address it. Students were eager to fully engage with the issue locally and in real time. After hearing from a guest speaker who shared his experience doing outreach with the unsheltered of Lancaster, students embarked on a project to study the best ways to attend to unsheltered homelessness in our community. The class invited the mayor's office and Lanc Co MyHome, the homelessness coalition,

to participate in the project. Students formed three teams to research the local issue, recommendations of national organizations, and effective best practices. Further, students assisted in the development of an IRB protocol that was approved to survey individuals who had prior experience sleeping outdoors and to include their feedback to assess what is needed. Findings were disseminated at Made in Millersville and shared with the Mayor's Office and Lanc Co MyHome on April 26. Several students continued work on the project with Dr. Frank after the semester's end. As a result of this course, national connections have been made with other homelessness scholars as well as the National Center for Excellence in Homeless Services.

SPOTLIGHT

ORLANDO BERMÚDEZ completed all program requirements for the Master of Science in Emergency Management program in May 2021. Orlando is a weather forecaster at the Austin/San Antonio Weather Forecast Office (WFO), located in New Braunfels, Texas. He has been awarded the National and Regional Isaac Cline awards for improving the understanding and dissemination of National Weather Service warning and public-service products for the Spanish-speaking community across the country.

Orlando is part of the National Weather Service (NWS) Multimedia Assistance in Spanish (MAS) team. The translation of information contained within critical products and services, whether in-text products, media interviews or social media posts, helps ensure effective messaging before, during and after life-threatening weather emergencies.

The MAS program utilizes the Virtual Operations Support (VOS) concept to request aid for Spanish television and radio interviews in addition to



virtual social media support in Spanish when NWS Weather Forecast Offices anticipate being overwhelmed due to highimpact weather events. MAS utilizes the expertise of fellow NWS meteorologists and hydrologists across the United States and Puerto Rico who have social media and interview experience and can speak and translate the Spanish language to deliver critical weather information to the

Hispanic community and partners.

In addition to his regular duties and as part of his work for the Field Practicum Experience course (EMGT 693) in the MSEM program, Orlando connected with several conference calls and sent invitations to the MAS team for the virtual conference calls. Throughout this process, he worked with a reporter from the Washington Post to discuss and elaborate on the efforts of NOAA/NWS in communicating weather hazards in Spanish. In addition, he recorded an interview with the Telemundo National Network based in Miami on the 2021 hurricane season and preparedness tips for the community. Lastly, Orlando will be publishing his work in one of the journals of the American Meteorological Society (AMS) on the MAS efforts and all that is being done to improve communication related to hazardous weather with the Spanish community in the United States.
