The plans for the library building are about completed. The cut on this page is taken from a sketch of the building made by the architect. It will be both handsome and serviceable. The libraries of the literary societies will occupy the wings; the octagonal room in the centre will be used for a reference library and reading room; while the rear of the building will contain the general library of the School.

The plans for the building for the physical sciences and mechanic arts are well under way. The erection of both buildings will begin as soon as the ground opens in the spring.

standing of normal schools is to be measured by their buildings, they will be eclipsed by nearly every jail and almshouse in the State. Of course they should have comfortable and even handsome buildings, but no one should imagine that buildings are sufficient to fit persons for the profession of teaching. A high standard of scholarship and professional skill must be maintained by the normal school that would fill the requirements demanded of it. The faculties must be strong, they must have a high ideal of the qualifications necessary to train the immortal mind of the child, and they must feel the responsibility that rests upon those who train the men and women who train the children. Not how large is the gradua-

ting class, how many students are enrolled, how big are the buildings? should be the questions asked of the normal schools, but how thoroughly do the students know the branches of the course, how well do they understand the laws of mental growth, how skilfully can they teach the child, how capable are they in the management of schools?

Millersville, with its 772 students enrolled in a single session, with its large, commodious and handsome buildings, with almost every modern convenience for the comfort of its teachers and students, might be expected to invite the support of the public on account of these facts; but we greatly prefer to have our school known for the work done in the class-room, for the high standard of scholarship and professional skill demanded of those who complete the course here, and for the prominence of our graduates in every field of intellectual labor, and especially in the profession of teaching.

The New Education.

How little we hear now-a-days of the "New Education!" At first it was savagely attacked; later it was accepted with certain reservations placed upon it; and to-day we can scarcely meet any one who does not believe in it fully. Indeed, the term itself is becoming old, and is to some extent forgotten. The principles, however, remain, and will remain because they are fundamentally right. These principles give rise to *rational methods of teaching*. The principles are not new, but old, and were followed in many places before the term was heard of. The question of the "New Education" is not whether we shall teach number according to the Grube method, reading according to the sentence method, or even whether we shall abolish grammar, teach clay-modeling, or make structural maps in the geography class: it lies below all these. It is, whether we shall teach the child in a rational way, according to rational methods. Here at Millersville Dr. Wickersham and Dr. Brooks, both great teachers, and both with a broad grasp of the fundamental principles of mind-growth, presented the principles of the "New Education" to the classes in pedagogics long before the term started at Quincy to run over the country. Our aim to-day is not to accept or reject a method merely because it is new, or reject or accept it merely because it is old, but to seek for the truest and best, whether new or old. Our inquiry constantly is, what is best for the child? To answer this ques-

tion in the light of a true psychology is to solve the problem of education. In our efforts to answer the question, we are striving to make Millersville *an exponent of rational methods of teaching*.

MANY of the readers of THE JOURNAL have asked us to make it a monthly and charge a subscription rate for it. The subject has been under consideration for some time, but no conclusion has been reached concerning it. In any event, the members of the Alumni will receive THE JOURNAL from the School free. The School is proud of her Alumni and takes great pleasure in reciprocating in a small degree the favors which she has received from them, by sending them from time to time such news of the "Old Normal" as will interest them.

THE National Educational Association will hold its next meeting at Saratoga, N. Y., July 12-15, 1892. Special rates will be given on the various railroads to the meeting. Dr. Lyte, one of the vice-presidents of the Association, has been appointed manager for Pennsylvania. He will take pleasure in giving information concerning the route, etc., to any who think of attending this, the greatest educational meeting of the world.

THE committee in charge of the Dr. Wickersham memorial are meeting with much encouragement from the students of Millersville of 1855-1866. Hon. J. A. M. Passmore is the energetic chairman of the committee, and in conjunction with the other members of the committee, is making the most strenuous efforts to place at the School a fitting memorial of the life and services of the eminent educator and beloved teacher.

THE policy of the Millersville School for several years has been to magnify the professional work of the School. While the work in all departments is thoroughly done, in no place is the improvement more marked than in the pedagogical department. The results obtained in this department fully justify the authorities in their outlay for its support.

THE interesting address on the life and public services of Dr. Wickersham, delivered by Andrew M. Frantz, Esq., before the Lancaster County Teachers' Institute at its last session, was put in type for this issue of THE JOURNAL, but was unavoidably crowded out. It will appear in the February number.

THE next meeting of the Pennsylvania State Teachers' Association will be held at Beaver Falls, on July 5-7, 1892.

THE holiday vacation begins Thursday, December 24, and closes Monday, January 4.

APPLICATIONS for rooms for next summer session should be made early.

THE present session of the School already numbers more students than any previous winter session, except possibly the winter of 1869-'70, and it is probable that the number for that session will be exceeded, as several students will enter school after the holidays.

MILLERSVILLE is not an academy, with a pedagogical attachment, but a real Normal School, devoted to the scholastic and professional preparation of teachers.

LARGE numbers of students have already registered for the summer session, which begins March 28th.

Gymnasium Work.

In Charge of Physical Training for Gentlemen.

We propose, from time to time, through the columns of THE JOURNAL, to present a few articles touching upon exercise and health, and the relations they bear to each other. It would perhaps be well before beginning such a series, to make a few brief remarks in regard to the nature and object of our work in the gymnasium. We will not dwell upon a description of our very attractive building, for that has already been given to the readers of THE JOURNAL. Let it be sufficient to say that it contains all

those appliances that serve to make up a fully equipped gymnasium. The work, though comparatively in its infancy, has already proved itself to be an important part of our educational system, affording the ladies and gentlemen an opportunity for taking regular and systematic exercise, as much needed for physical culture as systematized work for mental improvement. It is not our aim to develop one part of the body at the expense of another, nor the whole body at the expense of the mind; but so to develop each muscle that all may work together as one harmonious whole in performing their proper functions, thereby not only giving the body grace and symmetry, but insuring a strong and healthy action of its various organs. It is becoming more and more evident that students who enter the different professions, and especially teaching, expecting to meet with any marked degree of success, must have sound bodies in order to reap the best results of a well-trained mind. The body and mind are co-workers, and their training should go hand in hand, but so arranged that one may act as a relaxation from the other. In preparing our class work, we have endeavored to make the exercises progressive, beginning with the most simple and initiatory, and ending with the more arduous and severe; the former being such as will not overtask the powers of the weakest, and the latter such as will increase those of the more practised. The work, thus far, in both the model and normal departments, has shown excellent results, and the interest manifested by both sexes warrants the anticipation of even greater improvement in the future. The work is now well organized, and we feel confident that henceforth our students will go out not only enjoying better health but better qualified for their profession as teachers.

An Alumni Anniversary.

The Philadelphia Branch of the Millersville State Normal School Dines.

From the Philadelphia Ledger, Nov. 14.

The Philadelphia branch of the Alumni of the Millersville State Normal School held its eighth annual reunion and dinner last evening at the Colonnade Hotel. A business meeting preceded the dinner, at which these officers were elected: President, J. A. M. Passmore; Vice President, Dr. Israel Heilman; Treasurer, Geo. W. Flounders; Secretary, Watson Cornell; Executive Committee, Mary L. Dunn, P. J. Umstead, Mary Whitson, Jesse Michener and A. G. C. Smith.

There were about 58 members present at the dinner. The toasts and speakers were: "The Missing Links," J. Howard Jacobs, of Reading; "Out of the Silence," Dr. Edward Brooks; "Anything that Comes Uppermost," Congressman Marriott Brosius; "The Mutations of Time," Henry Houck, Deputy Superintendent of Public Instruction, and short speeches were made by Dr. E. O. Lyte, Elizabeth Lloyd, Jos. N. Beistle, William T. Seal, Hon. D. Newlin Fell, Charles H. Harding and others.

The Millersville State Normal School was established in 1855, two years before the Normal School law was passed. Its first principal was Dr. J. P. Wickersham, who subsequently became State Superintendent of Public Instruction. Under his administration the school obtained a wide reputation. His successor, Dr. Edward Brooks, the present Superintendent of Public Schools in Philadelphia, carried the School to a high degree of perfection. At the present time the School is under the charge of Dr. E. O. Lyte, and is sustaining the high reputation for efficiency in the preparation of teachers which it has always borne.

The School enrolled last session 772 students, the sexes being evenly divided, a large majority of whom were fitting themselves to become teachers. Since 1885 nearly \$70,000 have been expended for improvements, and the property is now estimated to be worth \$300,000. Plans for the erection of a new library building and a building for the sciences and mechanical arts are under way, and the work will be commenced in the spring.

TH SOCIETIES.

Normal Literary Society.

In my visits this fall to the different county institutes, I met a large number of teachers who were formerly students at the Millersville State Normal School. Among the first questions they asked was: "How is the Normal Society?" It frequently happened that I did not have time to reply, except in a very brief sentence. I will therefore take this opportunity to answer the question more in detail.

Not wishing to rely on my own judgment in the matter, I have made careful inquiries both of members of the society and others, and find the universal opinion to be favorable. The regular meetings are well attended, and the exercises from beginning to end are of a very high order. A large number of the present members have become quite proficient in debate, eloquent in orations, and logical in their essays. A glance at the following questions which were debated this term will show the character of the debates:

Resolved, (1). That the interests of the United States are better subserved by protection than by free trade. (2.) That Civil Service Reform will be a failure. (3.) That Prohibition should be made a moral issue exclusively, &c.

Orations of great merit were delivered on: "Patrick Henry," by Miss Emeline Passmore; "Men of Truth," by Mr. J. B. Wolfgang; "Past and Present Influence of Women," by Mr. H. P. Miller.

The want of space prevents us mentioning the very excellent essays and other exercises of rare interest.

A large number of new members were added to the great army of Normalites now in active service, either here at school or out in the great arena of life. Among the honorary members elected this term was President Harrison, who was notified of his election and in a courteous and dignified manner accepted the honor. This is the second living ruler of a nation who is a member of the society, the other being Queen Victoria, of England.

Before the next number of THE JOURNAL reaches the reader, the society will have celebrated its thirty-fifth anniversary. It gives me pleasure to announce that the society has secured the services of Gen. D. H. Hastings as honorary orator, and Miss Alice May Stevens as reciter, both of Philadelphia. The other officers and representatives have not yet been selected.

Page Literary Society.

The Page Society under the new leadership of last year's juniors—this year's seniors—is doing most creditable work.

No class of members has ever gone into the work of the winter session with greater zeal or fuller determination to preserve the record of the past. Indeed it is not at variance with the truth to say that their ambition seems to be to go beyond the past. The presidents, Mr. W. B. Dill, Mr. J. H. Kreider and Mr. F. O. He has been unsparing in his efforts to furnish good music for the society and to present it in as great variety as possible. Duets, trios, quartets, gentlemen's choruses and mixed choruses, together with soprano, bass and baritone solos have constituted the vocal feature. Then there have been clarinet, piano and violin solos, and combinations of several instruments as violin and clarinet, piano, organ, etc., by way of instrumental music. The society has provided Mr. Bryant with a handsome baton which he wields with a degree of gracious satisfaction over his club of twenty-five members.

The debating feature of each Friday evening's programme has been made very attractive by the animated interest that most of the members have taken in it. The society in the near future will debate the resolution that has been adopted as the first of the Harvard-Yale joint debates, which takes place in January:

Resolved, "That the young man who casts his first vote in '92, should cast it for the Republican party."

The members seem fired with an eager enthusiasm to discuss this question, promoted perhaps by the fact that many of them will cast their first vote next November. Among the resolutions debated during the present session are the following:

Resolved, "That the Free Education Bill of England should meet the approbation of the English people."

Resolved, "That Foreign Immigration should be prohibited."

Resolved, "That the Government should prohibit all further attempts to explore the Arctic regions."

Resolved, "That the salaries of all civil officers should cease on their retirement from office."

Among those who have taken active part in both regular and general debate are Misses Pardoe, Wertz, Sprague, Bucher, Coles, Kready, Scheetz, and Messrs. Eby, Hain, Eshbach, Dill, Cessna, Haag.

There have been some interesting referred questions answered by the members of the society, such as "Is the present tariff a benefit to the working man?" "Do farmers have tariff burdens that manufacturers do not?" "To what extent has reciprocity been a benefit to the United States?" "What is our chance for commercial supremacy?"

We have referred briefly to some of the exercises of the weekly meetings of the Page Society during the present session.

There is also a preparatory branch of the organization, known as the Page Junior Society. This consists of gentlemen alone. Its meetings are held every Saturday evening and are open to members only. The exercises are similar to those of the so-called "Senior Society." The training that the younger and more inexperienced students receive here is of invaluable service in fitting them for the public platform work of the Senior Society.

Our 1,500 circular letters have been sent among those who were at Millersville when Dr. Wickersham was principal, asking for their choice of four proposals. A very large majority of those who replied gave their preference to a free scholarship at the State Normal School at Millersville, to be known as "The Wickersham Free Scholarship."

It will probably require a cash deposit of \$5,000 to secure this, and it now rests with you to help decide whether we can raise sufficient funds to endow such a scholarship. As a nucleus, the sum of \$1,000 has been guaranteed by 20 former students. The committee now appeal to you for such generous contributions as you feel your circumstances will warrant. To Dr. Wickersham's former Pupils.

Dear Friends—I am delighted to think that the committee who have in charge the preparing of a suitable memorial to commemorate the memory of our first Principal, have decided upon a "Free Scholarship." This, it seems to me, would be more in keeping with Dr. Wickersham's own ideas than a monument; and we can all feel by contributing to this, that we are conferring upon ourselves a twofold pleasure; first, that of keeping his memory forever green in the annals of the school; second, in aiding in educating a worthy person, whose education might otherwise have been neglected.

There should be no trouble in raising \$5,000. I am told there are over 3,000 of Dr. Wickersham's pupils now living; there certainly is not one of them who could not contribute at least \$1.00; and an average of \$2.00 would secure the amount, together with paying all necessary expenses.

Sunday at the Normal.

From the Lancaster New Era, September 29th.

Sunday is a very pleasant day for the students at the Millersville Normal School, there being several services to give interest to the day, and sufficient time besides for reading, walking or resting. In the morning immediately after the seven o'clock breakfast it is the regular thing for both Christian Associations to hold a short prayer service to which all are invited who feel inclined to go. At nine o'clock the regular Bible classes meet at which all students are required to be present. These classes are very interesting; Dr. Lyte, Dr. Byerly, Dr. Hull, Dr. Bitner, Prof. Albert and Miss Lyle are the teachers.

After this generally there are services at five churches in the village to which the students are invited, and many of them take advantage of the privilege. On Sunday there was an extra service in the School which was very delightful and very well attended. This was a gospel song service of one hour, conducted by the Young Men's and Young Women's Association. Mr. Wolfgang, president of the Young Men's Christian Association, presided, and Mr. W. D. Apple, president of the Association of F. and M. College, made the address. It was earnest, interesting and inspiring. The music was stirring.

In the evening the regular School Prayer Meeting is held at 7 o'clock. This generally lasts for an hour and a-half and is in charge of Drs. Hull and Byerly, assisted by the students. Mr. B. M. Breneman led the meeting on Sunday evening. Most of the students were present and all enjoyed it. In the rest of the time during the day walking on the lawns in the village, reading, resting or quiet talk all up the time and with a half hour earlier usual for retiring, the day, peaceful, and happy, seems all too short.

MILLERSVILLE.

THE MILLERSVILLE STATE NORMAL SCHOOL is the pioneer of Normal Schools in Pennsylvania. Established in 1855, two years before the Normal School law was passed, this School determined the general nature of the Normal School system of the State, and became the model for many successful institutions throughout the country. It is a source of pride to its thousands of friends that it maintains its rank among the great training schools of the United States. The support given to its younger graduates by its older students, the regard in which its diploma is held in other States as well as on Pennsylvania, and the almost invariable success of the members of its Alumni in every field of intellectual labor, are recommendations of the School that thinking young men and women who are seeking an education, are not slow to appreciate.

In an article on Normal Schools, Dr. Wickersham writes: "Soon after the passage of the Normal School law of 1857, preparation was begun at Millersville to bring the school up to its requirements, and on the second day of December, 1859, amid great rejoicing, it became the first State Normal School in Pennsylvania, and the model after which all the others were patterned."—*History of Education in Pennsylvania*.

SCHOLASTIC DEPARTMENTS.

The financial standing of the School enables the management to place the various departments in charge of *experienced instructors*, with special aptitude for their work and in full sympathy with the most approved methods of teaching. The advantages of pursuing a course of study under specialists are obvious. Every department is fully supplied with apparatus, and is well equipped in every respect.

PROFESSIONAL DEPARTMENT.—Theory.

The crowning work of this Institution is its *professional department*. Every effort is put forth to make our students skilled teachers. In the Intermediate and Junior years, the students are organized into "Methods" classes, to study the mind, the principles and methods of teaching, and the best ways of managing schools. In the Senior year psychology and pedagogics are among the most prominent studies.

PROFESSIONAL DEPARTMENT.—Practice.

The *Model School* is one of the leading schools of the kind in the United States. It is in charge of skilled teachers of wide experience, who have made the science and art of teaching a specialty. Here the principles of education are daily put into actual practice in the best and most approved methods of teaching. The members of the Senior class teach in the Model School daily under close and constant supervision. The Junior classes visit the Model School regularly and observe the work done by the teachers in charge and the Senior class.

KINDERGARTEN.

A Kindergarten is established in connection with the Model School. It is under the direction of a skilled kindergartner, who also has charge of a training class in this department. Our students derive great benefit from this new feature of Normal School work.

THE BUILDINGS.

The Normal School buildings are the *largest and most convenient buildings* of the kind in the State. The chapel will seat 1,200 persons; the recitation rooms are large and commodious; and the students' rooms are neatly furnished and well heated and lighted.

According to the State Report for 1891, the value of the property belonging to the Millersville State

Normal School is nearly three hundred thousand dollars—in exact figures, \$292,371.58.

THE GROUNDS.

The grounds surrounding the Normal School are *large, beautiful, and attractive*, affording abundant shade and good opportunities for recreation and exercise. They have been in charge of a landscape gardener for some time, and for beauty are equalled by few school or college grounds in the country. The base ball ground is excelled only by the grounds of professional clubs.

A lady visitor thus describes the campus to a friend: "Fountains playing, flowers blooming, birds singing, trees waving their leafy branches to the breeze, a velvety carpet of nature's richest green covering the whole lawn—what more beautiful picture can be found than the Millersville Normal School? I was charmed, and could not help envying the groups of busy students who are spending the happiest years of their lives in the shadow of that great school."—THE NORMAL JOURNAL (May, 1888).

LATE IMPROVEMENTS.

Among the *late additions and improvements* made in the buildings and surroundings are—

Enlarging and supplying the Model School with every appliance that is needed in that department: furniture, apparatus, supplementary reading, material for manual training, kindergarten supplies, etc.
