While we weren't able to do some of the things we have come to expect, such as the reception honoring department awards winners, we were able to participate in the Made in Millersville program fully online and host speakers for university-wide and in-class presentations. Dr. Clarence Maxwell Named as Hamilton Princess & Beach Club's Black History Month Honouree

Dr. Clarence Maxwell is a noted academic who is an assistant professor of History at Millersville University in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, USA, where he teaches on topics concerning Latin American and Caribbean History, the African Diaspora, and the Atlantic World. He taught a course on Latin American history for the Bermuda College and Millersville University. He is a co-director of the Atlantic World Center, which is concerned with managing research, instruction and presentation of 1,000 years of Atlantic World History at Millersville University. He is also co-advisor for the university's new multidisciplinary Atlantic World Studies Major, which offers courses and instruction on Atlantic history and archaeology. Formerly, Dr Maxwell worked for the Bermuda Maritime Museum (now the National Museum of Bermuda) as Registrar and Director of Historical Research. He serves as associate editor of the Bermuda Journal of Archaeology and Maritime History, an annual multidisciplinary peer-reviewed publication of the National Museum of Bermuda.

Dr. Mary Sommar translated (from the original German) the book Wilfried Hartmann, *History of Medieval Canon Law in the early Middle Ages, 300-1200* (Washington DC: Catholic University of America Press, forthcoming).

She also developed a new graduate course "Foundation of the Modern West." The course looks at sources from Aristotle to the European Enlightenment that discuss the structure of society.

MU SPECIAL EVENT: VIRTUAL HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL LECTURE

Millersville University <u>hosted the Virtual Holocaust</u> <u>Memorial Lecture</u> by Dr. Martin Dean, Historical Researcher for the Babyn Yar Holocaust Memorial Center (Kyiv, Ukraine) "**Following the Evidence to Babyn Yar**" on April 8, 2021. The lecture was devoted to the 80th anniversary of Babyn Yar massacre (1941). Babyn Yar is the largest Holocaust site in Ukraine.

Dr. Dean examined the landscape of Babyn Yar on the basis of new research into the location of the infamous massacre. The presentation used ground and aerial photographs together with witness testimony and images from a 3-D model to trace the final steps taken by the Jews on September 29-30, 1941.

The lecture was well received and attended by over 120 scholars, faculty and students. The event was organized by **Dr. Victoria Khiterer**

MCNEIL CENTER UNDERGRADUATE RE-SEARCH WORKSHOP

Two seniors, history minor Ashley Jumbelick and history ma-

jor Michaela Mills, were accepted to participate in the Twelfth Annual Undergraduate Research Workshop at the McNeil Center for Early American Studies of the University of Pennsylvania. Along with undergraduates from around the country, they gave informal presentations on their honors theses in February. After working with graduate mentors and further developing their theses, they made more formal presentations in



April, receiving feedback from other students and faculty. Most years, participants in this workshop go to Philadelphia to present and tour archives and museums. This year the workshop was conducted in remote format. Ashley's thesis, supervised by Dr. Marlene Arnold of the department of Criminology, Sociology, and Anthropology, is Caught in the Crossfire: Early and Trade Relationships Between Cultural Groups in the Area of Lancaster County, 1681-1730. Michaela's thesis, supervised by Dr. Tanya Kevorkian, is Sound, Dance, and Diplomacy: An Analysis of Eighteenth-Century Intercultural Diplomacy Through Performance. Ashley's and Michaela's faculty mentor for the workshop was **Dr. Kevorkian**.
