Meet the Emergency Management Coordinator

What is your name and title?

Dr. Sepi Yalda. Professor of Meteorology, Director, Center for Disaster Research and Education, Coordinator of Emergency Management Programs

How long have you been at MU and in what positions?

I have been at MU since the fall of 1997 as a faculty member in the meteorology program. Since the fall of 2009, I have also served as CDRE director and EM programs coordinator.

Can you tell us about your family? I am married and have a 17 year old son.

What do you enjoy doing outside of work?

I love to spend time with my family and

friends, read, walk and swim.

What is your favorite course to teach?

My favorite course in the meteorology program is Radar Meteorology in the EM programs, the Natural Hazards Primer in the graduate program and the Natural Hazards Risk Assessment and Mitigation for the undergraduate EM program.

What do you like about working with the Online business students?

The online EM students come from a variety of educational backgrounds and many are working professionals. This is a diverse group that brings a lot of relevant background and experiences into each course enhancing the learning experiences for everyone. The online program provides a unique opportunity

for students to learn about the theoretical and practical applications of EM in an effective, flexible and accessible manner.

Do you have any advice for our online students?

Even though the program is online, the faculty in the program are always happy and available to provide help related to courses, advisement, career advice and other opportunities in EM. We strongly encourage all students to reach out with any questions.

Strategies for Successful Online Learning

Set a schedule for completing and reviewing assignments.

Working on three courses at the same time can cause an individual to experience a high level of stress, but this can be avoided if you allocate specific times to work on each class. One example is working on one class between the hours of 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. This schedule allows students to create a type of structure often seen with traditional, in-person classes.

educational psychology.

PK-12 schools nationwide experience an ongoing need for qualified special educators. Students enrolled in Millersville University's PK12 Special Education program will acquire the skills to fulfill and thoroughly address

the needs of students with disabilities in multiple settings.

This program also offers unique educational experi-

ences beyond the classroom including internships with local organizations and extensive and diverse field study opportunities. Graduates receive their Bachelor of Science in Education (B.S.E.) and are eligible for Pennsylvania teaching certification in Special Education, Grades PK-12.

Taking a Leave of Absence

Life is making it difficult to keep up with your online classes. Maybe it is an illness, an upcoming wedding or a big project at work. What should you do?

- Do not just stop attending classes.
 After a semester of taking no classes, your status will be changed to Inactive due to Walkaway. If this happens, you will need to re
- apply when you are ready to return to classes.
- Notify Online Programs that you need to take a Leave of Absence. You can take up to a 1-year LOA.

- Please make sure to note when you will be returning to classes.
- Return the completed form to Online Programs for processing.
