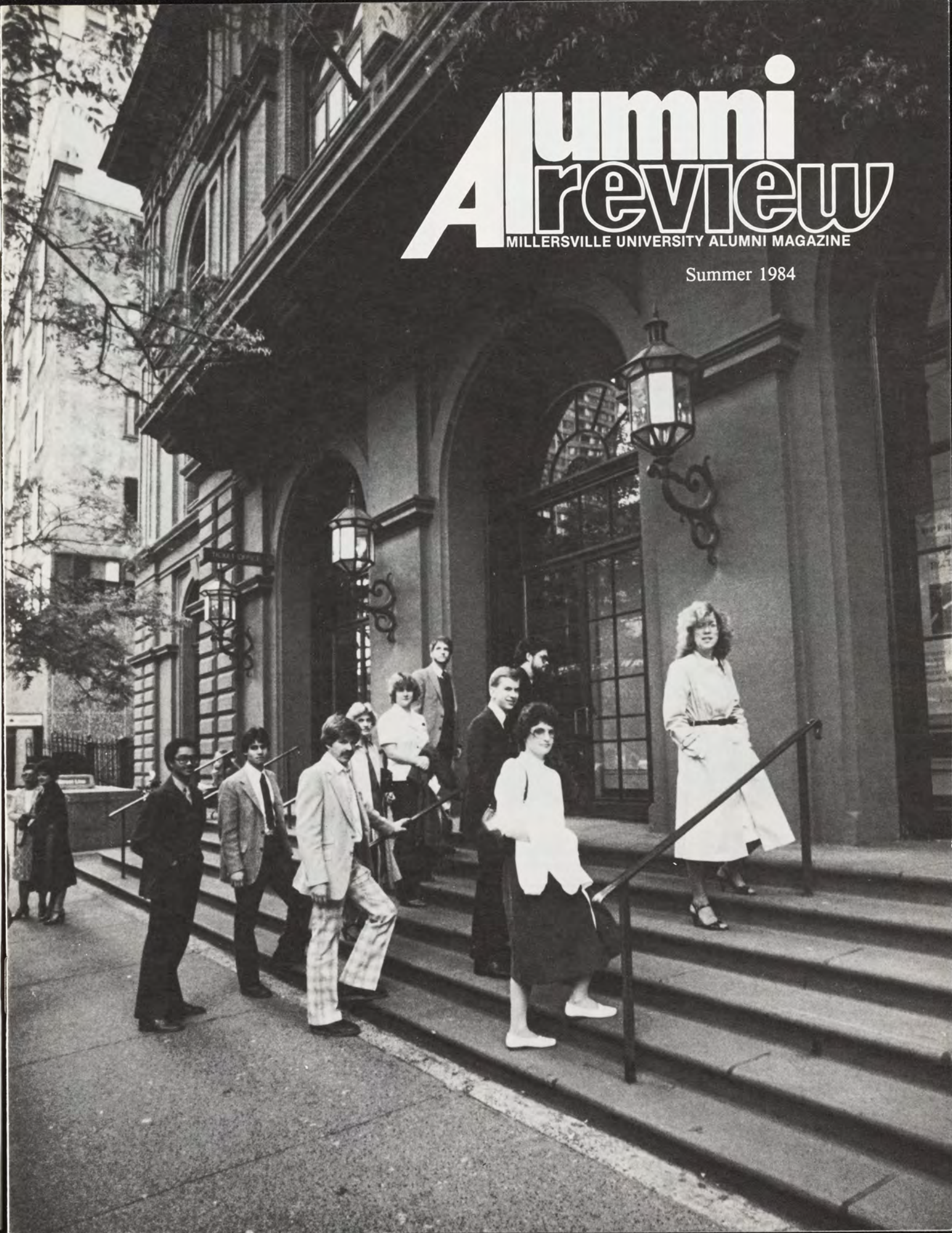

Alumni Activities

The Millersville University Alumni Association Activities Committee has scheduled a variety of summertime trips for all interested alumni and their guests. Brief descriptions of each trip are listed below. If you want more information or want to make reservations for any of these activities, call the Alumni Office at (717) 872-3351.

July 20-22: Beach Weekend at Wallops Island, Virginia

Spend the weekend at the Marine Science Consortium and Marine Science Center at Wallops Island for just \$40 per person. The fee includes two nights' accommodations, dormitory style with two persons per room or one family per room; three meals on Saturday plus Sunday brunch; one-half day instruction in marine science topics with a staff instructor; swimming in the bay or surf; beachcombing and birdwatching; a Chincoteague Refuge collection permit, and a boat trip. Deadline for reservations is July 13.

August 11: Philadelphia Phillies Baseball Trip

See the Phillies play the St. Louis Cardinals from 500-level seats in Veterans Stadium. \$13 per person includes round-trip transportation from the Student Center on the Millersville campus and your stadium seat. Deadline for reservations is August 3.

One gift works in many ways

Francis Bacon said in one of his classic essays, "Travel, in the younger sort, is a part of education; . . ."

Few would argue with that observation—especially a significant number of Millersville University students who, under the auspices of a bequest from an alumnus, have had an opportunity to augment their on-campus education with many types of off-campus activities.

The Joseph F. Noonan Memorial Academic Student Activities Endowment has helped send MU music students to Philadelphia Orchestra concerts at the Academy of Music (see cover and photos above), art students to museums and commercial art centers in New York City, political science students to the House of Representatives in Washington, D.C., and students of biology, economics, foreign languages, history, mathematics and computer science, and social work up and down the East Coast to facilities, meetings and workshops significant to their respective disciplines. And it has accomplished all that in just one academic year.

Administered by the Millersville University Foundation, the Noonan Endowment is believed to be the largest single bequest ever left to the University. Annual income from an invested principle of more than \$69,000 is available by application to all academic departments of the University for a wide variety of academically related activities. These include field trips, attendance at national and professional-society meetings, student research, and other similarly worthwhile activities.

Carol Myers, assistant professor of music, has accompanied MU music students to the Philadelphia Orchestra concerts and knows her students have viewed the trips as "a wonderful opportunity."

"Attending the concerts has helped them grow in their ability to make value judgments about music and musicians," she says, "and many of them have told me that they wouldn't have been able to have this opportunity on their own."

Leonard Ragouzeos, assistant professor of art, terms his art students' trips to New York and Philadelphia "worthwhile and important."

"All the parts come together," he says. "For juniors and seniors, visiting art centers gives them a good summation of all the different things they've learned in class."

Dr. Joseph P. Noonan was a member of the 1909 graduating class of Millersville Normal School. He earned additional degrees from Muhlenberg College and New York University.

Noonan spent his entire career in service to education. After teaching and serving as superintendent of schools in New Jersey, he assumed the post of Mansfield State College president. He closed his career in education after a 16-year tenure as president of East Stroudsburg State College.

Following his retirement the Noonans moved to Philadelphia, where Dr. Noonan established one of that city's earliest concepts of a condominium by purchasing an

apartment building on Rittenhouse Square and selling individual apartments.

Noonan established the gift to Millersville in a joint will with his wife before his death in 1965. Equal amounts also were willed to Kutztown University (Mrs. Noonan's alma mater) and to East Stroudsburg University.

Noonan's widow, Helene S., died in December 1979. It was directly from her estate, in accordance with the joint wish of her and her husband, that Millersville acquired the substantial gift and, in the 1983 fall semester, began to put it to fruitful use.

Alumni Day 1984

Nearly 300 alumni returned to the Millersville University campus between Friday and Sunday, June 1-3, for Alumni Weekend 1984.

The oldest class reunion was held by the class of 1914, with four of its living members returning to celebrate the 70th anniversary of their graduation.

Winifred Wagar and Miriam Peters, both of Lancaster, and Pauline Wright of New Holland all arrived early for the day's activities. The fourth classmate, Helen Moffit of Martinsburg, West Virginia, joined the trio at their luncheon table to reminisce about preparing for teaching careers at the old Millersville State Normal School.

When these four octogenarians went to Millersville, it was a two-year institution with academic programs only in teacher education. The entire student body of fewer than 500 students was housed in Old Main along with the dining hall and all of the classrooms. Today Old Main is gone. Some 6,500 students attend classes on a sprawling University campus of more than 225 acres and 65 buildings; teacher education programs enroll less than 25 percent of the student body.

Four members of the class of '44—Jeanette Wike, Alice Ruby Work, George Elison and Nat Jasper—showed up for their Alumni Weekend class reunion at the Lemon Tree in Lancaster sporting their 40-year-old Millersville beanies and badges.

Class representatives, Alumni Association officers and committee chairpersons attended an Alumni Council meeting Saturday morning to hear reports on Alumni activities. The 1983-84 officers were reelected for a second one-year term. They include: Dr. William H. Duncan '40, president; Mrs. Elizabeth F. Kauffman '52, vice president; Mrs. Frances K. Keller '45, executive secretary/treasurer; and Barbara B. Hunsberger '65, secretary.

The main speaker for the luncheon program was Millersville University President Joseph A. Caputo. Comments were also given by Roy Brenneman of Lancaster on behalf of the class of 1934, which celebrated its 50th Anniversary that weekend.

Sunday's activities included a memorial service in Gordinier Hall for all alumni who had died during the past year, with the sermon given by The Rev. Robert D. McClure '29.

A window on the world of Esther Whitely

*Because I could not stop for Death,
He kindly stopped for me;
The carriage held but just ourselves

Two years after her death, Esther Risser Whitely—"the consummate librarian"—is still, in a way, responsible for things getting accomplished.

As part of the June 2 Alumni Day program, the "Hope" window was formally dedicated to Mrs. Whitely's memory in the Esther Risser Whitely Reading Room of Ganser Library.

Those of you who were on the Millersville campus before 1965 will remember the "Hope" window as one in a series of 14 stained glass windows that graced the Old Main Chapel. The first window, "Socrates Teaching the Youth of Athens," was installed in 1905 at a cost of \$150. Each of the other windows was sponsored by classes from 1868 to 1907. The "Hope" window was among the first five installed and was sponsored by the class of 1904. When Old Main was razed in 1965 to make way for Ganser Library, all 14 windows were put in storage.

Recently the "Hope" window was removed from storage and completely cleaned and restored at a cost in excess of \$1,000.

The restoration was made possible through the Esther Risser Whitely Memorial Fund, established two months after her death and administered by the Executive Committee of the Friends of Ganser Library, which leads directly back to Esther Whitely.

In 1973, the golden anniversary of her graduation from Millersville State Normal School, Esther conceived the idea of forming the Friends of Ganser Library as a means to help secure materials for the library that otherwise could not be bought. She enlisted the support of her classmates, and, together, they presented the group's first gift to the library—a complete set, on microfilm, of the histories of the counties of Pennsylvania. Many of the library's acquisitions made possible by the Friends are of a local nature; it is in large part because of Esther's foresight that Millersville University has become a noted repository for these materials.

Esther Risser Whitely devoted more than 60 of her 79 years to the perpetuation and betterment of school and public libraries. She was a member of the first graduating class (1923) of teacher librarians at Millersville Normal School . . . the first such class in Pennsylvania at the normal school level.

She spent the next 50 years as teacher or teacher librarian in several schools in Pennsylvania. She returned to Millersville in 1950 and remained here until her retirement in 1972 as head reference librarian and assistant professor in the library science department.

Her retirement in no way signified the end of her involvement with the library world. She continued her active affiliation with the American Association of University Women and, until her death, worked tirelessly to help

organize the increasingly popular AAUW used book sales as well as the Ganser Library book sales.

She also devoted much of her time and effort to the Delta Kappa Gamma Society, an international organization of outstanding women teachers; the Lancaster League of Women Voters; the YWCA; the Pennsylvania School Librarians Association, and the Lancaster Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends.

In addition to her many professional and civic activities Esther Whitely also was devoted to her home, her son, James, and her husband, Paul, former chairman of the Psychology department at Franklin and Marshall College.

In her tribute to Mrs. Whitely during the dedication of the "Hope" window, Laura Buller Doering '35, fellow librarian and Friend of Ganser Library, said, "It is now two years since Esther left us. But there are still times when it is hard to believe that she is not here. Her vibrant personality, her energy, her happy disposition were qualities that endeared her to those of us who knew and worked with her—qualities that, to this day, remain so alive in our memories that many times we actually feel her presence. Is she not akin to one of her favorite authors, Margaret Fuller, who declared, 'I am immortal . . . Nought can sever me from the Spirit of life . . . ?'"

Those who knew her and still feel her optimistic influence—her family, friends, coworkers and students—nod silently and agree.

Alumni support comes in many forms

The following is an excerpt from President Joseph A. Caputo's Alumni Day address.

Our alumni are a very important part of the Millersville family. We need our alumni and we need them to be active proponents of Millersville University. We need alumni to speak proudly about us wherever they go. We need alumni to give us moral support, to give us, when possible, financial support and, from those who are in a position to do so, to give us political support. Don't underestimate how valuable your writing to, or speaking to, a legislator can be. Recently in the new capitol budget, Millersville received two out of three important budget requests. We were given \$1.7 million to refurbish and update Byerly Hall and \$1.8 million to convert the old boiler house, which we no longer will be needing now that we're on all-electric heat, to a usable facility. Those two projects are the direct result of support from local political leaders, and political leaders listen to their constituents. We were disappointed that our request for a new classroom building to replace Myers Hall was not approved but we will keep asking for it. Perhaps, with your help, someday it may be a reality. We need a new classroom building in which to place in a proper setting our fine School of Education so that we can continue to maintain the highest standards in our early childhood, elementary, and secondary education programs.

Alumni support can also be helpful in speaking to legislators about the annual appropriations for the operating budget. Perhaps you're not aware of what's been happening in the past decade. Until about ten years ago, state appropriations paid for approximately 60 percent of the operating budget and the remaining 40 percent came from tuition and from a few other auxiliary programs. But over the past decade the percentage of our operating budget from the State appropriation has

dropped to just a hair over 50 percent and the remaining 50 percent has had to come from tuition and other sources. That has resulted, of course, in higher tuition rates for our students and also a need for Millersville and the other state universities to begin doing private fund raising. I'm sure all of you have been aware of the increased number of requests you have received from Millersville this year asking for your financial help. We have initiated a forceful fund-raising program, not only among our alumni but also among our employees, our parents and other friends of the University. I hope many alumni will respond to this new effort.

However, we also need whatever support you can provide for adequate state appropriations to the State System of Higher Education. We can't keep asking our students to make up the difference when our budget falls short. A recent federal study of publically supported colleges and universities in the United States found Pennsylvania's colleges to be third highest in the cost of tuition. Only in Maine and the District of Columbia do students pay more than they do in Pennsylvania to attend a public institution. In the percentage of tax revenues dedicated to public higher education, Pennsylvania came in 43rd. The study showed that Pennsylvania loses many of its college-bound high school graduates to out-of-state public institutions. The story needs to be told that there is high quality public education right here in Pennsylvania. The 14 state universities, and Millersville University in particular, must not hide their light under a basket. Alumni can help by telling their friends and their children and their children's friends and their grandchildren and their grandchildren's friends to look into the opportunities available at the State universities. Yes, alumni can make the future of Millersville strong by becoming avid supporters. *I would ask you today to assume the roll as an advocate for Millersville.*

Two in medicine cited for distinguished service

Two Millersville University graduates with careers in medicine were honored with Alumni Association Distinguished Service Awards at the University's annual Alumni Day luncheon.

The traditional Distinguished Service Award went to Dr. Victor M. Bove, assistant superintendent at the Wernersville State Hospital. Dr. Bove received a bachelor of science degree from Millersville in 1954 and was graduated in 1951 from the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine.

The Younger Alumni Distinguished Service Award was presented to former Lancaster resident Elizabeth Hirak Field, who holds a fellowship in rheumatology and immunology at Stanford University. She was graduated from Millersville in 1974, obtained her medical degree from The Pennsylvania State University at Hershey and served a three-year residency in internal medicine at the Hershey Medical Center. She has been at Stanford since 1981, and, for the past two years, she has been a recipient of the Northern California Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation Fellowship Award for her work in the treatment of rheumatic diseases.

Dr. Bove was present to receive his award and Dr. Field's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Michael Hirak, 363 Atkins Ave., Lancaster, accepted for their daughter. The presentations were made during the annual Alumni Day luncheon by the chairpersons of the awards committee, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hostetter.

Dr. Bove, who had been a member of the Lancaster Osteopathic Hospital staff from 1966 to 1980, served as medical director and director of medical education at the hospital from July 1973 to July 1980. He accepted a position as vice president for medical affairs at Memorial General Hospital, Union, N.J., for one year and then in the fall of 1981 became the staff psychiatrist at Wernersville State Hospital. He was appointed to his current position as assistant superintendent in April 1983.

Dr. Bove had a distinguished military career in the U.S.

Army, which began in World War II. He has served in the Army Reserve with the rank of Colonel since 1972. He was chief of surgery and chief of professional services of the 99th Combat Support Hospital in Lancaster from 1972 to 1976 and commander of the hospital from 1976 to 1980. He has received numerous awards, letters of commendation and medals for his Army medical work. Dr. Bove holds medical licenses in five states and is a member of numerous professional and community organizations. He served as president of the Lancaster County Chapter of the Millersville University Alumni Association for one year and also was a member of the Millersville Alumni Council for a year. During the time he was a Lancaster resident he was active in the Lancaster-Lebanon Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

Dr. Field is a graduate of McCaskey High School and was graduated magna cum laude from Millersville with a degree in physics. At Stanford, she has been involved in research using innovative therapy to treat patients with autoimmune diseases such as rheumatoid arthritis. She has successfully treated more than 30 patients whose disease cannot be controlled by conventional medical therapy. Her work has been presented at several national scientific meetings and recorded in medical literature. She recently received the American Rheumatism Association 1984 Scholar Award and a Pfizer Medical Research Merit Award.

While she was a student at Millersville, Dr. Field received the Wentzel-Wright Memorial Award for academic achievement, the A.G. Breidenstine Award for the year's outstanding honors paper and the Faculty-Student Athletic Award for the female athlete with the highest grade point average. She was a member of the hockey team.

CAMPUS NEWS

Two professors retire

Two long-time professors recently retired, both after 16 years on the Millersville faculty.

Philip Wooby, associate professor of classical languages, retired June 15, and Jane M. Bachman, associate professor of elementary and early childhood education at MU retired July 13.

Wooby taught the University's first fully accredited undergraduate course in Italian, initially offered in the spring of 1983. The course was developed to fill numerous requests from the regular student body and has been scheduled each semester since that time.

Professor Wooby was a Prize Fellow of the American Academy in Rome during the early 1950s and has returned to Italy several times. A Philadelphia native, he taught at Canisius College, Harvard University, the University of Puerto Rico, and the University of Pennsylvania before coming to Millersville.

Mrs. Bachman came to MU from Quarryville where she first taught in the elementary school and later taught language arts, social studies and reading in junior high school. Before that she taught dressmaking at Bartram High School in Philadelphia.

During her Millersville tenure, Mrs. Bachman served on the Graduate and Undergraduate Curriculum Committees and was adviser to many graduate and undergraduate students. In addition, she was a speaker at several special MU conferences and was a member of the University's Bicentennial Committee.

Art prof gets commission

Ike Hay, MU professor of art, has been commissioned by Foundry Plaza, Inc., a nonprofit corporation dedicated to beautifying and improving the city of York, to produce a sculpture for that city's Foundry Plaza.

Approximately 11 feet high by 10 feet wide, the sculpture, an abstract form designed to reflect the elements of landscaping in the plaza, will be placed near the plaza's amphitheatre where it can be viewed from either Market or Philadelphia Streets. The piece will weigh about 4,500 pounds and be constructed of quarter inch steel plate so that adults may use the base for seating and children may explore it without causing damage.

Completion and installation of the work, which will be painted a bright red, is expected by August 22.

Caputo testifies before House

President Joseph A. Caputo testified last spring before the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Education and Labor, Subcommittee on Postsecondary Education, on the reauthorization of the Higher Education Act.

Dr. Caputo was among the presidents of The Pennsylvania State University, Johns Hopkins University, Cornell University, and Tuskegee Institute who were invited to comment on the act, which is the primary legislation defining the federal role in American higher education.

The presidents were asked to testify by U.S. Representative Paul Simon of Illinois, chairman of the Subcommittee on Postsecondary Education. Dr. Caputo spoke on student financial aid, the need for faculty development, the need for assistance to renovate and maintain higher education facilities, and endowment development.

Scharnberger takes spotlight

Dr. Charles Scharnberger of MU's earth sciences department was thrust into the spotlight recently as he served as the primary source of information concerning recent local earthquakes.

In case you didn't hear, the Millersville area was shaken by a series of significant tremors last April. Since the epicenters of the quakes were only several miles from campus, it was inevitable that the news media would seek scientific explanations from the University's earth sciences department.

Dr. Scharnberger, professor of earth sciences and a geophysicist, was the first to answer media questions. From that initial contact, he was sought as the local authority of the subject, providing geologic information and seismographic data from University equipment.

During the period between April 18 and the end of that month, Scharnberger was queried by a large number of newspaper, radio and TV reporters from both the local and regional area. In addition to being interviewed by area television stations, he also was a guest on a local radio talk show.

Affirmative action director named

Millersville University has a new director of affirmative action and human relations.

He is Robert E. Gillis, former assistant to the president and director of affirmative action at Clarion University.

The affirmative action and human relations position at MU had been filled by an interim director since Dr. Juanita High resigned in early 1983.

In his new post, Gillis serves as the University's primary resource person, advocate and spokesperson on all matters related to affirmative action, desegregation, compliance and human relations. A member of the president's staff, he also works to protect the interests of minorities, women and the handicapped within the University community.

Prior to assuming his posts at Clarion in 1981, Gillis served for three years as equal opportunity officer for the City of Springfield, Missouri, and for four years as academic adviser at Southwest Missouri State University.

While at Clarion, he developed new employment procedures that ensured equal opportunities. His responsibilities also included writing and implementing Clarion's affirmative action program, coordinating employee training and affirmative action projects and promoting program development in areas of concern to minorities and women.

More than 70 applications from throughout the country were reviewed for the position by a nine-member MU search committee chaired by Rachael Dread, assistant dean of graduate studies.

Store manager named

MU has a new University Store manager.

She is Kay Strosnider, a West Virginia native, who comes to Millersville from Coles Book Stores, Ltd., in Reading where she had been employed for four years. Ms. Strosnider replaced Gilbert Shoff who resigned last spring after 14 years with the University.

Before taking her position with Coles, she taught music education for one year at Elizabethtown College and the same discipline for five years at Glenville State College in the Clarksburg-Bridgeport area of West Virginia. She also supervised student teachers who were majoring in music at the two colleges.

Ms. Strosnider received her undergraduate degree in music at Glenville State College and a master's degree in music education at Marshall University.

Campus projects funded

The State General Assembly recently passed an appropriations bill that funds two campus projects.

Part of MU's capital budget request, the appropriations include \$1.7 million for ongoing work in Byerly Hall and \$1.8 million for anticipated renovations to the boiler house, which recently was decommissioned. Both figures include construction, design and contingency costs.

Offices and classrooms are being rearranged throughout Byerly Hall, including the gymnasium area, and a new air-conditioning and electric heating system will be installed as well as an elevator. The boiler house will be renovated to accommodate expanded University needs. Don Stollenwerk, director of physical plant, indicated that final plans for the latter project have not been made. A professional designer has yet to be chosen for the job.

Renovations planned for boiler house

One of Millersville's landmark facilities, the boiler house, ceased operations with the close of the spring semester.

After 46 years of producing steam to heat campus buildings, the structure was decommissioned because most University dorms and halls now have their own electrical heating systems.

"Brooks, Myers and Bassler Halls will soon make the transition," said Don Stollenwerk, physical plant director. The only other building to be served recently by the plant was Byerly Hall.

"That building," said Stollenwerk, "will be temporarily heated next fall and winter by a portable boiler while conversion work continues there." He indicated it is less expensive in the long run to rent a mobile boiler than to operate the boiler house for only one building.

At full operation, the plant supplied heat to Old Main, Biemesderfer, Lyte Auditorium, the old science building, and Dutcher, Dilworth, Wickersham, Brooks, Bard, Gilbert, Lyle, Osburn and Gerhart Halls. Landis Hall and Roddy Science Center were built with their own heating systems.

The boiler house was built in 1938 and initially contained two boilers fired by bituminous coal. A third was added in 1959. Because oil was still relatively inexpensive in the early 1970s, the boiler furnaces were converted to oil firing.

Stollenwerk noted there often were two people on a shift around-the-clock when coal was the fuel. That figure was reduced to one per shift during the first years of using oil, and for the last six years the plant was fully automated.

The plan to convert the campus heating system to electrical energy was devised in the early 1960s. The University was beginning to develop the south complex of dormitories and dining hall then and was installing an underground electrical distribution system to serve the existing campus and proposed buildings.

"It was decided that the money needed to construct a new boiler plant and a totally new underground steam distribution system, along with the manpower required to operate the plant on an around-the-clock basis, would have a lifetime cost in excess of the additional fuel costs the Commonwealth would pay for electricity," said Stollenwerk.

Within a year, all campus buildings will be heated by electrical energy. The conversion projects have been going on for 17 years.

The boiler house will now be renovated to accommodate expanded University needs. Final plans for use of the structure have not been made and a professional designer still must be hired, according to Stollenwerk. "One thing is for sure," he added, "the large smokestack located adjacent to the plant will eventually be demolished."

Gray Panthers founder to speak

Maggie Kuhn, founder and national convener of the Gray Panthers, will be the speaker for August 18 commencement ceremonies at Millersville University.

Since her 65th birthday in 1970, Maggie has almost singlehandedly created, nurtured and built the Gray Panthers, an organization of more than 60,000 members, which, she says "is dedicated to fighting ageism or discrimination based on age." At the age of 78, she continues to travel thousands of miles a year, giving hundreds of lectures.

Aside from her Gray Panthers work, Maggie is also involved in a number of other leadership roles. She has served on the boards of many organizations, including Hospice, Inc.; the National Institute for the Seriously Ill and Dying; the National Senior Citizens Law Center in Washington, D.C.; the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy; the Bread and Roses Community Fund; The National Council for Alternative Work Patterns in Washington, D.C.; the National Advisory Board on Health Policy; and the Consumer's Panel of the American Bankers' Association.

Maggie worked with Ralph Nader's Retired Professional Action Group before that body joined the Gray Panthers in 1973. During the 1972 presidential campaign she served as a

member of McGovern's Advisory Board on Aging.

A prolific author, Maggie is a former editor of *Social Progress*, now the *Journal of Church and Society*, and has written many magazine articles and program materials. Her books — *You Can't Be Human Alone, Let's Get Out There and Do Something About Injustice*, and *Maggie Kuhn on Aging* — are well received and frequently have been reprinted. She has been the subject of two documentary films, one as a panel member in *Aging in America*, and the other as herself in *Maggie Kuhn: Wrinkled Radical*.

The recipient of many honorary doctorates, Maggie's educational background includes a bachelor of arts degree from Flora Stone Mather College of Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, where she was invited to give the alumni address at her 50th class reunion in 1976. She also has done graduate work at Temple University, the University of Southern California, the University of Hawaii, San Francisco Theological Seminary and LaSalle College in Philadelphia.

Drama students intern at playhouse

Millersville University speech/drama students who are working in various internship capacities at the Ephrata Playhouse in the Park this season are earning academic credit for the experience.

James Henke, assistant professor of speech/drama at MU, is the playhouse's resident designer and is in charge of the five Millersville students enrolled in the "intern" program this summer.

Henke said that for the first season student interns work only in the technical and production aspects of the theater, but if the program is continued in successive years, students could become actors as well.

The amount of MU academic credit offered to a student depends on their involvement in producing shows at the playhouse. Henke indicated that participants could earn up to six credits during a summer. If the program is successful, the University would like to give students the opportunity to work and earn credit for several seasons at the playhouse, he added.

An MU faculty member since 1976, Henke worked more than three seasons of summer stock in Indiana. He received a B.S. degree from Western Michigan University and an M.F.A. from Florida State University.

That is medical news because Julie is one of only a handful of persons living who have successfully received the bone marrow of a nonsibling. Her donor was a woman in Iowa who was matched through a computer bank. Julie is regaining her strength at her home in Lebanon and looking forward to returning to classes at Millersville in September. A fund drive to help the family with the expenses incurred passed \$45,000.



At press time, the Millersville University Annual Fund had surpassed the goal of \$125,000 with two weeks left before the end of the Annual Fund Year.

The goal was established last fall by the Annual Fund Steering Committee, chaired by William McCain, class of 1943. The amount reflects gifts of cash from alumni, parents, employees and friends of the University.

This was the first year that a coordinated fund raising effort, directed at all University constituents, was conducted by the University. Gifts to the Alumni Loyalty Fund, now a part of the annual fund, surpassed \$70,000, the largest amount ever contributed by alumni in a single year.

A complete report of the 1983-84 Annual Fund and other fund raising during the past year at Millersville, together with a listing of all donors, will appear in the fall issue of the *Millersville Review*.

In the spring issue of the *Alumni Review* we reported that someone had purchased a \$500 certificate of deposit in the name of the General Alumni Association of MSC and requested that anyone with information on who made the purchase let us know. Since then we have been informed that the certificate was purchased for the University's Alumni Association by the Class of 1937.

Research grants awarded

Three Millersville University students recently were awarded \$300 Neimeyer Research Grants by the MU Alumni Association.

Ronald L. Baker of Pittsburgh, a teacher education major, will use his grant to complete student teaching requirements at the Apache and Navajo Indian Reservation in White River, Arizona. Jerelene Kottcamp, a graduate student in psychology from York, plans to use her monies for a study that will examine the body's immune response system to determine if it is influenced by level of stress, while Darryl L. Landis of Lebanon, a senior

biochemistry major, will use his grant for a study that will attempt to isolate the enzymes amylase and lipase with high purity and minimal loss of enzymatic activity. The latter investigation is relevant to both the dairy industry and environmental controls, such as sewage waste removal.

Funding for the grants comes from the investment of \$20,000, which was willed to the Association by Minnie Menges Neimeyer of the class of 1923. The bequest, originally invested by the Alumni Association, is now invested with the Millersville University Foundation.

Any full- or part-time undergraduate at Millersville who needs funds to undertake a special scholarly project may apply for a grant.

Alumni Association receives bequest

The Millersville University Alumni Association recently received a bequest of \$7,800 from 1942 alumnus Allen J. Oakum, who died on May 18, 1983. In his will he left "to Millersville State College Alumni Association of Millersville, Pennsylvania, 5%."

The Association has invested the money for one year. At the end of that time, they will decide how the bequest can best fill the needs of the University.

Bomberger publishes book

Dr. Audrey S. Bomberger '75 is the co-author of a new book, *Radiation and Health: Principles and Practice in Therapy and Disaster Preparedness*, published last April by Aspen Publishing Company.

Dr. Bomberger, who is a registered nurse, received her bachelor of science degree in education from Millersville University and, in 1983, earned a doctoral degree in health service administration from Columbia-Pacific University in Mill Valley, California.

She is currently director of nursing education and research at McKay-Dee Hospital Center of Intermountain Health Care Corporation, Ogden, Utah. Directly involved in the preparations to evacuate a small hospital in South Central Pennsylvania during the incident at Three Mile Island in 1979, Dr. Bomberger has presented numerous lectures on radiation that have led to national and international interest. In addition, she has written articles on the subject that have been published in professional journals.

"Poss" Stehman dies

Ivan "Poss" J. Stehman '29 died at his home on May 9 at the age of 78.

A past president of the Millersville University Alumni Association, "Poss" was born in Millersville, attended Millersville public schools, and was graduated in 1929 from Millersville State Teachers College with a bachelor of science degree in education. He received a master's degree in education, specializing in physical education and safety education, from The Pennsylvania State University in 1942 and also did additional graduate work at Springfield College and George Washington University.

He began his career as an educator in 1930 at Lemoyne High School and remained there until 1935, when he began a 10-year stint on the faculty of McCaskey High School in Lancaster. When driver education was first introduced at McCaskey in 1937, "Poss" was put in charge of the program.

From 1938 through 1941, he assumed the additional responsibility of the head coach of Millersville's football team. His 1940 team came through with an undefeated season—a record that remains intact today.

In 1946, "Poss" was appointed coordinator of the newly created Division of Highway Safety in the Schools of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, a position he held until his retirement in 1968.

"Poss" was not a mere joiner but an active participant in any organization in which he held membership. The East Hempfield Exchange Club cited him as "a man who has devoted his life to serving his community."

Other organizations "Poss" served include the Citizens Scholarship Foundation and the Millersville University Foundation. In addition to serving as president of the Alumni Association, he also served as representative to the Alumni Council for the class of 1929 and was an active member of several other alumni-related committees.

He also took an active role in fund-raising for the University. Among the projects he helped guide included the purchase of the Memorial Organ in the 1950s and the purchase of the Carillon in the 1960s, both of which are housed in Lyte Auditorium. He also helped raise funds for the restoration of the old library, now Biemesderfer Executive Center, in the 1970s.

"Poss" Stehman was the husband of Genevieve F. Hughes Stehman, who survives him. He also is survived by three children, six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

An alumnus writes . . .

Dear Fellow Alumni:

Congratulations are in order for the staff responsible for producing the Spring 1984 *Alumni Review*. I was pleasantly surprised as I sat down to quickly scan the *Review* intending to read only the Class Notes and, regrettably, the Death Notices. From the initial article on campus rock concerts through to the last page, I found myself absorbed by the information and the memories. Many excellent issues of the *Alumni Review* have come to my home over the years. However, the spring issue sparked three Millersville memories which I cherish.

Millersville State College in 1963 was not experienced by many Black folks. As an 18-year-old from the inner city of Pittsburgh, Millersville, for the most part, stood at the opposite end of the spectrum of my experience.

The article titled "The Swan Song Goes On" brought back memories of Huey, the fattest duck I had ever seen. Huey lived in the campus pond. He

had two full-time jobs. His first job was to try to eat all of the food the students threw in his direction. Huey's second job was not to fly. Huey worked hard at both jobs. My very first letters home, rather than sharing revelations of new friends and good/bad times, spoke innocently about Huey, the first duck I had ever fed.

I arrived at Millersville one year ahead of John Ellsworth Winter. Strangely, it seems now as if I spent my first year waiting for him to come. I have many fond memories of the three years we overlapped. I found that Dr. Winter routinely asked questions for which there were no external answers. As a philosopher, he sought to send us searching, not for *his* truth but for *ours*. Answers were not as important as the search. Dr. Winter continues to help young minds to grow. He sure helped me!

I have a range of memories relating to my adventures as an English major. I remember Mr. Enders, who hated to give poor composition grades. He was almost apologetic when explaining, error by error, deficiencies in a student's work. The name Dr.

Lingenfelter struck fear in the hearts of most English majors; his English Literature class was a prerequisite for all junior/senior level courses. I came to find out he was a pussycat. Mr. Trout, literate beyond my comprehension, was a gentle, quiet man who read poetry daily to an invalid mother. He was the first to tell me I had a nice voice for reading poetry.

It was the article on Dr. Huzzard's donation of his book collection that triggered my reminiscence. In my senior year I had two courses from Dr. Huzzard. It was clear to me that he loved his work and that he shared part of himself with his students. On March 25, 1966, Dr. Huzzard honored me by giving me a copy of a book from his collection. *Fortitude* by Hugh Walpole is still part of my library.

My four years at Millersville were peppered with memory-making events. Thank you, *Alumni Review*, for helping me to remember some of the more pleasant moments.

U.S. Congressman Robert Walker '64 entertained alumni with remarks concerning his experiences on Capitol Hill and provided an excellent in-depth preview of coming industrial and commercial applications in outer space at a meeting of *Washington D.C. Area* alumni, June 5, at the Fort McNair Officers' Club.

Walker gave credit to his Millersville undergraduate education as the foundation upon which he was able to build his career in public service and meet the demands placed upon him as a member of the House Committee on Science and Technology. Future change will come so rapidly, he said, that education must place increasing emphasis on helping the student construct a firm foundation from which as an adult, he can pursue several different occupations during his lifetime.

Walker predicted 20-million new jobs during the next 15 years as a result of increasing exploration and development in outer space, assuming Congress provides the proper environment for such development.

According to Walker, transportation needs for development of space have been met by the space shuttle and similar vehicles under private develop-

ment. What is needed now is congressional funding for space habitat development and establishment of an environment in which regulation of business activity in space is kept to a minimum.
