MURLEY MEAL PLAN SUPPORT ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP Assists Students Facing Food Insecurity

mong the students at Millersville University, the issue of food insecurity is affecting a growing segment of the student population. For students who face financial challenges that limit dependable access to healthy food, this challenging situation impedes the ability to succeed in their academic journey. As this issue has become more common for students, a generous Millersville alumna learned of the situation and was inspired to make a difference by establishing a scholarship endowment focused on this specific area of need.

For alumna Karen Ashkar Murley '63,

her student experience on the Millersville campus 60 years ago was much different than that of current students today. "Sixty years ago, we had a very small day population of commuters – very, very limited. It was a boarding situation. And everybody went to the dining room three times a day, and nobody was without winter coats. If somebody had a need, it wasn't apparent. Now, of course, that is not the case at all. It's just such a very different world – and being able to see that, and being told point blank that there are students who can't afford to go to school and eat or drive a car – it's just a very sad situation," states Murley.

Through learning about the issue of food insecurity among students, Murley was motivated to assist students who were struggling with basic needs by establishing a scholarship endowment in 2022 that was named the **Murley Meal Plan Support Endowed Scholarship**. "This is exclusively for the day students who come two or three days a week, so they don't need to worry about nourishment. That's one of the costs that they don't have to think about," she explains. In reflecting on the goal for the scholarship to address food insecurity among students, Murley notes, "They need to have the basics covered, and eating is one of them.... Addressing the basics is not glamorous, but it's necessary."

With the creation of the scholarship endowment that assures that students will receive support for basic needs, Murley's vision and generosity are leading the way by establishing a unique type of scholarship that provides support for the necessities of student life. "This is not something that others have considered.... I think we sometimes overlook what is so essential for students' lives and being practical," explains Murley.

As a dedicated donor and member of Millersville University's Fiat Lux Society, which honors donors whose gifts and pledges total more than \$1 million, Murley has generously supported the University through

an extensive collection of scholarships and gifts over the years. At the recent award presentation ceremony of the Susan C. and Gerald C. Eckert Service and Philanthropy Endowment Award on April 9, 2024, a special event honored Karen Ashkar Murley '63 for her tremendous contribution to Millersville University through exemplary service and philanthropy.

In light of the many ways in which her support has benefitted Millersville University students, the **Murley Meal Plan Support Endowed Scholarship** addresses a distinct and essential need – to alleviate hunger among students. "The basics. Addressing a real personal need," says Murley. Through her upbringing, Murley was raised with a focus on the importance of extending kindness and compassion to those in need. This emphasis on altruism has become a guiding principle for Murley, as she actively seeks opportunities to make a lasting impact in the lives of students and provide them with the resources to succeed academically and achieve their dreams. "As my upbringing was – be as kind and generous as you can be," Murley recalls.

According to Murley, a favorite inspirational quote that epitomizes her intention to demonstrate generosity is by Leo Rosten, an author and humorist, who said, "The purpose of life is not to be happy, but to matter, to be productive, to be useful – to have it make some difference you have lived at all." As Murley expresses her aspiration for making a valuable impact in the lives of students, she states, "Whatever I can be of help to make this, what I consider, essential higher education experience successful is my goal.... I hope to be able to continue. As much time as we have on this Earth is to do the best you can." \diamond

Alumnus Proudly Marks Decades of Generosity to Benefit Millersville University Students

hrough the Millersville University giving societies that highlight generous donor support, the 'Ville Visionary Society was recently established as the newest giving society in 2023. Formerly the Old Main Society, the 'Ville Visionary Society recognizes the generosity of individuals who have supported Millersville University with annual giving of \$1,000 or more during the most recent fiscal year. A visionary is defined by their imaginative forward thinking, and the 'Ville Visionary Society reflects the innovative vision of Millersville University supporters that leads the way for a successful shared future that will nurture students in their journeys of achieving excellence.

In celebrating the valuable impact of 'Ville Visionary Society members and the inspiration for their generosity, the story of 'Ville Visionary Society member Steven A. DiGuiseppe '82 highlights his continuous dedication to the Millersville University community and his decades of commitment to making a meaningful difference in the lives of students in the past, present and future.

Steven A. DiGuiseppe '82

Steve DiGuiseppe is a proud Millersville University alumnus with a bachelor's degree in elementary education, with an area of interest in mathematics, whose longtime involvement at Millersville extended into his professional endeavors, as he served in a variety of administrative roles at Millersville University for decades throughout his career.

Through his tremendous contributions to the Millersville University community, DiGuiseppe's professional leadership made an indelible impact during his career at Millersville University, beginning in 1991 and through the years until his retirement in 2020. In June 2022, DiGuiseppe was granted emeritus status with the honorary title of Assistant Vice President of Advancement Emeritus with a resolution by

the Millersville University Council of Trustees, marking the culmination of his outstanding career of service to Millersville University.

As a generous donor to Millersville University, DiGuiseppe has established the **Steven A. DiGuiseppe '82 Scholarship Endowment**, and he is a member of the University's Hobbs-Wickersham Society, the 1855 Society, the Golden Swan Society, and the Black and Gold Club in addition to membership in the 'Ville Visionary Society. DiGuiseppe has an exceptional dedication to his alma mater at Millersville, and he continues to be involved at Millersville University as an active alumni member and donor, with a passion for supporting students that inspires and motivates the Millersville University community.

'Ville Visionary Society Donor Highlights

"In 2020, the year of my retirement from MU, I started giving \$1,000 or more to the University, primarily to establish a new scholarship in my name for perpetuity.... I have been a donor to MU for over 40 years. I have my undergraduate degree from Millersville and was employed by MU for almost 30 years – so my love and dedication to my alma mater is extraordinarily strong.

"'Every dollar truly counts' has often been my motto. Seeing and working with students firsthand was truly an inspiration to me to give to support various initiatives, be they academic, activities, housing, athletics, etc. I put myself through college, which is another reason why I want to help others who may need financial assistance. I worked part-time on campus and off campus for four years, as well as all breaks/vacations, to support my years at MU."

Reflections on His Millersville University Student Experience

"I had a wonderful experience while attending Millersville; I was active in several undergraduate activities, including serving as editor-in-chief of the University yearbook, officer of Student Senate, member of Phi Sigma Pi National Honor Fraternity and the Society for Collegiate Journalists. I was also a resident assistant in the former Burrowes Hall (all-male dorm). These experiences helped me develop many professional and people skills that helped me in the business world, community relations and personal relationships/encounters."

Rewarding Aspect of Giving Back to Millersville University

"Throughout the year, I visit campus and/or interact with students at events, where I hear and see how scholarships and awards truly make a difference in so many lives. To hear students say, 'this scholarship has helped me in ways to support all the costs of an education,' which plays over in my mind repeatedly, and which motivates me to give, even be it in small ways of donating to multiple initiatives each year."

Inspiration for Giving

"A few years ago, the development staff developed the theme of 'Give To What You Love,' which I believe embodies the aspiration of why I continually give to MU. I know the dollars raised do make an impact on students and their future at MU and beyond!"

Vision and Aspiration for Creating a Lasting Impact

"I know that gifts of any size do matter and create a 'ripple effect' to students today and into tomorrow. I will continue to give and ask others to support higher education, which will truly make an impact on one's future.... 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Welcome **DARRYL L. LANDIS, M.D. '85** New Millersville University Foundation Board President

Darryl L. Landis, M.D. '85

At Millersville University, the beneficial impact of scholarship support for students is transformative, and the process of investing and managing endowed gifts for the University is the mission of the Millersville University Foundation (MUF), which is a separate entity from Millersville University. The MUF is a 501(c)3 tax-exempt public foundation incorporated to receive gifts which benefit Millersville University and to administer those funds in perpetuity in a manner prescribed by the donors. An independent board of directors manages the Foundation's activities.

Millersville University Foundation Board President: Darryl L. Landis, M.D. '85

Through the most recent election of the Foundation, **Darryl L. Landis, M.D. '85** was appointed as the president of the board of directors, with a two-year term that began in January 2024. Landis has been an active member of the MUF Board of Directors, with 10 years of board member service that began in 2014.

The MUF Board of Directors features a board structure with committees that include the Executive Committee; Audit Committee; Committee on Directors; Investment Committee and the Spending Committee. This year, the MUF Board appointed six new members who are elected for a three-year term. "These new members are highly qualified and are already making extremely positive contributions to our board," notes Landis.

As a proud alumnus of Millersville University, Landis earned a bachelor's degree in biochemistry in 1985. Landis obtained a medical degree from the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania and a Master of Business Administration from the Fuqua School of Business at Duke University.

Landis explains, "I joined the Foundation Board in 2014 at the request of Development Office staff, although my interest in supporting my alma mater began several years prior to that with various small, unrestricted gifts to Millersville University. My student experience at Millersville University was transformative for me and, in retrospect, was a very high-value investment of my time and money, opening the door for me to launch a career in medicine and private equity."

In his professional career, Landis is managing partner of Mustard Seed Venture Partners LLC, a boutique advisory and investment team committed to transforming healthcare delivery through clinical innovation, personalization of care and precision health.

Investment Goals and Success: Millersville University Foundation Board

With the goals that Landis aspires to achieve as board president, he notes, "My goals for the Foundation are as simple as **A**, **B**, **C**...." The simple goals of A, B and C represent the following: **A** – Asset Enhancement; **B** – Best Practice Execution and **C** – Community Engagement. "I hope to deepen the sense of connection and community <u>among</u> members of the Foundation board and University, <u>internally between</u> the board and the University and local community, as well as <u>externally between</u> the University and our global community, to whom, I believe, the Foundation and University have a responsibility to live up to our EPPIIC values in both policy and practice," Landis says.

"The primary role of the Foundation Board is fiduciary in nature: to prudently manage endowed funds so that the needs of our students and the University are met both today and into the future, in perpetuity.... Secondarily, Foundation Board members assist the Development Office with raising additional funds for the Foundation, both with personal gifts and with identifying and developing relationships with donors," says Landis.

According to Landis, "At the end of the quarter ending 12/31/2023, the Foundation assets totaled \$62,826,644, representing an increase in assets of over 13% year over year." As a measure of investment performance success, NACUBO (National Association of College and University Business Officers) compares the investment performance of the Millersville University Foundation with other highereducation institutions and the performance of the MUF Board has been impressive. "Relative to the most recent NACUBO

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peer performance data as of June 30, 2022, our investment performance... ranks us (Millersville University Foundation) among the top quartile of our peers," Landis states.

Scholarship Endowment Creation: A Lasting Investment in Student Success

Through the investment success of the MUF Board, the endowed gifts to the University grow and increase in value over time, providing additional funding to support scholarships and funds to benefit Millersville University students. As Landis explains, "That's really the goal – to increase the amount of money every year that we can distribute on behalf of spending for students.... Because the purpose is to deliver this dollar support in perpetuity – with no end in sight."

Landis is proud to have a scholarship endowment established at Millersville University. He explains, "My wife, Suhaila, and I established the *Landis Family International Scholarship* in 2014 to enable international students to attend Millersville University.... We are pleased to note that our scholarship has provided partial tuition support for nine international students from seven different countries to attend Millersville University."

Extending educational opportunities to international students through the *Landis Family International Scholarship* makes a meaningful impact in the lives of international student scholarship recipients and for all Millersville University students, according to Landis. "My personal and professional development has been greatly impacted by international relationships and experiences, and my wife, Suhaila, and I believe that supporting international students to live and study here on the Millersville campus is a highly efficient strategy to enrich the campus experience for thousands of American students as well as to propagate the EPPIIC values of Millersville University around the world," says Landis.

Through his upbringing that emphasized the importance of cultural appreciation, Landis reflects proudly on his family history that encouraged the values that have shaped his life in positive ways.

"In 1712, Jacob Landis, the great-grandson of Hans Landis from Herzl, Switzerland, immigrated to a small log cabin in Lancaster County – this log cabin is now on display at the Lancaster Mennonite Historical Society.... While growing up on a small dairy farm in Lebanon County, I have many memories of the 'open door, open home' policy my parents practiced towards visitors and strangers in our community and church. I cannot begin to name the many dozens, probably hundreds, of individuals who joined our dinner table, some of whom spent weeks, months and, in some cases, years living with us. Many of these visitors were culturally and ethnically different to my family, and this exposure created a sense of curiosity and appreciation for the diversity that is part of our global human family," he recalls. For Landis, his student experience at Millersville was tremendously valuable in contributing to his professional success and motivates his generous support for Millersville University students. "Millersville was a very, very important part of my life experience and got me set on my career, and I had just such a great time at Millersville," Landis says. "Some people may think it takes a lot of money to set up an endowment scholarship, and, actually, Millersville has a very reasonable threshold of \$25,000 to establish an endowment, so I think that's very achievable for many people.... You can give \$1,000 a year for 25 years, and then that's it; or you can put the \$25,000 in up front, and 25 years from now, that \$25,000 is probably going to be more like \$75,000 or \$100,000 in terms of its size, and you're going to see forever the income from that gift going to students.

"The most rewarding aspect of giving back to Millersville University is to see its direct impact on students, and with an endowed fund, to see that impact grow over time, in perpetuity," Landis says. "That's very powerful – it's a gift that keeps on giving, both ways. As a donor, you get the benefit of seeing that happen after you initially set it up. Students in perpetuity – forever – are going to see a benefit from that." ◆

CHARTERING PRESIDENT OF LAMBDA GAMMA CHAPTER OF DELTA SIGMA THETA SORORITY, INC., AT MILLERSVILLE UNIVERSITY

As a young girl growing up in Mobile, Alabama, **Sandra Brown '76** was inspired by women in her community who were members of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. This valuable experience during her youth ultimately guided Brown to make history as a transformative leader and founding member of the Lambda Gamma chapter, which was established 50 years ago on February 23, 1974, at Millersville State College.

"I became engaged with women of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority with involvement at my church youth group for young girls. The group focus was developing leadership, organizational skills, lifting young girls' self-esteem, being a good citizen and providing public service within the community. I became aware of the national organization from the women who led the group's activities that belong to the local Delta chapter where I grew up. The women were so inspiring, caring and nurturing. Over the years, one particular Delta woman became such an inspiration in my life. She took a special interest in my educational endeavors," Brown recalls. "She was one of the Deltas that I remained in contact with over the years."

Through her involvement with the members of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., at a young age in the early 1960s, Brown established a lifelong connection with a member of the Mobile, Alabama, chapter who later went on to become the 19th national president of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., from 1988 until 1992. This inspirational mentor for Brown was the late **Dr. Yvonne Kennedy**, who was an influential leader in Mobile, Alabama, serving as president of Bishop State Community College from 1981 until 2007, and as an elected official in the Alabama House of Representatives, serving in the legislature from 1979 until she passed away in 2012.

The valuable mentorship from Dr. Kennedy as a leader in Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., guided Brown on a path that ultimately led to the establishment of the Lambda Gamma chapter at Millersville in 1974. "Graduating from high school, heading to college, I was reminded to seek out Delta Sigma Theta Sorority at the college that I would be attending.... I came to the Millersville campus, (and) I asked about Deltas on

campus, only to find that the national organization of Deltas was not on campus at the time," reflects Brown. "I relayed the info, then she said, 'Okay, then. If there's no chapter, then you have the challenge of creating one.' She planted the seed, I took the challenge. So the journey began to establish a chapter on the Millersville campus. She guided me through the necessary steps that were needed and established one."

Brown's vision to establish a chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., at Millersville connected her with key figures on campus and in the community, including the late Ms. Hazel I. Jackson, who was the first African American professor at Millersville University. "She was my very first contact because she was one of the African American females on campus, and, of course, I went to her," says Brown.

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Local members of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., connected with Brown through the process of creating the Lambda Gamma chapter, including the late **Juanita Wright**, a counselor at J.P. McCaskey High School in Lancaster, and the late **Dr. Julia Hines (Muldrow) Harris '70M** from York, who was an alumna of Cheyney University.

After gathering a group of at least seven Millersville students to form the chapter, the size of the initial group included 10 student members who became the original charter members to create the first chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., at Millersville. "Delta would be the first for the administration endeavor of this kind to navigate this process of becoming the first African American sorority of its kind on Millersville University campus," states Brown. The Lambda Gamma chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., was also the first national African American sorority at Millersville and the first Divine Nine Greek organization included in the National Pan-Hellenic Council, Inc. (NPHC) to become established on campus at Millersville.

Through the group's successful efforts, the process resulted in the creation of the Lambda Gamma chapter, and initiation was coordinated with Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. "Initiation was conducted on February 23, 1974, that established Lambda Gamma as a chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.," says Brown. As Brown recollects, the regional director in 1974 who guided the charter members through initiation with Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., was the late **Dr. Brin D. Hawkins**.

Guiding Brown through this journey was her mentor, Dr. Kennedy, who nurtured the creation of the Millersville chapter and served as a source of inspiration. "She was definitely walking me through the whole process," says Brown. Dr. Kennedy's exemplary leadership motivated Brown to model the values and guidance that she received over the years from Kennedy in her own leadership experience. "My involvement as Lambda Gamma charted president of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority was charged with implementing the sorority's principles and values of the sorority – sisterhood, scholarship and public service. To focus on the fundamental principles of our organization, establishing a nurturing environment among chapter members that is supportive."

Throughout the 50 years since her time as a student at Millersville, Brown has been actively involved with the Lambda Gamma chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. "After I graduated, I became advisor to the group, and I have been, in some fashion, over the last 50 years, been involved with students at Millersville - the Deltas at Millersville," says Brown. Her decades of service and involvement with the chapter have made a profoundly positive impact on Brown's life. "The realization of it all - all came forth when we celebrated 50 years.... First of all, I was in amazement that we had sustained for 50 years on the Millersville campus from the date of this inception, and that many, many young women - exceptional women - have come through that process.... The bond that we have established at Millersville exceeds my wildest imagination - that after graduation, it reaches across the globe."

Brown's professional career following graduation from Millersville was in the field of education as an elementary

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The Lambda Gamma chapter 50-year celebration event in February 2024. school teacher in the School District of Lancaster, where she taught for 35 years until her retirement.

Reflecting on her life as a Delta, she has treasured Lady Fortitude as an inspirational guiding post as she serves the organization. As referenced by Brown, "Fortitude" is a sculpture commissioned by Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., in 1979, located on the campus of Howard University in Washington, D.C., created by sculptor James King. "It's a guiding principle for me as an individual. That's my goal – always pull your sisters forward in whatever way you can."

Through her decades of transformative leadership and involvement with the Lambda Gamma chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., Brown has made history and established a lasting legacy at Millersville that continues through the student members of the chapter today. "The legacy ... for students on campus is academic excellence, leadership development, public service and sisterhood. That's the legacy. And if they follow those principles, it's stood the test of time up until today, and I think it will stand the test of time in the future."

The timeless value of mentorship emanates throughout the lives of those who are impacted in tremendous ways. Through

"We were persistent, determined and, of course, I had a mentor who knew the struggle. She laid the path, so I am so grateful for her." \diamond

Professional Journey Home to His Alma Mater

Kyle's transformative student experience was incredibly positive and led him on a pathway of professional success. In his career journey, after graduating from Millersville University with a bachelor's degree in business administration with a marketing concentration, Kyle worked at LNP Media Group as an inside sales representative, then became a realtor and showing agent with the Craig Hartranft Team at Berkshire Hathaway Homesale Realty in Lancaster, and joined the Millersville University Advancement Division staff in July 2023 as a major gift officer.

"Once I started working at Millersville and saw the work that had gone into supporting current students, I thought it would be great to be a part of that. I loved my time at Millersville, and I think that by supporting students, you give them a shot to have a similar experience. Making education even more affordable allows students to take advantage of other opportunities while not worrying as much about finances," Kyle states.

Scholarship Endowment Creation Through Estate Giving

As an alumnus and an employee of Millersville University, Kyle has an affinity for his alma mater that motivated him to explore gift planning opportunities that led him to establish a scholarship through an estate gift with the **Douglas Kyle '17 Business Scholarship**.

"An estate gift allowed me to make a significant contribution to the University and allowed me to create an endowed scholarship. Now that the fund is created, I am able to make gifts to the endowment principal if I wish to have it reach the \$25,000 minimum early, or I can make gifts that allow the scholarship to be awarded until the estate gift would be received by Millersville. It is likely that in what I hope is a long life ahead of me, I should hopefully have more than enough in assets to fulfill the commitment," says Kyle.

With gift planning through an estate gift, donors have the opportunity to include Millersville University in their will by making a bequest gift that will make a difference for students in the future. "A planned gift is a great way to set up a large scholarship without the large payments. Most young alumni do not have the means to pay \$25,000 in a lump sum or even to make the traditional \$5,000 payments for five years. With an estate gift, the appropriate accounts are created and waiting until the estate gift is received. Since these accounts are established, this makes it very easy to make a pledge or a one-time gift to the scholarship or the endowment principal itself," explains Kyle.

Reflections on 'Ville Student Experience

While a student at Millersville University, Kyle was actively involved with the campus community and appreciated the caring approach of the faculty in fostering his success. "I made countless friends and have probably had some of the best mentors from the staff I worked for at MU. It allowed me to highlight my strengths by working different campus jobs as a student. I also appreciated the individual focus by the professors for students," he notes.

With his aspiration to support future generations of Millersville students, Kyle shares three reasons highlighting the importance of alumni support. Kyle says, "I think for three reasons:

1. You loved your experience here so much that you want to pay it forward so other students can feel the same way; 2. You identified areas for growth to benefit current and future students; and 3. You have heard of exciting initiatives at the University that you hope for others to experience."

Through his contributions to Millersville University, Kyle values this opportunity to give back and expand educational access to a greater number of students. "I want education to be even more affordable so students do not need to worry about incurring as much debt for education... I see how students today face challenges with the cost of education. By giving back, I feel like I am helping to make education more accessible, even if it is to one student."
