BUAD 162 – Introduction to Managerial Accounting	The department has adapted existing course, BUAD 162 for web/online delivery format. Millersville University defines an online course as one that meets completely online via online courseware system (i.e. Blackboard, eCollege or WebCT). Effective, Fall 2006
COMM 330 – Media and Women's Culture	<p>The department has adapted existing course, COMM 330 for delivery following a blended distance learning format only. A blended course would be one that requires some face-to-face class meetings along with some classes offered via distance education – either via online, videoconferencing or independent study. Effective, Fall 2006</p> <p><i>NOTE: Courses that are offered in fulfillment of the Perspectives General Education requirement ("P" courses) must have a significant oral communication component. The Undergraduate Course and Program Review Committee (UCPRC) has approved COMM 330, which is designated as a "P" course, to be offered only in the blended distance learning format.</i></p>
