section all will remain an integral part of the *Millersville Review*.

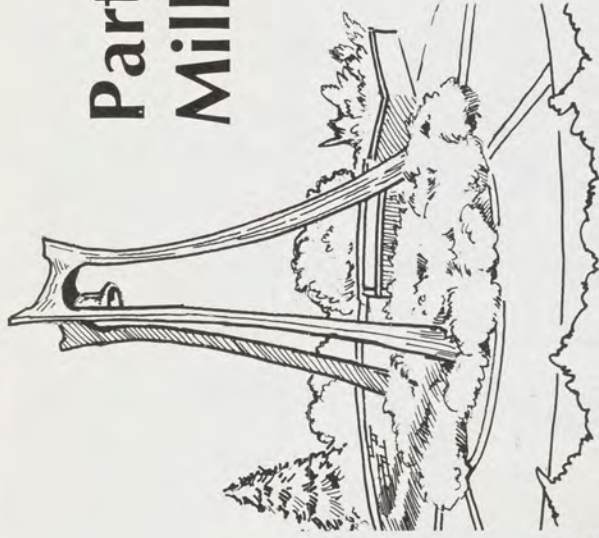

Annual Report, 1983-84

Our First Year As A University

The 1983-84 academic year was an historically important one for Millersville University inasmuch as it was our first year with University status. That development set an exciting tone for the year as we continually uncovered further implications of our new status. The adjustment from a state college under the Pennsylvania Department of Education to a university within the State System of Higher Education had few visible differences for our student body and casual observers. However, for the administrative staff, the new status carried many additional challenges as we assumed more direct responsibility for the management of the University. We now are making more decisions about the expenditure of funds, guided by commonly accepted good business practices, which allows for a great deal more flexibility and even some special economies.

We exercised the freedom to decide on our own staffing needs and created a new administrative

position that I believe is vital to the future of this University. In order to meet the changing educational needs of the citizenry, it is imperative that institutions of higher education engage in strategic planning. We took an important step in this initiative this spring with the addition of Mrs. Linda Suskie as assistant to the president for planning. Mrs. Suskie brings to the University skills not only in planning but also in institutional research and will provide the expertise within the administration to help guide us in preparing our academic programs and our administrative needs to meet changing demands.

Mr. Robert Gillis also was added to the president's staff this year as director of affirmative action and human relations to assist in the University-wide task of providing equal educational and employment opportunities, a continuing commitment of Millersville University.

Within the pages of this report you will find reference to efforts throughout the University to apply modern technology to administrative functions as well as to many academic programs. This has been a major emphasis during the past year. The primary task in this area was selecting a new main frame computer to expand the capabilities of both administrative and academic computer users. The decision was made to purchase two IBM main frame computers and dedicate one to academic use and the other to administrative use. These computers just recently have been installed and we anticipate that the increased computer power will expedite many campus operations and service our academic programs more effectively.

The update of campus technology is not limited to computers. Many academic departments, especially in the School of Science and Mathematics, are acquiring state-of-the-art equipment for their instructional programs. Several administrative offices are now using modern word processing software. New high-speed copying equipment has been a major addition to our capability to provide services to academic departments.

Throughout this report you will read about growth in the developmental sense in Millersville's programs. We now have a total of 772 employees and last fall enrolled 6,700 students. That enrollment figure, which represented an increase of 300 students over the previous year, was a surprise to many of us who had anticipated perhaps only 100 more students. Our guess is that last year was a special case and there will be little or no enrollment increase this year. In light of the demographic information available to us, we are not planning to increase noticeably the size of the student body for at least a decade. However, growth and development can come in other ways.

We decided last year to create an independent business administration department by separating it from the economics department. This step reflects not only the high level of interest of students in business fields but also the institution's interest in integrating more fully into the academic programs the resources that can be provided by community businesses.

This report includes information about the participation of many of Millersville's faculty in academic research and in professional and

community organizations. It is obvious that we have a faculty committed to enriching their academic disciplines and to serving their community.

A significant change representing major growth on the part of the University was the creation of an Annual Fund program within the University administered by the office of University Advancement. The Annual Fund report reveals that the first year of the new program surpassed all fundraising efforts in previous years. Alumni gifts this year were greater than ever before as were faculty and staff gifts. I am enormously pleased by this willingness to support the institution and to contribute to Millersville's effort to achieve excellence in all its programs.

Another major change during 1983-84 was the transfer of responsibility for the alumni publication from the Alumni Association to the University Advancement office. This publication is the result of redesigning and renaming the *Alumni Review*. In the future, the *Millersville Review* will provide a broad range of information on the University and will be distributed to alumni, faculty, staff, donors, members of the business community and friends of the University. Fine tuning of the new format is expected but the new *Millersville Review* will be as attractive and enjoyable as possible and will provide readers with a greater understanding of what is happening at Millersville University. May I invite you to read the entire Annual Report to become well informed about developments throughout the University. I am sure you will agree that the achievements within the University—its offices, schools and academic departments and by individual faculty members—are worthy of our pride and our respect.

Finances

The 1983-84 year was both financially comfortable and challenging.

A new formula was used to distribute the total state allocation to the 14 universities in the State System of Higher Education, and Millersville received one of the largest percentages of increases in state funding in recent history. This adjustment of the percentage of the share was a one-time occurrence and an indication that Millersville had been receiving slightly less than its fair share in prior years. A formula is used to ensure that funding for the 14 universities is done as objectively as possible. It is based on a number of factors including enrollment, types and expense of academic programs, size of physical plant and other factors that influence the cost of running a university.

Because of the favorable situation last year, Millersville was able to purchase badly needed computer equipment for a number of offices and academic programs and

a new main frame computer to serve the entire University. Our ability to pay for the computer in full saved thousands of dollars in finance charges.

Although administrators concerned with University finances had fewer worries last year about keeping Millersville's expenditures within the budget, they did face a most challenging year. The new university status brought with it local autonomy for purchasing. Our day-to-day operation involves thousands of purchases—everything from sophisticated scientific equipment to breakfast cereal. Until last year, many purchases were made through the Department of General Services in Harrisburg with approvals from appropriate state offices. Millersville now has total responsibility for handling its financial affairs: hiring staff, entering contracts, determining cash flow, dealing directly with vendors, making purchases and paying bills. The dramatic increase in workload and in the nature and level of responsibility made 1983-84 both

fascinating and challenging.

Many new budgeting procedures were implemented last year and others are planned. A new accounting system will be launched next year to allow each department to keep abreast of its financial status on a daily basis. As Millersville picks up the reins of financial control, it will put into place a philosophy of shared responsibility for expenditures.

Each administrative unit headed by a vice president will have a budget which will be distributed to deans and administrative directors. In turn, they will develop budgets in cooperation with each department and each office. Recommendations on expenditures of funds will be made by the departments. This ensures that persons who are most directly affected by budget decisions will have input into them and will share in the task of making the hard decisions when available funds do not cover all needs.

Aid to Students

The majority of Millersville undergraduates continue to receive financial aid to assist with the costs of attending college. Last year 4,340 MU students received \$9,525,313 in aid in the form of grants, loans and jobs. This is an increase of approximately \$376,000 over 1982-83 when 4,105 students were awarded \$9,149,270 in aid.

However, since the 1981-82 academic year, there has been a decline in financial aid. That is due, in part, to the lower eligibility ceilings placed on family income. Expectations for 1984-85 are that funds available for financial aid at Millersville will change only slightly from last year's level.

Academics

The 1983-84 academic year opened with a surprise—an unexpected increase in student enrollment, which provided some last minute problems in scheduling for students and overcrowded conditions in some classes. The increase was the result of a larger-than-usual retention rate among upperclass students. Also, Millersville is enrolling an increasing number of part-time students, reflecting a national trend of increased growth in the number of nontraditional students in higher education. An attached chart gives a summary of enrollment data for last year compared with previous years. The expectation is that 1984 enrollment will be no higher and perhaps a little lower than 1983.

Last year ushered in three new undergraduate programs: A bachelor of fine arts degree in the art

department, a liberal arts associate degree program in applied history, and an interdisciplinary concentration in journalism.

After several years of limited growth in faculty size, the 1983-84 year saw the addition of 15 new faculty members in areas with critical shortages such as computer science, nursing and business administration. There are now a total of 313.75 complement positions filled by approximately 350 persons.

During the year eight faculty members, some of them in service to the University for many years, announced their retirements. After an extensive national search, Dr. Albert Hoffman, who had been serving as acting dean of the School of Science and Mathematics, was selected as dean, and the other two schools continued to be served ably by Dean James Maurey in the

School of Education and Dean William Pearman in the School of Humanities and Social Sciences.

Enrollment increased 16 percent last year in the Army ROTC program, which commissioned a total of 16 officers during the academic year.

A task force was appointed to study the programs and policies of the Center for Academic Development and to make recommendations about the future structure and administration of the program. While those recommendations are under study during the coming year, Ms. Rachael Dread, who is assistant dean of the Graduate School, will serve as acting director of the Center for Academic Development. This program continues to provide services to disadvantaged students as well as to all Millersville students.

In Ganser Library, renovations in the lobby area have improved the circulation desk facility. Other developments included a new computer capability for transmitting book orders, the publication of a revised edition of the workbook in library

skills, and the acquisition of the 5,000 volume private library donated by John and Louise Huzzard.

The past year marked the graduation of the first students who completed the University Scholars program, which receives superior students as freshmen and provides challenging courses and opportunities for research during their careers at Millersville. Nine entering students received \$1,000 renewable scholarships last Fall from the MEDAL Fund contributed by our faculty and staff and nine more will be awarded in 1984. This program, along with others, including the Alumni Association's Search for Excellence scholarship program, is helping to bring to Millersville a growing number of academically talented young people. Millersville's entering class last year had SAT scores of 974 (total of verbal and math), which compares to a national average of 893.

Developments in the academic departments and faculty achievements during the past year have been gathered by each of the three schools. Many fine accomplishments could not be recounted in a single brief report. Nor can what is printed here reflect accurately the primary task conducted so well by so many of our faculty—the task of teaching!

School of Education

Perhaps the most important activity in the School of Education during the 1983-84 academic year was planning for the future. This effort began amid a deluge of recommendations from state and national sources for reform in the American public school system. Throughout the year the various departments in the School of Education, several special committees, task forces and action groups met to develop specific goals and objectives for departments and the school and to

draw up plans for future action. The professional studies review committee has undertaken a review of all competency statements for all teacher education certification programs. Based on the findings, together with data from research on Millersville's teacher education graduates, this committee will recommend changes in the existing competency statements. In addition, the committee is developing a five-year action plan for improving teacher education programs. A special task force was organized during 1983-84 to initiate a review of the present departmental structure throughout the School of Education.

Several departments have initiated an update of the technological content of their programs and have added both hardware and software computer capability appropriate to their instructional or research needs at the graduate and undergraduate levels. A proposal was developed to write during the next year a specific plan for educating both teacher education students and current professional school personnel in the use of computer technology as an instructional tool.

The library science wing in Ganzer Library was vacated last year to accommodate an expansion of staff and technical service operations for the University Computer Center. The library science department will be relocated in a renovated area in the lower level of Ganzer Library. Completing the first year of a two-year action plan to update the program in library science, the faculty redesigned the

course content in instructional technology including computer literacy and microcomputer skills.

This academic year marked the 50th anniversary of the industrial arts program at Millersville. During the year the department completed a major revision of its undergraduate curriculum and industrial arts education to reflect changing technology in several areas. Also, the faculty has begun preparing for the development of a nonteacher undergraduate degree program in industrial technology. This technology major should be available to students by 1985.

The faculty in the psychology department worked on revising both its undergraduate curriculum and the graduate studies program. The undergraduate committee also has developed a departmental honors program.

The School received several grants through the office of Educational Development directed by Dr. Robert Labriola. The largest grant for \$380,589 will fund the migrant education program

Education Faculty Serve Their Profession

School of Education faculty provided a variety of professional services to the community, schools, and state and national agencies and associations during 1983-84. These services included special in-service programs and workshops, consulting activities and academic program evaluation activities. For example, Dr. Byron Showers in counselor education presented a

workshop on "Wellness Counseling" to the Pennsylvania School Counselors Association. Dr. Joyce Smedley, counselor education, conducted inservice programs based on her research on teacher morale to classroom teachers and secondary school principals from York County. Dr. Jack Pflum conducted six workshops and served as a consultant for several area school districts in long-range planning and school improvement.

The National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education invited Mr. Joseph Rousseau, elementary education, to be trained as an evaluation team member responsible for mathematics education. Dr. Margaret Tassia, library science, was selected by the Pennsylvania Department of Education to participate in the development of procedures to assess school libraries in Pennsylvania and to review, update and revise standards for the certification of school librarians. Dr. William McIlwaine, elementary education, served as a consultant to the Pennsylvania Department of Education to evaluate "Initiatives in Science and Mathematics Education," a plan to upgrade teaching in the Commonwealth schools. Dr. Edward Ottinger was appointed by the Governor to the Pennsylvania Advisory Board for Special Education. Also, Dr. Ottinger is a member of the State Task Force on Suspension and Expulsion of Handicapped Children, Pennsylvania Right to Education Office. In addition, Mr. Linus J. Czap was an education consultant and program evaluator for the Pennsylvania Department of Education and the Bureau of Corrections at Youth Development Centers and Youth Forestry Camps across the Commonwealth.

Several faculty served as members of advisory and governing boards for various agencies, associations and academic institutions. Serving his alma mater, Dr. James White, educational foundations, is a member of the board of trustees for Susquehanna University. Dr. Byron Showers serves as a member

of the board of trustees for the Thaddeus Stevens State School of Technology. Dr. William McIlwaine is a member of the State Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators and of the Lancaster County Board of Assistance.

In the psychology department, Dr. Betty Finney is on the board of directors for Hospice of Lancaster County and the board of the Lancaster County Council of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse. Dr. Patricia Kranz was elected president of the Lancaster County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse, and Dr. Susan Luek-Keen is on the board of directors of Planned Parenthood. Dr. Rita Smith was elected to a second three-year term on the board of directors of the John F. Kennedy Community Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center, elected for a one-year term as Eastern Regional representative and member of the board of directors of the Association of Black Psychologists, member of the board of directors of the Delaware Valley Association of Black Psychologists, and treasurer, Board of Infant Mental Health Association of the Delaware Valley.

Having served the American Red Cross for many years, Mrs. Ione Dorwart, health and physical education, is a board member of the Lancaster County chapter and serves as chairperson of the Water Safety Committee. Mr. Keith Lauderbach was appointed a member of the executive board of the Industrial Arts Association of Pennsylvania.

School of Education faculty provided professional services in many other ways. For example, Dr. Margaret Tassia serves on the Advisory Board and chairs the professional standards committee for the Pennsylvania School Library Association. Locally, Dr. Ruth Cox, special education, is a member of the executive board and the board of directors and serves on the rehabilitation committee of Goodwill Industries.

School of Education faculty received awards, grants and special recognition from various sources. Of

particular note is an honor bestowed on Dr. Perry Gemmill as the Outstanding Young Industrial Arts Educator. This honor recognizes scholarly contributions to industrial arts teacher education and is co-sponsored by the Dr. G. Harold Silvius Memorial Foundation and the National Association of Industrial and Technical Teacher Educators.

Dr. Philip Wynn received the Laureate Citation of Epsilon Pi Tau, International Honorary for Industrial Arts Education. Dr. Jack Cassidy, reading, was awarded a citation of merit by the Diamond State Reading Association, Delaware and also was listed in *Who's Who in the East* and the *Directory of Distinguished Americans*. Ms. Katherine Green, psychology, was chosen as one of the Outstanding Young Women in America for 1984. Mrs. Julia Bowers was selected to serve on the scoring committee for the World Archery Championships and was presented the Masters Coach License in Archery by the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs.

During the year, at least 15 articles written by School of Education faculty were published in professional journals. Two faculty are working on books and many other articles are in preparation. In addition, several papers were presented by faculty at meetings of professional organizations.

School of Humanities and Social Sciences

Looking back at the 1983-84 year, one can observe how well it represented a continuation of positive development for the School of Humanities and Social Sciences. The undergraduate enrollment in the school totaled 1,817 during the spring semester, representing approximately 38 percent of the undergraduate students with declared majors. Compared with

the previous year, enrollment in humanities increased approximately five percent and in the social sciences approximately 10 percent.

The school continued to provide leadership for the University's efforts in the area of international education. Three faculty, Ms. Marlene Arnold, Dr. Harold Drake and Dr. Stuart Foreman, participated in a workshop in Egypt in January, sponsored by the Pennsylvania Council for International Education.

One of the most significant developments during the year was the decision to separate the business administration and economics department into two individual departments. This decision followed a year of study and was implemented this semester. The change will give new and stronger identity to the business major and is the first step in developing stronger community ties with local businesses.

The art department contributed to the cultural awareness of the campus and community through a series of exhibitions in its three major galleries—Sykes, Ganser and Swift. Seventeen exhibits of professional art plus nine student shows were held during the academic year. The department awarded its first Bachelor of Fine Arts degrees to three students at spring commencement. The Young-Artists-In-Residence program continued this year with four aspiring artists, all with master's degrees, spending a year on the staff. The internationally known Mexican potter Juan Quezada spent a two-month residency in the department and conducted numerous demonstrations, workshops and presentations.

Art faculty showed their works in 64 different shows, of which 31 were at the local level, 13 at the regional level and 20 at the national level. Included were five one-person shows.

The business administration and economics department hosted the University and local business communities for the Annual Christie Lectureship. The Nobel Prize winning economist Lawrence Klein,

from The Wharton School, was the lecturer.

The English department, together with the foreign language department, began plans for the implementation of a comparative literature concentration. The department also continued to scrutinize the University writing requirement and the basic composition course. During University Celebration week, the English department offered a symposium on Newman's *The Idea of a University*.

The foreign language department initiated plans for an area of concentration in international business in cooperation with the economics and business administration department. The department began planning for a "satellite link" to the various cultures whose languages are taught in the department. Preliminary steps are under way to teach Asiatic and Arabic languages via nontraditional instruction methods. West Germany contributed \$8,500 to the department to support the German Summer School.

The University-wide Committee on Gerontological Studies reviewed the associate degree curriculum in gerontology and conducted a needs assessment survey on adding an M.S. degree in gerontology. More than 100 responses to the survey were received from area agencies and practitioners in aging with a favorable response rate of approximately 80 percent. A program proposal for the graduate program is now being drafted.

The history department hosted the Philadelphia Area Conference of

Modern European Historians in October, 1983. The Third Annual Holocaust Conference brought several hundred participants to campus in April, 1984. History Day attracted junior and senior high school students from a wide geographic area. The department joined with the biology department to co-sponsor a conference on "Recent Perspectives on Darwin." Professor Theresa McBride, a specialist on the history of European women workers in the 19th and 20th centuries, visited the department as a scholar-in-residence.

The music department earned national recognition from the National Commission on Excellence in Education for its cadet teaching program. This program also was acclaimed during the accreditation visit by the National Association of Schools of Music. The department was privileged to host several eminent musicians and educators who visited the campus. Visiting performers included: William D. Revelli, dean of American Band Conductors; Bernard Goldberg, principal flutist of the Pittsburgh Symphony; John Mohler, clarinet virtuoso from the University of Michigan; Louis Stout, former member of the Chicago Symphony and now horn teacher at the University of Michigan; internationally noted violinist Francis Fortier; and prominent composer Carl Della Puruti.

Over the course of the academic year, social work majors spent 11,500 field-placement hours in community agencies and approximately 2,000 more hours in community volunteer work. Gerontology students spent 450 hours in field placement with area agencies that deal with the aged.

The number of communications majors is now more than 150. To meet new demands associated with this growth, the speech/drama department has been acquiring new technical equipment, planning for new facilities and reviewing ways to improve the quality of its program offerings. The depart-

ment's theatrical offerings during 1983-84 included: *The Emperor's New Clothes*, *Angel Street* and three one-act plays.

Publishing Frequent Faculty Activity

Several School of Humanities and Social Sciences faculty published books during the 1983-84 academic year. Roland Baumann, history, served as editor for *Guide to the Harmony Society Records, 1786-1951, at the Pennsylvania State Archives*. Linda L. Clark, history, wrote *Social Darwinism in France*, published by the University of Alabama press. Two books were co-authored by William A. Pearman. They were: *Cleft Lip and/or Palate: Behavioral Effects from Infancy to Adulthood*, and *Three Mile Island: Annotations of a Disaster*. Simone Vincens wrote *Les Indomptés*, published in Montreal, Canada.

Articles by School of Humanities and Social Sciences faculty appeared in at least 18 different scholarly journals over the year. Chapters or articles in books were published by eight faculty. The English department was represented in poetry anthologies by Charles Patton and Mary P.A. Sheaffer.

Reviews of books and other scholarly and pedagogical materials were written by 11 school faculty for 19 different journals. The journal *Pennsylvania History* is housed at Millersville with Francis J. Bremer as editor and Ronald Benson as assistant editor.

Dr. William A. Pearman was the recipient of the first Distinguished Pennsylvania Sociologist Award established by the Pennsylvania Sociological Society. Roland M. Baumann received the Arline Custer Award in Archival Publications for an article he published on Samuel Hazard in the *Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography*. The award was presented by the Mid-Atlantic Regional Archives Conference. Thomas C. Tirado's forthcoming book on Alfonso Lopez

Pararejo has been nominated for a national literary prize in Columbia, South America. Mary P.A. Sheaffer continued to amass awards for her poetry, receiving five national awards including two from the American Poetry Association.

All members of the music department faculty presented instrumental or vocal recitals. They performed before church, civic and citizen groups on numerous occasions. The department hosted a 90th birthday concert in honor of composer Chester Wittell. Several faculty performed in that concert as well as in the Brahms Festival held on campus and in the University Celebration Week Concert.

Throughout the school, more than 30 faculty presented more than 50 papers at prestigious international, national, regional, state and local professional conferences and meetings. Another indication of the professional stature of Millersville's school of humanities and social sciences faculty is the countless number of invitations they receive to act as panelists, workshop leaders, discussants, session chairpersons or organizers at meetings of professional organizations.

School of Science and Mathematics

The past academic year was a productive one for the School of Science and Mathematics. Faculty and students began the 1983-84 year in a completely renovated, air-conditioned, and redecorated science facility. The newly renovated Roddy Science Center represents a tremendous improvement despite the fact that most departments are in need of additional space.

The number of majors in science and mathematics programs increased again last year, the fifth straight year of growth. In 1979-80, Millersville students in scientific majors constituted 18.65 percent of the student body. For 1983-84, that

figure stood at 25.75 percent.

A number of important equipment purchases were made last year. The biology department purchased \$7,500 worth of microcomputers, an \$8,000 physiograph for the respiratory therapy program with a matching \$8,000 unit provided by St. Joseph Hospital, a self-contained hood to remove toxic xylene fumes from the histology laboratory, and \$6,000 worth of audiovisual equipment for teaching purposes. The chemistry department purchased a microcomputer, equipment for a newly renovated biochemistry laboratory and a \$16,000 ultraviolet-visible spectrophotometer.

The mathematics and computer science department purchased monitors for computer science classrooms, equipment to establish a micro lab in Wickersham Hall and ten microcomputers for a total investment of almost \$50,000. In addition, 50 microcomputers have been purchased from general University funds and placed in the library for use by the computer science program.

The physics department added 12 oscilloscopes for a total of \$18,600 and also bought computer equipment, musical acoustics equipment and supplies for a digital electronics lab. This new scientific and computer equipment will greatly enhance the quality of the programs throughout the School.

In October, 1983, the School of Science and Mathematics was very much involved in the University Status Celebration. The school hosted a well-attended conference for school teachers on "Microcomputers in Education." The program included hands-on experience with a number of microcomputers in different settings.

The interest and expertise in computers among staff members was evident in the number of faculty from the school who participated in the decisions made last year regarding the purchase of a new mainframe computer system for the University.

Among several important developments last year was the creation of the position of allied health and preprofessional coordinator, who will serve as adviser to the allied health fields and as chairperson of the health professions advisory committee. This individual will serve Millersville students who plan

to enter medical or professional schools and will assist them in the admissions process. Another duty will be to develop new cooperative programs with other institutions. During 1984-85, Dr. Antone Fontes, biology, will fill this position on a part-time basis.

A student advisory committee to the Dean of the School of Science and Mathematics was created comprising 12 students, two from each department. The student committee met every two weeks to discuss problems of concern to students and faculty, to seek solutions and to initiate innovative projects for the school.

Discussions began last year concerning a cooperative engineering program in digital engineering with the graduate school at the University of Delaware. If implemented, students could earn both a B.S. degree in physics at Millersville and a masters degree in electrical engineering at Delaware in five years.

An enjoyable program implemented last year for earth sciences majors specializing in meteorology was the broadcasting of weather reports. In the fall semester, students prepared reports which were taped and made available

through a "Dial-A-Forecast" phone number. In the spring semester, a five-minute television weather report, broadcast over local cable television, was prepared daily, complete with maps, charts and other visuals.

Dr. Yin Soong of the earth sciences department developed a computer software program for processing remotely-sensed multispectral image data for use in a course he teaches at Millersville. The novel approach to image interpretation attracted the attention of the staff of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory at California Institute of Technology. During the past year, representatives of the institute visited Millersville to discuss the program with Dr. Soong.

An Institutional Research Review Board was created last year, chaired by Dr. Larry Reinking of the biology department, to ensure that the University complies with existing guidelines on the care and use of laboratory animals in research and that research involving human subjects is conducted in accordance with the Code of Federal Regulations dealing with the protection of human subjects. This committee arranged for the registration of the University's animal care facilities, which are now approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The committee worked closely with the Dean of Science and the University administration in ensuring that animal subjects were properly handled during a trauma care course for doctors and surgeons offered in the spring by St. Joseph Hospital of Lancaster using Millersville's laboratory facilities.

Science/Math Faculty Contribute in Many Ways

Faculty members in the school have made significant contributions to the quality of life in the community. Contributions have been many and varied, ranging from talks by faculty members dealing with the biological effects of radiation and the consequences and

causes of earthquakes to cooperative programs designed to improve technical skills of emergency room physicians.

Last year members of the biology department published 12 papers in scientific literature and presented 10 papers at professional meetings. Biology faculty also presented nine professional seminars and served as reviewers for professional journals and for grant applications submitted to the National Science Foundation. Dr. Dobbins received a \$150 publication grant from the Pennsylvania Academy of Sciences and a \$9,000 NSF grant to study xylem and anomalous secondary growth. Dr. Radinovsky received a \$9,000 NSF grant to study burrowing barnacles and Dr. Reinking received a \$14,000 grant from the American Heart Association to study blood volume control. Biology faculty also served as consultants to a variety of educational and professional organizations.

Faculty members in the chemistry department have written three textbooks which are now at press and several papers. Dr. Robert Wismer reviewed two books for MacMillan Publishing Company and Dr. Gerald Weiss serves as the alternate counselor of the Southeastern Pennsylvania local section of the American Chemical Society. Dr. Richard Sasin served as a consultant for the Central Pennsylvania Translation Service to translate chemical studies from German and French to English.

Faculty members in the department of earth sciences published two papers and two more are in press. Several faculty presented papers at professional conferences and one book review was published. Earth sciences faculty gave many talks to local groups. Dr. Charles Scharnberger spoke on a number of topics, including "Lancaster Earthquakes," "Origin and Evolution of the Earth" and "Geology as a Career." Dr. Russell DeSouza made several presentations to local school classes on meteorology and instrumentation,

while Dr. Paul Nichols spoke to public schools on earthquakes and presented a similar talk at the annual meeting of the American Society of Metals in York.

Dr. William Jordan was appointed by the National Research Council to the U.S. National Committee on the History of Geology. He also serves as chairperson of the History of Geology division of the Centennial Committee of the Geological Society of America. Dr. Scharnberger serves as president of the Lancaster Branch of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Faculty members in the department of mathematics and computer science made 11 presentations to community groups. Mr. Charles Van Gorden worked with the English department and the curriculum director of the Conestoga Valley School District to computerize literacy testing for the district.

Faculty members in the department of nursing made nine presentations to community groups on subjects ranging from "Communicating with Cardiac Patients" to "How Does Your Child Grow?" Mrs. Joan Godfrey served as a member of the Governor's Task Force for Nursing Education Certification, on the Pennsylvania Nurses Association Commission on Nursing Education and as first vice president of the Lancaster District Pennsylvania Nurses Association.

In the physics department, Dr. William Price presented a talk titled "The Birth of a Star Novacon" and also helped select candidates for the Governor's School for the Sciences. Dr. Price also serves as secretary-treasurer of the board of directors at the North Museum.

Dr. Patrick Cooney received \$5,500 from the Department of Energy for a summer stipend at the Argonne National Laboratory. Dr. John Dooley was awarded a General Electric development grant of \$6,500. He and Dr. Cooney are working with a group of students to measure the calorimetric power of fluorescent tubes.

The Campus

Most visible among campus construction projects during 1983-84 was the addition of a new water system. During the fall semester, trenches were opened across campus to lay water lines connecting all campus buildings to a 1.1 million-gallon tank being built next to the Stayer Research and Learning Center. The \$1.2 million

tank is expected to end inadequate water pressure problems in parts of the campus, a situation which had created fire safety concerns. The tank is expected to be ready for use by the end of 1984.

Completed during the past school year were \$438,000 in renovation projects to meet handicapped care standards. These renovations included installation of several elevators and numerous ramps as well as modifications to a number of campus restroom facilities.

Work got under way in the spring converting several older buildings from steam heat to electric heat. This conversion finally completes a project started more than a decade ago.

Other improvement projects during the year included: installation of a sprinkler system in Biemesderfer Executive Center; the completion of renovations and air conditioning in

Roddy Science Center, which began the year before; renovation of the Ganser Library lobby; installation of a chain link fence around Biemesderfer Stadium and repainting of the stadium; new classroom and office facilities in the basement of McComsey Hall; renovations in Bassler Hall, which added new office and instructional space; a total redesigning of York House; and a new air conditioning system in Ganser Library. A house next to Schuylkill House on Cottage Street was purchased and renovated for offices. The deteriorating old Schuylkill House was torn down, and the newly acquired property inherited the name.

The front of the University Store was redesigned and attractive dis-

play windows added on both the ground and the second floor levels.

Numerous other routine maintenance and repair projects throughout the campus contribute to Millersville's exceptionally attractive appearance. Work continues on an almost daily basis on keeping the grounds, flower beds and trees well maintained. A perennial problem—that of a crumbling lake wall—from time to time detracts from the lovely campus lake. The walls have been repaired repeatedly and it has become obvious that new and more permanent techniques must be identified. Some new ways of solving the problem have been studied and the lake wall reconstruction will be addressed during the next year.

plan calls for opening a retail sweet shop and redesigning the serving areas to reduce long lines. Also planned for the new school year is a computerized meal card identification and access system, which will expedite the admission of students to the dining halls.

To replace "Doc" McLaughlin, who retired as director of health services, the University hired Dr. James E. Heffern, who began his new responsibilities in January. The infirmary staff has made a commitment not only to providing care to ill or injured students but also to patient education and preventive medical services.

A deliberate effort was made during the past year to provide programming through the University Union Board's minority awareness committee that would meet the needs of minority students on campus and provide cultural growth for other students. Among last year's events was an appearance by activist-comedian Dick Gregory. The Cultural Affairs Series provided several outstanding musical, opera and theatrical programs to students and a concert by the rock group Yes attracted a capacity crowd to Pucillo Gymnasium.

The placement office continues to have considerable success in assisting seniors and new graduates with job searches. Last year 86 percent of Millersville's liberal arts majors found professional employment and 88 percent of teacher education majors were hired as teachers or other professionals. The office predicts that

Student Life and Services

A major component of the educational experience for undergraduate students occurs in interactions and activities outside the classroom. The Millersville University administration is dedicated to providing an atmosphere in which the quality of life on campus can reach its fullest potential. A wide range of services designed to promote the emotional and physical well-being of students are maintained at a high level. For example, last year the counseling center offered programs to enable students to prepare for typical potential problems rather than deal with them in a crisis setting. The developmental approach to dealing with personal problems also was seen in other programming, such as an alcohol awareness effort, a wellness workshop and informational programs on such practical topics as "Everything you always wanted to know about renting."

The University police have offered to students programs on crime prevention and also on safety related topics such as rape prevention and self-defense. A special

safety program was held during fire prevention week.

In the fall semester, 1983, residence halls were filled to capacity and another 400 students were housed in nearby Brookwood, an all-student apartment complex which has been dramatically improved in safety, appearance and management in recent years. Offering dorm housing assignments by academic interests has been expanded greatly during this past year. In addition to foreign language groupings, students may now select to live with fellow majors in economics, mathematics, computer science and physics. By the time the residence halls opened in the fall of 1983, a smoke detector had been installed in every room and, upon arrival, all students were given information on the functioning of the detectors.

A committee of students and staff worked during the past academic year to plan improvements in the physical arrangements of Lyle and Gordinier dining halls and to introduce some interesting new features. For example, the

1983-84 graduates will be equally successful. The cooperative education program at MU set a record with 119 internship and work-study placements last year compared with 93 during 1982-83.

During 1983-84, work continued on rewriting the student code of conduct, which will spell out a new judicial system in the area of student discipline. Final review of the document is expected in early fall and will be implemented before the end of the year.

Intercollegiate Athletics

It was another successful year for Millersville University athletics in 1983-84. Of the 19 intercollegiate varsity sports, six qualified for post-season competition. Several squads showed dramatic improvement from previous seasons and were challengers for top honors in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC).

The women's basketball team, coached by Debra Schlegel, won its first-ever PSAC championship in convincing fashion. Sparked by All-America forward Amy Gipprich and all-conference center Shelly Bowie, the Marauders won 10 consecutive games late in the season—including three in a row in the PSAC tournament—to advance to their first NCAA Division II playoff berth. Overall, MU finished 19-7.

The men's cagers were equally

impressive under first-year mentor John Kochan. A 10-15 club in 1982-83, Kochan quickly turned Marauder fortunes into winning results with a 17-11 overall record and a 9-5 PSAC mark. The squad won its first playoff contest ever in Pucillo Gym with a win over Kutztown and advanced to the PSAC semi-finals. The catalyst in the Marauders' resurgence was freshman forward John Fox, who averaged 15 points and 11 rebounds per game, shot 61 percent from the floor, and collected several post-season awards including PSAC and ECAC Rookie of the Year.

Cross country, a traditionally strong sport at MU, continued its excellent record. The men's squad, coached by Cy Fritz, won the Lebanon Valley and Lafayette Invitational and placed second in the PSAC meet. In NCAA competition, the Marauders were a creditable fourth and ninth in the regional and national meets, respectively. Juniors Steve Koons and Bill King earned All-America certificates at the nationals. The women's team, under the coaching of Keith White, earned second place finishes at Kutztown and Lebanon Valley and was eighth in the NCAA regionals.

A pair of teams coached by Julia Bowers, archery and synchronized swimming, fared well. The archers were fifth in their divisional national event, while the swimmers won the Pennsylvania state meet (hosted by

MU) and went on to a fourth place effort in the USSS nationals in Arizona.

Under the leadership of coaches Joe Abromaitis and Gene Wise, the Marauder baseball team posted an outstanding 21-13-1 record. The Marauders who excelled include senior pitchers Steve Gergel and Rick Carns, and the leading hitters were co-captains Jeff Herman and Joel Weaver, first baseman Dave Ash and outfielder Bob Detwiler.

Coach William Kahler's men's tennis team enjoyed a fine 22-7 record, which included strong play from the lone senior on the club, captain Ken Loose.

Both MU track teams were productive, too. The male tracksters of Coach Larry Warshawsky were 7-2 in dual competition and were led by the holder of six school records, all-around star jumper and hurdler Joe Aiken. Coach White's women's squad took first places in the Bloomsburg Invitational and in a tri-meet with East Stroudsburg and Glassboro State. They capped their season with a sixth place effort at the PSAC meet.

In lacrosse, Coach Barbara Waltman's club posted a 5-4 record and was able to surpass the .500 mark with victories in three of its final four matches.

The golf team finished 9-3 in dual competition which, according to Head Coach Bud Smart, represented the strongest squad ever assembled at MU.

The football squad suffered its first losing campaign since 1970, which was Coach Gene Carpenter's first season at the Marauder helm. However, the 4-6 Black and Gold lost two contests by one point each in the final minute and were close to contention in the PSAC East for much of the season. All-America tailback Ricke Stonewall notched 880 yards on the ground and tallied eight touchdowns to become the Marauders' career leader in rushing and scoring. Guard Tony Elhajj, middle guard Chris Hangen and cornerback Moses Alston joined Stonewall on the All-PSAC first team.

The Annual Fund

1983-84

The first year of the Millersville University Annual Fund was a splendid success. The total contributed from July 1, 1983, to June 30, 1984, was \$130,785.09, easily surpassing the Steering Committee's goal of \$125,000.

In addition to the Annual Fund, gifts to the Millersville Foundation and the Alumni Association, together with proceeds from benefits, brought the total University-wide fundraising effort last year to \$205,635.37.

Gifts to the Alumni Loyalty Fund portion of the Annual Fund surpassed total alumni giving records of the past with total contributions of \$74,036.46 from 3,268 alumni.

Millersville employees surpassed their previous giving also with gifts of \$28,609.48. Gifts from campus organizations brought total giving to the MEDAL Fund to \$41,109.48.

The first Parents Fund and Friends Fund were organized in 1983-84, resulting in \$1,800 from parents and \$13,839.15 from friends. This year, all matching gifts from corporations were included in the Friends Fund.

In addition to money received through gifts, the University also raised funds for scholarships during 1983-84 through benefits and special projects such as the Madrigal Feaste, special concerts, sales, and proceeds from televised football games. These events produced \$22,122.42 in athletic scholarships and \$6,381.45 in academic scholarships for a total of \$28,653.87 in scholarship funds. Also, \$2,428 was added to the fund to establish an academic chair from the sale of a book on Biemesderfer Executive Center, *Centerpiece of the Campus*.

Many persons who contributed to the Annual Fund gave unrestricted gifts to be used where it was most needed. Of those gifts earmarked for a particular use, the greatest number were designated for scholarships. The total amount of new scholarship money raised through benefits and restricted gifts in 1983-84 was approximately \$72,500. This included \$42,118.49 for academic scholarships and \$30,485.25 for athletic scholarships.

Significant Year Reviewed by Alumni President

The changed relationship between the Millersville Alumni Association and the University which occurred at the beginning of the 1983-84 year established this past year as one of the most significant in the long history of the Association.

Transferred to the University staff were the following functions: publishing the alumni magazine, conducting the Alumni Loyalty Fund campaign, which is now part of the University's annual giving program, and maintaining records of alumni.

These changes have enabled the Association to discontinue collecting dues from alumni. Instead of paying dues, alumni are being urged to increase their support of the University through the Alumni Loyalty Fund. Income to support Alumni Association activities now comes primarily from a number of trust funds developed from life membership dues and from bequests received from alumni. Several of those funds are earmarked for programs to assist worthy students.

Having transferred several functions to the University staff, the officers and committees of the Association are giving greater attention to other activities. Some activities serve students, some support various University programs, and some serve alumni and other friends of the University.

Homecoming and Alumni Day activities were planned and conducted in cooperation with the University staff. Distinguished Service Awards were presented to

two alumni. Special events included trips to Baltimore's Inner Harbor, Wallops Island Marine Science Center, Atlantic City and other places of interest to students, staff and alumni. Volunteers lent a hand in the University's Alumni Affairs office. Many alumni assisted in the phonathon to solicit contributions in the annual giving program.

The Alumni Association also established the Legislative Action Committee to help take the message of the University to State legislators.

As in past years, Search for Excellence scholarships were presented to nine academically outstanding entering freshmen. Neimeyer Student Research Grants were awarded to 10 students engaged in special study or research projects. The Alumni Emergency Loan Fund provided short term, interest-free loans to 128 students during the year.

The Alumni Association continues to be actively involved in the University's annual giving program. At the request of President Caputo, representatives of the Association served on the original committee that developed the program. Currently, Association representatives serve on the Annual Giving Steering Committee and the Gift Distribution Committee. Our Alumni Loyalty Fund Committee worked closely with the vice president for University Advancement in conducting the Alumni Loyalty Fund. A goal of \$75,000 was set for that portion of the annual giving program. The June 30 summary of contributions reports that \$74,036 was received directly from alumni. In addition, \$3,290 in matching funds have

been received from employers of alumni contributors.

In closing the account of loyalty funds previously contributed to the Association, 17 rolls of microfilm about the Amish were purchased for \$680 for presentation to Ganster Library.

To recognize alumni who became life members under the previous membership fee policy, Council has named the lounge area in the Alumni House the Alumni Life Members' Lounge and has directed that the names of life members be permanently displayed in that area.

A matter to which the Alumni Council is giving serious attention is the possibility of donating the Alumni House to the University. This property, located at 207 North George Street, was purchased by the Alumni Association in 1968. It currently accommodates the Association office, an alumni lounge and, on a rental basis, the University's Alumni Affairs office, the Millersville University Foundation office and housing for 13 women students.

Unfortunately, rental income from the property has not been adequate to meet the mounting costs of maintenance and necessary improvements. Since there is a desire to use Association assets to provide services to the University instead of diverting them to support the Alumni House, the Alumni Council has initiated conversations with President Caputo relative to donating the property to the University. The Council is requesting, in exchange, retention of the name Alumni House, free offices for the Association and an alumni lounge in the building.

President Caputo has responded that acquiring the Alumni House would help solve some of the University's needs for office space. He added that he is in agreement with the conditions stipulated by the Council and is now working to garner support for and approval of the conditions from Commonwealth attorneys.

Final action on the proposed transfer of ownership is scheduled to be taken at a meeting of the Alumni Council on September 22.

A significant policy change on Alumni Council membership and responsibility was made in 1983 and its implementation was begun this year.

Our constitution now names the Alumni Council as a whole as the governing body of the Association with meetings a minimum of four times yearly. Council members are now elected for five-year terms by the alumni body from candidates nominated by classes during their reunion years. Accordingly, the 16 reunion classes ('04, '09, '14, '19, etc.) in 1984 will nominate candidates from whom six will be elected to Council by mail ballot next spring. Current members of Council will continue to serve until replaced by election following their next class reunion year. Within five years, this election procedure will reduce Council membership from more than 90 to approximately 40.

Dr. Gordon Diem, who has been director of alumni affairs for the University for the past six years, announced his resignation in August to accept a faculty position at Springfield College, Massachusetts. Many alumni volunteers came to know Dr. Diem during his tenure and to appreciate his contributions to the Association. The University has announced that his successor will be selected sometime during the coming year.

Also, we've received from Mrs. Frances Keller '45 a request that she be relieved of her duties as executive secretary and treasurer of the Association, effective June 1985. In view of the outstanding service Mrs. Keller has rendered in that dual role, we regret receiving her resignation. However, we understand her desire to have the freedom to enjoy retirement life with her husband, Richard Keller '45, who plans to retire from the faculty of the University at that same time. We wish both of them

the best in the years ahead.

With one busy year behind us, the officers, committees and other members of the Alumni Council

look forward to another year in which to work to support President Caputo and the entire University. 

During the past year, some Alumni completed pledges made to the Alumni Association Loyalty Fund a year earlier. Others made contributions to the general account of the Alumni Association for 1983-84. The Association no longer is soliciting donations for its own operation but is encouraging all alumni to contribute to the Alumni Loyalty Fund portion of the

University Annual Fund program. Nevertheless, the Association is grateful for the support of those persons who sent gifts and we wish to express our thanks and acknowledge those givers.

Restoration of 18th Century Book Funded by Friends of Ganser

In the skilled hands of specialized craftsmen, an historically important book owned by Millersville University was transformed from its crumbling, torn and stained condition to a beautiful specimen of a major 1748 American publication.

The book, entitled "Martyr's Mirror," was printed on a hand press by the Brotherhood of the Cloister in Ephrata, Pennsylvania, 236 years ago. This copy was the first American edition of the Dutch book loved by the Mennonites of Pennsylvania who had sought to have it translated into German. Unable to have the work done in Europe, the Mennonites turned to the Brothers of the Cloister who undertook not only the translation but also the publishing and binding of the book itself.

The book is of exceptionally large size. It took 15 men three years to complete the translation and the printing. No one knows for sure how many copies were printed initially, but because it was done on a hand press, historians believe the numbers were quite limited. Legend has it that some copies were lost during the Revolutionary War when the large pages became wadding material for cannons.

"Martyr's Mirror" was written by Tieleman Janszoon vanBraght in 1660. The book describes the lives of all Christian martyrs from the time of Christ to the year that it was first published. The Cloister version was the first edition translated into German and the first edition printed in this country. While there have been a number of later editions, the original holds the highest place of honor among collectors of Pennsylvania German books.

Millersville came into possession of the book when it appeared in the

collection donated by the family of H. Frank Eshleman, an 1890 graduate of the Millersville Normal School. The book was in very poor condition. It obviously had been heavily used but improperly stored. The front cover was missing as were all the pages up to the title page. The spine and back cover were damaged beyond repair and many pages were torn and water stained.

The restoration of "Martyr's Mirror" became a project funded through donations made to the Friends of Ganser Library, a library support group that assists primarily the special collections and archives departments.

The restoration was completed recently at a cost of \$1200. The restorers were the internationally known craftsmen, Trudy and Fritz Eberhard, of Harleysville, Pennsylvania. The couple disassembled the entire book, washed, bleached, and deacidified many of the pages, repaired the torn pages and fashioned a new binding using 18th cen-

tury techniques. The cover is made of German beechboard and fine English leather, which were selected for their archival qualities. Metal clasps were made to resemble those used on bindings of the period. The rare book experts now say that the book looks much as it would have looked when it was first issued by the Brotherhood in 1748.

Because copies of "Martyr's Mirror" in good condition can be purchased at auction in the Lancaster area for approximately \$2,000, the value of the completed project is not primarily a monetary one. Rather, it provided for Ganser Library a book that is historically important in the cultural and religious life of Lancaster County and its new condition now ensures that it will survive to be cherished by scholars 236 years in the future.

The restored book and photographs taken during the restoration process are currently on exhibit in the Esther Whitely room, fourth floor of Ganser Library.
