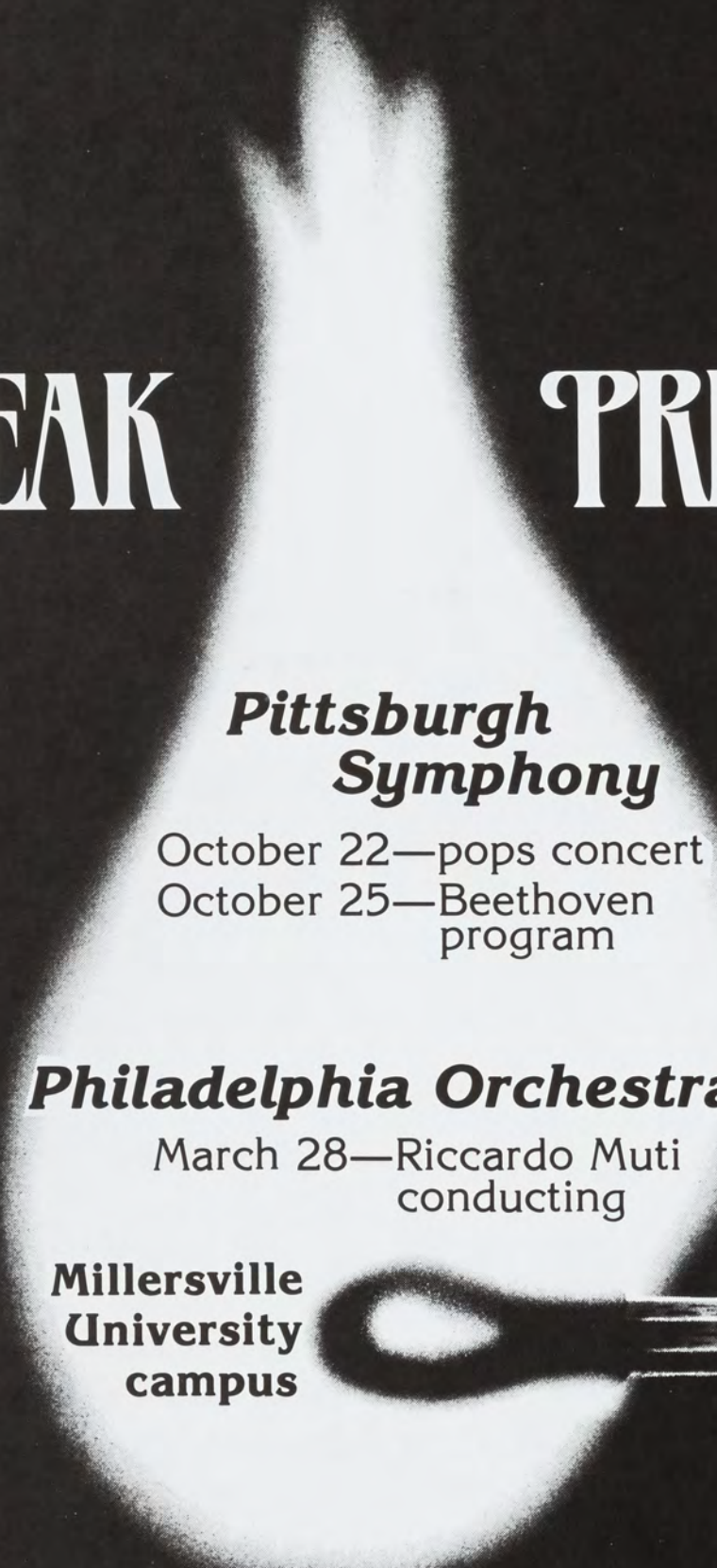

Campus News

Diverse Campus Events Fill MU Spring Calendar

Sid Caesar Performs

Sid Caesar, American television's celebrated comedian from the 50s, appeared on campus for a lecture and performance on April 18.

He entertained his audience with film clips from his legendary TV program, *Your Show of Shows*. Caesar's appearance was sponsored by the MU Cultural Affairs Committee.

John Kenneth Galbraith Was Christie Lecturer

John Kenneth Galbraith, one of the world's most distinguished economists, gave the Robert A. Christie Lecture on April 8.

Galbraith examined the philosophies and faults of three economic revolutions—Marxian, Rooseveltian and Keynesian—and warned about economic dangers in reducing American social programs.

Galbraith's visit to Millersville was cosponsored by the Commonwealth National Bank and the University. The lectureship honors the late Dr. Christie, who was MU president from 1965 to 1968.

630 Graduates Hear Richard Moll

Commencement speaker on May 10 was Richard Moll, the author of *The Public Ivys* and an expert on college admissions. He spoke to 630 graduates, and almost 5,000 parents and friends on the topic "The Daring to Commit."

Moll is now the executive director of legal personnel and external affairs for a New York City law firm. Recently he was dean of admissions at the University of California at Santa Cruz and has worked in the admissions offices of Vassar, Bowdoin and Yale.

Holocaust Conference

Millersville hosted its fifth annual Holocaust Conference April 6 and 7, bringing several national figures and outstanding scholars on the history of the Holocaust to campus.

Much interest was centered on Dr. Robert Herzstein, a South Carolina history professor who recently exposed U.S. National Archive files on former United Nations Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim.

Another speaker, David Wyman of the University of Massachusetts and author of an award winning book on the Holocaust, charged that both England and the United States government failed to try to stop the mass extermination of European Jews because neither government wanted Jewish refugees.

Dr. Vera Laska of Regis College spoke on the resistance of women during the Holocaust and Dr. Michael Marrus of the University of Toronto analyzed French Jewish leadership at that time.

Wildlife Conference

A special conference on wildlife preservation, entitled "Saving a Space for Wildlife," was held at Millersville May 3.

Sponsored by 12 conservation-oriented organizations and the University, the conference was designed to help Pennsylvanians understand their role in preserving the state's wildlife. The Pennsylvania Wildlife Federation coordinated the event which featured several speakers, workshops and demonstrations.

Infantry Encampment Reenacted On Campus

Military life during the Civil War era was depicted on campus by the 53rd Pennsylvania Volunteer Infan-

try Regiment March 22-23.

Sponsored by the MU history club, the encampment was set up by the 25-member regiment at the corner of East Frederick St. and Creek Drive.

Drills, performed in full dress uniform, were presented at several different times during the weekend and the camp was open for browsing by the public.

"We wanted to give people an opportunity to see what life was like for the Union Soldier during the Civil War," said program chair Robert Study, who also noted that students from the Millersville Normal School (now MU) fought with the regiment during the Civil War.

Philippines Situation Examined

Dr. Dante Simbulan, director of The Church Coalition for Human Rights in the Philippines, spoke on the problems in his country at an April 1 lecture on campus.

Sponsored by the MU Sigma Chapter of Phi Sigma Pi, the address centered on the current sociopolitical situation in the Philippines. Dr. Simbulan discussed the Marcos' dictatorship, human rights violations, and economic problems resulting from the Marcos government. He also talked about the problems President Aquino faces.

Historian Examines Lives of Early American Women

Dr. Mary Beth Norton, one of the nation's foremost historians of early American society, spoke at Millersville in March on "Gender and Society in Early America or Sex and Violence in 17th Century Maryland."

A professor at Cornell University, Dr. Norton most recently has concentrated her research on women's lives in the colonial period. Her book, *Liberty's Daughters: The Revolutionary Experience of American Women, 1750-1800*, won a 1980 history book award.

Dr. Norton also is known for the broad surveys she has coauthored on American history: *A People and a Nation* and *Women of America: A History*. 

Annual Fund at 86% of 1985-86 Goal

With approximately nine weeks remaining in the 1985-86 Annual Fund campaign, the University had reached 86 percent of its goal of \$310,000.

Alumni giving on April 15 was \$80,000, approximately 72 percent of the Loyalty Fund goal of \$110,000. Employee gifts totaled \$34,725, which was 75 percent of their goal of \$45,000.

Two major giving groups had surpassed goals. Friends had contributed \$19,571, almost twice the goal of \$10,000. Also the business and industry fund, which had a goal of \$14,000, had reached \$31,194.

Still short of goals were the Parents Fund which was at 81 percent of its \$6,000 goal and gifts from private foundations which were 78 percent of the \$124,000 goal.

Efforts during the final weeks to bring the Annual Fund in over goal included the April Phonathon, sending reminder notices to Phonathon pledgers, and by mailing a last minute reminder in the form of a Mail-Gram, which includes an envelope for sending back a check.

"Some alumni who have given

already may receive the Mail-Gram reminder," stated Regis Kirchner, Annual Fund director. "We do not have a record keeping system yet in place that can automatically remove alumni who have sent gifts from receiving subsequent appeals. I hope those who have given since last July will understand if they receive additional appeals and be assured that we are working on acquiring a system that will end this problem.

"I also urge all alumni and other friends of Millersville who have not made a gift in this campaign year please to do so prior to June 30 to ensure that we go over our goal for the third consecutive year.

"We also had set a goal of 800 new alumni givers. Although we are running ahead in the amount of income from alumni over last year, the number of alumni donors is lower now than it was at this time a year ago. We need to hear not only from faithful contributors but also from those who have yet to make their first gift. It is not the size of the gift that is important, but that as many alumni as possible participate in this important effort."

Millersville Alumnus Elected Foundation President

Daniel W. Shoemaker, a 1952 Millersville graduate and now an attorney in York, Pa. was elected president of the Millersville Foundation in January.

Shoemaker succeeds another MU alumnus, Menno B. Rohrer '31, who served as the foundation's president for the past four years.

Other officers re-elected to two-year terms were Earl M. Weber '48, vice president, and Frances K. Keller '45, secretary-treasurer.

In addition to officer elections, two persons were added to the foundation's board of directors and will serve for five years. They include William Bolger '38 and Robert D. Garner. Several board members also were re-elected to new five-year terms: Alan S. Holliday, who attended Millersville, and John F.S. Rees '38.

The Millersville Foundation now has approximately \$740,000 in principal funds invested through 104 different accounts.

Marine Science Consortium Offers Family Retreat Programs

The Marine Science Consortium, of which Millersville University is a founding member, is once again offering a summer family program at the Marine Science Center at Wallops Island, Va.

The program affords families an inexpensive way to spend several days among the marshes, forests and beaches of the barrier islands of the Eastern Shore. Program activities include a boat cruise, critter lab, forest walk, swimming, pony hunt, dune walk, bird hike, clam bake, marsh mucking, volley ball, beach combing, and sunbathing. Families may participate in as many or as few of the planned activities as they

choose or visit many of the nearby scenic and tourist attractions.

A five-day program is scheduled for August 18-22, and a four-day program is scheduled for August 29-September 1. Cost for adults ranges from \$59 to \$129 per person. Cost for children ranges from \$44 to \$99. All prices include activities, meals and lodging.

Maurey to Retire

Dr. James E. Maurey, dean of the school of education, has announced his retirement, effective January 2, 1987.

Maurey has been a member of the MU faculty for 28 years. When he first arrived on campus he served as professor of education and coach of the wrestling team. In 1965 he was appointed assistant director of student teaching and placement, and, in 1967, was named dean of the Education Division, later renamed the School of Education.

A Penn State University graduate, Maurey was a classroom teacher, administrator and wrestling coach at Thaddeus Stevens Trade School before coming to Millersville. Earlier, he taught in the State College Area School District.

Lovin Accepts Job in Colorado

Dr. Keith Lovin, vice president for academic affairs and provost at MU since 1981, will leave his post in July to take a top administrative position at the University of Southern Colorado.

He will be second in command at USC, with the title vice president for academic and student affairs.

Lovin, a native of New Mexico, came to Millersville from San Marcos, Texas, where he was Dean of Liberal Arts at Southwest Texas State University.

He said that the opportunity to move back to the Southwest was one factor in motivating him to accept the position.

"I have thoroughly enjoyed being at Millersville and will miss my associations with a lot of wonderful people. Leaving was not an easy decision," he stated.

"However, this offer not only opens up new professional opportunities which I am approaching eagerly, but allows me to return to a part of the country where I have roots and which I miss very much."

Faculty Death

Edmund Pribitkin, a MU mathematics professor for 17 years, died April 13 following a heart attack. He was 56.

A native of Russia, he had been president of the Congress of Russian-Americans since 1980 and often spoke out against the communism from which he had fled as a young man. He served on the board of directors of the Freedom Federation in Washington, D.C., and was a member of the Republican National Task Force.

Most recently at MU, he was teaching advanced calculus, statistics and linear algebra. While here, he designed a calculus course for science majors. Before coming to Millersville, he taught at Queens College in New York City.

Mrs. Dorwart Retires After 27 Years

Mrs. Ione Dorwart, health and physical education instructor at Millersville since 1959, retired at the end of the spring semester.

Most recently, Mrs. Dorwart coached synchronized swimming and served as adviser to the Dol-

phin Club which annually presents a synchronized swimming show. She also served as women's basketball coach from 1960-64 and as field hockey coach from 1964-67.

Prior to coming to Millersville she taught at Elizabethtown High School and at Lancaster Country Day School. She is a graduate of West Chester University.

Retired Bio Prof Writes Autobiography

Catherine Keever writes in her recently published book, *Moving On: a way of life*, "... I got a letter from Millersville State College offering me a job as a full professor at fifty-five hundred dollars a year. It was a teacher's college, they wanted someone with a Ph.D. in botany, and did not object to a woman."

She accepted the offer and in 1955 became the sixth member of the science department faculty as well as the first science professor at Millersville to hold a doctorate.

Catherine Keever stayed at Millersville for 19 years, during a time of unprecedented growth (enrollment mushroomed from 1,100 to 5,000 students) and curriculum diversification for the College. When she retired in 1974, she left behind the legacies of a beloved professor and colleague and a significant research botanist and ecologist. Her published papers still are frequently referred to by biology students in their own classroom research.

Moving On is a brief journey through Catherine Keever's life, from her birth in 1908 in the village of Olin, N.C. to her still-active retirement in Charlotte. She writes in nostalgic detail about her early years

as the daughter of a Methodist minister and about her time in college and graduate school.

Getting a college education was a foregone conclusion in the Keever family. All four children, two boys and two girls, received degrees, and the children's children (seven in all) each earned at least a bachelor's degree, including Dr. Keever's nephew Dr. Jan Shepherd, who is an associate professor of chemistry at MU.

Interspersed among tales of her family, her years as a student, and her experiences as a teacher and professor are Dr. Keever's recollections of her extensive travels, which began in the early 1930s when she, her sister and two other young women piled into the Rev. Mr. Keever's car and headed for California.

Her dauntless spirit and sense of adventure have allowed Dr. Keever to spend most of her life doing precisely what she set out to do—learn, teach and travel throughout the world. *Moving On* is an affectionate account of that life—a book that will rekindle fond memories of Catherine Keever within anyone who has known her.

Sports Review

Winter Sports

Millersville University athletic teams wound up the 1985-86 season on a high note.

The men's basketball team notched a 21-game consecutive game win streak over a two-month period and went on to share the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Eastern Division Title with arch rival Cheyney.

Coach John Kochan's Marauders advanced to the NCAA Division II East Regionals at Gannon University, but finished third in the tournament.

Junior center John Fox led the 24-6 cagers in scoring (14.5 ppg) and rebounding (10.4 rpg) and led the PSAC in field goal percentage (.593). Fox joined '70s All-American Phil Walker as the only Millersville basketball player to be selected to the All-PSAC first team in each of their first three varsity seasons. In addition, Fox moved to eighth place on the MU career scoring list with 1,343 points.

Another current member of the Marauders' "1,000-Point Club," junior guard Andrew Marshall, earned All-NCAA East Regional honors for his outstanding play against Gannon and Edinboro. The 6-3 Philadelphia averaged 14.5 points per game and 50 percent from the field. Both Marshall and junior forward Rob Lawton earned all-conference second team laurels.

Women's Basketball

Although the MU women's basketball team struggled to an 11-14 record, it celebrated the achievements of guard Peg Kauffman. The All-ECAC and All-PSAC junior became the fourth woman at Millersville to score 1,000 career points, and she set new club standards for points (477) and field goals (224) and averaged 19.1 points per outing.

Junior center Sue Heckler also contributed to the Marauders' cause with

a 13.6 scoring average and an impressive 52.1 field goal percent mark.

Wrestling

The Marauder wrestling program enjoyed its winningest season ever with an 18-6 record.

Coach Floyd Hitchcock's grapplers closed the campaign with an impressive third place finish at the NCAA Division I East Regional tournament at Kutztown.

Five Marauders finished among the top four in their respective weight classes, including 126-pound champion and national tournament qualifier Bryan Buddock.

The wrestler with the most wins this winter was 190-pound sophomore Mike Gardner, who posted an 18-0-1 dual meet record to complement an outstanding 33-8-1 overall mark. Gardner won 10 bouts by pins.

Swimming

The women's swimming and diving team was led by freshman Ellen Reilly, who qualified for the PSAC championship meet in four events and who earned all-conference honors in the 200 backstroke.

Indoor Track and Field

In women's indoor track and field, several Marauder competitors earned All-ECAC laurels: pentathlete Lizanne McNally, long distance runner Kris Andrews, and the two-mile relay team of Kris Lutz, Tanya Pina, Deb Harding, and Lori Zodi.

Outstanding performances also were turned in by the men's indoor squad. Junior Larry Levy set a new school record in the 5,000 meters, and he teamed with Craig Lowthert, David Barrow and Doug MacNeal to set a new team standard in the distance medley relay.

Spring Sports

Coach Joe Abromaitis's baseball team made a dramatic turnaround, from last year's 14-19-1 record to a 24-16 season which put them among the 1986 PSAC leaders.

The Marauders received exceptional contributions from senior co-captain Jim Mengle, a bonafide All-American candidate who batted

.455 and hit safely in 34 of 37 games. Leading an improved pitching corps was senior Neil Wiker (unbeaten in his first five decisions), junior Dave Hangen (3-0 with three saves), and sophomore Jay Dimler (5-2).

Lacrosse

The women's lacrosse team, coached by Barbara Waltman, was also in the running for post-season play. Sparked by All-American attacker Brenda Bannan, who earlier this season became the first Marauder to score 100 career goals, the Marauders finished third in the PSAC playoffs. Bannan was named to the All-State team.

Softball

An improved Millersville softball squad set a new club record for most victories in a year with 13 wins. Coach Donna Eshleman's batters hit an impressive .280, and Lynn Fry and Holly Snyder provided consistently good pitching.

Tennis

The Marauder men's tennis team, led by senior All-Americans Ted Snyder and Andy Stoner, finished third at the 19th annual PSAC tournament held at MU.

Golf

In golf, Pete Reckert and Steve Buterbaugh were the lowest scorers all season for Coach Scott Vandegrift's team. The team carded a 6-5 record.

Track and Field

Marauder track and field was successful for both men and women. Several candidates contended for national meet berths and several still had opportunities at press time for further competition. Junior sprinter Savana Pyett was second and third in the 100 and 200 meter events at the PSAC Championships. Senior distance runner Nancy Tang-Yuk and freshman heptathlete Lizanne McNally both turned in good seasons. Coach Joel Hoffsmith's best performers were senior sprinter Bruce Mannon, hurdler Dave Barrow, and distance specialists Craig Lowthert and Larry Levy.

\$250,000 Grant Awarded

Nursing Program, Lab Facilities Marked for Expansion

Millersville will begin to see more freshman nursing majors on campus in September, the result of an affiliation agreement recently negotiated with officials at the Lancaster General Hospital School of Nursing.

Under the agreement, all Lancaster General Hospital nursing students (approximately 80 new students a year), will take their science, math, humanities and social sciences courses at Millersville enroute to their R.N. diplomas. All clinical studies will continue to be taught at the hospital. The University has a similar affiliation program with St. Joseph Hospital in Lancaster.

The prospect of putting more students into the already crowded lab-based science courses, especially anatomy and physiology, created a potential crisis. University officials agreed to the affiliation on the condition that Lancaster General's School of Nursing work with Millersville to find funds to build an addition to Roddy Science Center.

The John Frederick Steinman Foundation in Lancaster responded affirmatively to a joint request from Millersville and the nursing school for a grant of \$250,000 to construct a wing onto Roddy which will house an anatomy and physiology laboratory, a classroom and faculty offices.

An additional \$100,000 needed to equip the facility will be split evenly between the University and the Lancaster General Hospital School of Nursing. Costs of adding additional faculty will be assumed by the University.

Dr. Albert Hoffman, MU dean of the School of Science and Mathematics, is pleased with the new program and the funding grant. He explained that the affiliation agreement will allow nursing students at Lancas-

ter General to earn 51 credits at Millersville and 24 clinical credits at the hospital and apply all 75 credits toward a degree at Millersville.

After receiving their licenses as registered nurses, Hoffman added, the School of Nursing graduates could enter MU's upper division nursing program, which leads to the bachelor of science in nursing degree. By going to school year-round, students could earn the BSN degree 12 months after completing their basic nursing education.

The affiliation was sought because the national accrediting agency for nursing education is pushing schools of nursing across the country to become affiliated with institutions of higher education and telling potential nurses that they should have the BSN degree to begin their careers. Many nursing and hospital administrators, however, are insisting that nurses cannot acquire a strong background solely in the University classroom, but also need the high quality clinical skills that can be acquired only through a close association with a hospital.

If Lancaster General had been unable, because of a lack of funding, to affiliate its School of Nursing program with a university, a shortage of nurses could have developed in Lancaster County. Throughout the country, there are fewer persons preparing for nursing careers and many schools of nursing affiliated only with hospitals, and not with colleges or universities, have closed. The two institutions agreed it was worthwhile to approach a locally-based foundation for help because of the widespread effect a nursing shortage would have in the greater Lancaster community.

Millersville alumna Margaret A. Judge, vice president of nursing

education at Lancaster General, said this affiliation "provides nursing students the best of both worlds; the benefit of Millersville's strong science and general education courses as well as the excellent nursing theory and clinical experience available at the Lancaster General Hospital School of Nursing. This background," she said, "will prepare nurses more effectively to meet the requirements of an increasingly dynamic health care environment."

Carol Phillips, chairperson of MU's nursing department, said that she, too, is pleased with the agreement and hopeful that a number of Lancaster General students, "once they become aware of our fine educational offerings, choose to continue working toward BSN degrees here."

Students from the nursing schools at both Lancaster General and St. Joseph hospitals will take such courses as biology, chemistry, psychology, sociology, nutrition, philosophy and English at Millersville.

"The courses are closely coordinated with Millersville University's upper division nursing program so nursing students can easily transfer all credits into the Millersville program," explained Hoffman.

The Steinman grant, which will come to Millersville in three installments, will enable Millersville to begin construction of the addition almost immediately.

To be located at the west end of the biology wing of Roddy, the addition will be approximately 87 feet long and 47 feet wide. A laboratory, classroom and prep room will be along the north wall of the addition. Six faculty offices will be across the corridor on the south wall.

However, Roddy still will be cramped even with the new laboratory and classroom. In planning stages now is a \$9 million major addition to the building which must be approved by the state legislature. Even if approval comes quickly, the addition won't be a reality for at least six to eight years.

The growth in the number of science majors in recent years has created a serious space problem in

Roddy, not only for scheduling all necessary classes and laboratories, but also for making laboratory facilities available to students and faculty for research and class preparation.

Ten years ago the number of majors in the School of Science and Mathematics totaled 650, making up less than 15 percent of the student body. Today, the number of science majors (not counting the underclass nursing students from the two hospitals) is 1,172, almost 25 percent of the full-time undergraduate student body.

The John Frederick Steinman Foundation is one of two philanthropic foundations, created in 1951, by brothers John F. and James Hale Steinman, both deceased, who owned the three Lancaster newspapers. The request for the grant was made by Paul Wedel, president of Lancaster General Hospital, and President Caputo of Millersville University. Both have indicated their appreciation to the Foundation for its gift, which will meet an important need in the Lancaster community.

It was Millersville's first effort to combine informal career and college counseling for minority students with a day of service and fun for black alumni.

The event—Minority Career Day—was part of the University's annual Career Week, in February, sponsored by the Career Counseling and Placement Center.

Dr. Ralph Anttonen, now the University retention officer, volunteered to help with the activity and to organize an evening banquet for black alumni and students.

Black alumni, for whom addresses are known, were invited to attend—some to serve as resource persons at the career workshops.

The day's activities started with an informal luncheon followed by a variety of workshops where alumni shared career options and discussed with student and college officials some of the special concerns of minority students.

The workshops were offered in two tracks so that students could attend two different programs. Those involved in the program reported that student interest in talking to minority alumni was high and that all programs were well attended.

The afternoon ended with an informal reception, followed by the banquet, where Kevin Dixon '81 served as master of ceremonies. (He was accompanied by his wife, Melanye, a dance instructor and doctoral candidate at Temple University.) Kevin works in the adult education program at Temple and also does news reporting and is host for a Sunday morning show on WDAS-FM in Philadelphia.

Banquet speakers included President Joseph Caputo and Dr. Anttonen, both of whom hoped that this event would be the first of many similar activities in the future.

Following the dinner, many alumni and students attended a basketball game where Millersville was competing for the right to play for the state championship.

Introduced at the game was one of Millersville's most outstanding former basketball stars, Phil Walker '77, who now works for an insurance firm in Philadelphia.

Because alumni came to various functions throughout the day, incomplete registration records are available on who was present. Best estimates are that between 55 and 60 minority alumni attended one or more events and an equal number of students participated in the workshop activities.

Women's Athletics at Millersville, A Story of Growth and Success

From athletic carnivals in the 1890s to a national championship in 1982, women's athletics at Millersville has always been a program with a pioneer spirit.

The origins of women's sports at Millersville date back to the 1890s, when there were two student exhibitions, fall and spring, at the Normal School each year. The exhibitions, called "athletic carnivals," featured the ladies performing "exercises and aesthetic movements" under the direction of one Miss Fleming.

From an anonymous diary of the era, it was learned that in 1898, apparatus work and Swedish gymnastics were popular exercises for the MSNS women.

Professor Albert D. Pinkham helped shape a philosophy for the role of athletics for both sexes in an academic setting. A "manager" of the varsity men's basketball team in the early 1900s, Professor Pinkham, who was a forerunner of today's athletic director, said, "We are attempting to develop sound bodies through exercise to reap the best results of a well-trained mind." His words still ring true today, but few from that era could have envisioned what lay ahead, particularly for the women!

Basketball Debuts

Women's intercollegiate competition at Millersville began in 1919 with the debut of the basketball program under Coach Gordan Granger. In its first contest, the Normal School defeated Strasburg High School, 38-3, and finished with a 2-1 season record.

In the 1920s, playing mostly against high schools and area YWCA squads, Normal School women's basketball teams were successful with a 72 percent winning mark. The 1925-26 team, coached by Wilma Trimble, achieved the program's only undefeated season (8-0) and was followed the next year by a 12-1 record under Lucille "Billy" Wilcox. The 12 victories stood as a team record for the next 53 years.

After the 1927-28 season, however, the scholastic program for women was discontinued, and intramural athletics in basketball, archery and field hockey were substituted.

After World War II, Physical Education Instructor Katherine E. Griffith not only reinstituted women's intercollegiate basketball, but also introduced field hockey as a new Millersville varsity sport. In

her six years as head coach of both sports, she provided the leadership and stability that created for women's intercollegiate athletics the firm foundation that made today's program possible.

In 1958, Dr. Raymond J. Runkle, then Millersville's athletic director, added women's tennis to the list of varsity sports.

In the fall of 1964, Dr. Runkle contacted Mrs. Marjorie A. Trout, who was a gym teacher at McCaskey High School, and convinced her to join the Millersville faculty and be women's basketball coach. She agreed and held the post of head coach here for 12 seasons, the longest tenure of any woman coach at Millersville. During that time, her teams were 99-54 with eight winning seasons. Her best squads were in 1969-70 (12-1) and in 1970-71 (13-4), the latter quintet becoming the first Marauder women's team to

play in a post-season tournament.

Mrs. Trout became the first lacrosse coach in 1967 and served for 12 years. Her expertise in that sport provided the foundation for the team's remarkable success during the 1980s, including Millersville's first and only women's team national championship, the 1982 AIAW Division III crown under Coach Barbara Waltman.

However, it is in the role of administrator that Mrs. Trout has made the greatest impact on the growth of Millersville women's athletics. Since her appointment as

a physical education instructor in 1964, she has been at the forefront for athletic equity for women from the institutional to the national levels.

The catalyst that spurred the remarkable growth in women's athletics occurred in 1972, when the U.S. Congress approved Title IX regulations banning sex discrimination at all educational institutions

that receive federal funds. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare (now the U.S. Department of Education), the enforcement agency for the new regulations, indicated that all schools had until July, 1978 to bring their academic and athletic policies into compliance with Title IX.

Title IX had far-reaching implications for almost all of the nation's colleges and universities, including Millersville. It meant a general increase in the size and scope of the total athletic program and, with it, an expansion of staffing, budget, and facilities.

It was difficult for most institutions to follow the "letter of the law" to comply with Title IX for two major reasons:

First, there was concern over the implementation of the federal guidelines because of a lack of clarity and understanding in the regulations' meaning. At first, the guidelines did not take into account existing athletic programs or the philosophical differences between men's and women's athletics.

"When Title IX passed, the philosophy of the women's program was primarily fun and games," says Mrs. Trout. "Some of our alumni might remember the 'play days' we used to have; we never had the degree of intercollegiate competition we have today."

There also was concern among many men's athletic programs (and within the NCAA) that funds from the "revenue-producing" sports, (i.e., football and basketball) would be used to support fledgling women's programs. It was felt that the existence of those men's programs could not be altered immediately by an interpretation of written law.

Second, the policies and practices of Millersville's athletics program at the outset of Title IX did not lend themselves to equality in many respects. It did not necessarily follow that "equal opportunity" was comparable to "equal budget, equal facilities, etc.," particularly as budgets tightened in the wake of the 1970s economic recession.

Title IX Takes Hold

To meet the federal government's requirements for compliance, Millersville's administration used a

pragmatic, realistic approach.

In 1974, President Dr. William H. Duncan appointed Mrs. Trout as Director of Equal Opportunity in Sports to ensure equal rights for the institution's women's athletic program. The position, designed by the Pennsylvania Department of Education, ensured that all state college athletic activities conformed with state and federal compliance dictates.

"Budgets were tight back then, but that did not stop the women's program from expanding," says Mrs. Trout. "We met the interests of our students. We kept things practical and did not go overboard. A sport was not started unless we could run it exactly the way it should be run. We did not expand until we had evidence of student interest, the proper coaching personnel, and the funding from the University. When we expanded our

women's sports program, it was the University's intent to run each sport the same as the others, with equitability and fairness."

In her role as equal opportunity director, Mrs. Trout helped set in motion a chain of events designed to achieve compliance. From 1975 to 1979, the number of varsity women's sports more than doubled from four to nine, as swimming, softball, synchronized swimming, track and field, and archery were added (a 10th sport, cross country, was added in 1981). The number of coaching positions both full- and

- 1919**— Basketball becomes the first women's varsity sport at Millersville State Normal School. The coach was Gordan Granger, who also coached the men's basketball team.

Mrs. Trout relinquishes varsity basketball coaching duties after a successful 12-year tenure to assume administrative responsibilities.
- 1978**— The Women's athletic program is given a budget allocation separate from the men's.
Archery and track and field achieve varsity status.
Mrs. Trout reports that MSC has met the federal guidelines for compliance with Title IX. She is named associate director of athletics with responsibility for the administration of the College's women's intercollegiate athletic program.

part-time grew from six to 16; student participation skyrocketed 252 percent; total intercollegiate contests scheduled were doubled; and allocation of funds to women's athletics from student activity fees increased nearly 200 percent from \$12,500 to \$35,000. In addition, inequities were corrected in equipment and uniforms, housing and diet, and professional clerical assistance.

"During our expansion efforts, the University placed high priority on renovating Brooks Hall; it was a major step forward," says Mrs. Trout. By 1978, Brooks had increased office space, refurbished locker rooms, and established two new, fully-equipped facilities: a medical training room and a weight-flexibility training room.

Also in 1978, the women's athletic program was accorded its own

1982— Susan Rorison wins the 50-yard backstroke at AIAW Division III nationals. She and Stephanie Tulaney (50-yard butterfly) are named All-Americans.

Joyce VanGinhoven finishes fifth in the heptathlon at the AIAW national track meet to garner All-American honors.

The basketball squad, coached by Debra Schlegel, becomes the first team ever to amass 20 victories in a season. Led by all-star standout Darlene Newman, Millersville wins the AIAW East Regional championship and finishes fourth in the Division III national tournament. Newman earns all-tournament laurels.

Coached by Millersville alumna Barbara Waltman, the lacrosse team captures the AIAW Division III national championship, led by standout attacker Joan Aker and all-national tournament team performers Terry Geno, Michele Savino, Becky Grady and Gail Glowitz. It is the first national championship for Millersville women.

Millersville women's athletics joins the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) as a member in Division II. An active campaign begins to increase scholarship grant-in-aid funds for Millersville student-athletes.

1983— Darlene Newman becomes the first Millersville cager to score 1,000 career points. She leads the 1982-83 squad to an impressive 17-4 season record and finishes her four-year career with 1,318 points and 906 rebounds.

1984— MU women's basketball wins its first PSAC championship. Forward Amy Gipprich, the second woman to score more than 1,000 points, is chosen Most Outstanding Player of the tournament. The 17-9 Marauders earn their first invitation to an NCAA post-season tourney.

1985— All-America center Shelly Bowie concludes her basketball career as Millersville's new leader both in career scoring (1,463 points) and rebounding (971). She is selected as the Eastern College Conference's Division II Co-Player of the Year.

Track sprinter Savena Pyett wins the PSAC 100 and 200 meters for the second straight year.

Sandra Peters is named assistant to the director of women's athletics with responsibilities for academic advisement and counseling for Millersville's student-athletes.

Carol Miller assumes the field hockey coaching post.

Marauder field hockey captures its first PSAC and NCAA Division III regional championships and comes within one victory of a national championship. Diane Espenshade and Coleen Sieg are named All-Americans.

Brenda Bannan is named an All-American in lacrosse.

Nancy Tang-Yuk caps a standout cross-country career by earning All-American honors at the NCAA Division III national meet where she finishes 17th.

1986— Peg Kauffman becomes MU's fourth woman basketball player to score 1,000 career points and breaks Shelly Bowie's season scoring mark with 477.

Brenda Bannan scores her 100th lacrosse goal to become the all-time MU scorer, surpassing Joan Aker.

budget, separate from the men's.

"The rationale behind this administrative decision was that it was more practical to promote women's athletics without sacrificing the existing men's programs," Mrs. Trout explains. "We did not want to rob Peter to pay Paul, and I can truthfully say that the men's and women's programs not only have co-existed, but also have prospered. We have never had to take funds

from men's athletics because of the support given us by the administration." Mrs. Trout adds, "A question that was raised when we formed separate men's and women's athletic departments was, 'How can you have two directors of athletics?' But, it has worked at Millersville because both Dr. Gene Carpenter (the men's athletic director) and I keep lines of communication open, and work together to help each

other's departments meet its needs. The key is to communicate and listen, and I feel that both of our departments have been successful."

The creation of the Department of Women's Athletics at Millersville five years ago was a milestone because it provided the autonomy for women to pursue equality in budgetary matters, staffing, and the increased spectre of scholarships. Thus, MU became the first, and remains the only, institution in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference to have the distinction of a separate department.

The growth of the scholarship program in Millersville women's athletics is worth noting. Mrs. Trout says, "Back at the outset of Title IX, there were no scholarships for women. We were under the auspices of the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), which was the main national governing body during the '70s. We did not give any scholarship aid. But, we were compelled to upgrade our aid program because the men were giving them.

"Again, it goes back to philosophical differences. For many years, women's sports were primarily for participation and fun, and scholarships did not fit into that approach. However, Title IX caused a ripple effect that is still being felt today.

"In 1981-82, we initiated two junior athletic scholarships (\$100 awards each) which were given to student-athletes for their senior year. Those funds I raised myself. But, in the last five years, the growth of our scholarship program has been noteworthy."

When the women's athletic program joined the NCAA in the fall of 1982 it upgraded its status from Division III, where financial aid is based solely on student need, to Division II, where need is not a factor. The amount of money available for financial aid (raised by the coaches and given by alumni, parents, faculty and staff) rose dramatically from \$200 in 1982 to \$5,000 today. That figure is expected to increase in the future.

"The size of awards given to students is \$100 to \$200. There are no 'full-ride' student-athletes in our women's program," says Mrs. Trout. "However, some full scholarship aid is a long-range goal for us. Our coaches are making the effort to raise funds to help Millersville attract quality individuals who can contribute both in the classroom and on the playing field."

The two primary funding sources for Millersville's women's athletics program are the state university

budget, which covers salaries, office expenses, and facility maintenance and construction; and student senate allocation fees, which cover the majority of each student-athlete's day-to-day expenses for meals, travel, lodging, equipment and uniforms. The student fees also fund scouting, recruiting and clinic expenses.

Trout Breaks New Ground

A major step forward for the growth of the Millersville women's sports program came in 1978 when the PSAC appointed Mrs. Trout president—the first woman to lead a conference with men's and women's intercollegiate teams. She helped create the first formal conference championship for women (basketball in 1980). Because of her continued interest and support, PSAC women's championships have shown a remarkable increase in just six years. Today, the PSAC holds post-season tournament competition in basketball, tennis, field hockey, lacrosse, cross country, volleyball, gymnastics, swimming and diving, track and field, and softball.

In addition, support for increased media coverage has come from the conference's executive committee, as weekly statistics are supplied to the state's media outlets for women's basketball, field hockey, and softball.

"I am proud of our affiliation with the PSAC because it is one of the strongest and most competitive leagues in the country," Mrs. Trout says. "I am pleased that we have

been competitive among our 13 sister schools despite a disparity in scholarship aid. For example, when we won the 1984 PSAC basketball championship, our team as a whole received but \$800 in total aid, and one of the other four finalists had a total aid package of \$8,000."

What does the future hold for Millersville women's athletics? If its growth and development since Title IX is an indication, the prospects for prosperity are strong.

According to Mrs. Trout, there is always room for improvement. "I want to provide our student-athletes with an even better program. I want to see our scholarship aid increase, and it is a goal of mine to have intercollegiate volleyball added as a fall sport since we are one of only two schools in the conference that does not have a varsity team.

"There is always the need to improve facilities. We had a major renovation of Brooks field hockey and lacrosse field in 1981, but I feel we are two or three years away from making it a first-class facility. And, with the administration's help, we would like to add more intramural and recreational fields."

Millersville women's athletics has blazed a trail characterized by pride and tradition. It is that pioneer attitude adopted more than 80 years ago that will be the guiding force for years to come. 

IA Education to Share Spotlight with Technology Major

Millersville's nationally recognized program in industrial arts education has brought thousands of students to Millersville and produced 3,000 graduates to date, the majority of whom went on to careers in teaching.

However, in recent years, an increasing percentage of industrial arts graduates have been faced with an alternate career decision: to teach or to accept a position in industry.

Today, approximately one-third of all new industrial arts graduates—despite their preparation for teaching—are taking management and technical positions in business and industry.

Beginning soon—perhaps as early as September—students will be able to select a nonteaching degree program leading to a bachelor of science in industrial technology.

Now awaiting approval in Harrisburg is a proposed major in industrial technology which would give students the background to enter business or industry with a specialty in a field of their choice.

The change is a dramatic one for Millersville's industrial arts program which has been in existence since 1930 and has been evaluated many times as one of the country's best. The faculty realize that the number of noneducation majors probably will increase to 50 percent of the majors. But, they are taking steps to prepare for the new emphasis in technology the future will bring.

Already, the name of the department has been changed. It is now the Department of Industry and Technology.

New equipment, valued at \$100,000, has been ordered

in anticipation of industrial technology program approval. Some minor conversions of facilities in Osburn Hall will be necessary to install the equipment.

According to Department Chairperson Phil Wynn, the new equipment soon to arrive on campus includes a computer-assisted drafting machine with eight learning stations, a computer-controlled milling machine and additional phototype composition equipment for the graphic arts lab.

Wynn says that no expansion of Osburn Hall is necessary, but offices and classroom areas will be renovated to provide clean operating space and security for computer equipment as well as to accommodate other new teaching aids.

No new faculty will have to be hired to run the proposed program, according to Wynn. "But," he says, "when some current faculty retire, they will be replaced with instructors who have specialties more similar to the courses that would be taught in the technology program."

An advisory council, consisting of representatives from the University and area industries, is being formed to counsel the University on local industry employment needs and

to offer advice on the technical aspects of the program, according to Wynn.

Industrial arts education graduates from MU already are employed at Armstrong World Industries, AMP, Donnelley Printing Company, Hamilton Technology, RCA and Trojan Yacht. Many more local industry positions for graduates are anticipated as the new program develops.

The industrial technology program would give students broad academic and technical experiences in four areas: design, production, management and administration.

"Students completing the technology major would be prepared for a variety of mid-management positions dealing with production and design, as well as other industrial

functions that bridge the gap between engineering and manufacturing," explains Wynn.

"More specifically, students would be prepared to enter electronics, graphic arts and other manufacturing fields, as well as to supervise industrial training programs and to work in executive or technical sales positions."

Founded in 1930, Millersville's industrial arts program has been honored many times. In March, it was chosen as one of the top five programs to be used as a model for industrial arts/teacher education.

In recent years, however, many students who go through the program seek employment in the private sector rather

Keeping Pace with Modern Technology

Millersville's Department of Industry and Technology has graduated more than 3,000 persons with degrees in industrial arts education since the original program began in 1930.

Over the years, the traditional courses in woodworking, metalcrafting and drafting were augmented with courses in plastics and synthetics, electricity, graphic arts and photography.

In the past 10 years, traditional areas of instruction have been deemphasized and courses in linear and digital electronics, aviation-aerospace education, power technology, hydraulics and fluidics have been added to keep pace with emerging industrial technology.

Today, MU's industrial arts education program is the foremost in the state, graduating between 90 and 100 persons each year, more than any other university. Of the 275 programs in the U.S. that are similar to Millersville's, according to Department Chairperson Philip Wynn, MU ranks in the top 10 in size.

MU's national prominence in industrial arts is not limited either to its outstanding curriculum or to the number of students it graduates. Many members of MU's faculty have been highly active and influential in the American Industrial Arts Association (AIAA) beginning with Dr. Burl Osburn, who served as the organization's first president from Pennsylvania. He was chairperson of MU's industrial arts department from 1941 to 1962.

than in teaching.

"While teacher salaries average about \$16,000 a year in this field, many of our students are attracted to other professions by starting salaries ranging from \$16,000 to \$24,000 or more," says Wynn.

The industry and technology department currently has facilities and faculty for 400 majors. Wynn expects about half this number eventually to be enrolled in industrial technology.

Currently, 325 undergraduate students are majoring in industrial arts education, 40 students are seeking master's degrees in this major, and 60 students are enrolled in an occupational safety and hygiene management program, which is supervised by the department.

When the new program is in place, 127 credits will be needed for a degree in industrial technology, including 60 credits of general education courses, required courses in industrial materials, visual communications and power technology, and 33 credits of electives in technical courses. Students also will have the opportunity to complete an industrial internship.

Before Millersville's industrial technology major is instituted, approval by the Board of Governors of the State System of Higher Education (SSHE) is necessary. SSHE officials and MU administrators are still discussing certain aspects of the proposed program. If all matters are settled and approval comes during the summer, the new degree program could be open to students when school starts in the fall.

Two Bequests from '23 Alumni Bring \$244,000 to Millersville

Millersville University recently received bequests from two alumni, both members of the Class of 1923.

A bequest of \$195,600 came to Millersville from the estate of Hazel B. Tucker Messner, who died in 1984. The unrestricted bequest is believed to be the largest ever made to the University. Mrs. Messner had spent 40 years as an elementary teacher in Sunbury, Pa.

Another bequest of \$49,026 came from the estate of Myra S. Main, who lived in Philadelphia at the time of her death in 1984. The gift was designated to support the University library.

The University will reserve the

funds from the Messner bequest to help with the renovations and addition to the Alumni House. When completed, the building will provide alumni meeting rooms and offices for the University Advancement staff, including alumni affairs, public relations and development. Plans call for a two-story addition at the back of the building; additional funds are being sought to complete the total project.

Hazel Tucker Messner was a native of New Jersey who grew up in Sunbury and Newport, Pa. After completing her two-year certification program at Millersville, she moved back to Sunbury and taught second and third grades there until retiring in 1963. She was married to William Messner who preceded her in death. The couple had no children. At the time of her death, at age 82, she was living in Newport.

Life in a Fishbowl— It Grows on You

In my last column, I mentioned that one of the questions I'm most frequently asked is, "How do you like living in a fishbowl?" The question, of course, refers to the fact that my family and I live in the President's Residence in the center of campus, just off the edge of the lake, and less than 50 yards from two of the University's dormitories.

When we first came to campus, we did sense a distinct lack of privacy. There seemed to be "eyes" watching as we puttered in the garden or just sat on the patio enjoying the sunshine. I remember one spring Saturday in 1981 when my wife, Linda, and I were planting our first vegetable garden at Millersville. Some students in Guy Bard Residence Hall had turned their speakers outward at the windows and were blaring music for all to enjoy. Each time we walked out the back door after having been indoors for a few minutes the volume of the music would suddenly be turned very low and remain low while we were outdoors, and then when we returned to the house the volume went back up. It was a strange feeling. Someone was watching!

We learned in our first year not to change into our pajamas until just before bedtime. And we learned that bedtime shouldn't come before midnight. You just can't predict when a student will decide that he or she needs to speak to the President—right now! Sometimes such visits are just for fun to "meet the President," sometimes as part of a dare, sometimes out of a deep personal need at a time of crisis. Over

time we've come to enjoy our unexpected and occasionally untimely visits from students. It's now part of the fun of living on campus. And, when students come for help, advice, or counseling, they are actually giving us the opportunity to be of caring assistance.

The occasional visitors, be they the friendly or curious, those in need of help, the Christmas carolers, or the pranksters, are but one aspect of campus life. By living on campus, the President is a presence at all times of day and night, on weekends, during holidays, when classes are not in session as well as when they are. Being on campus all the time gives me a sense of oneness with the institution—it makes the University a home as well as a place of business. The nightly walks Linda and I take with our cocker spaniel, Shadow, have given us the opportunity to interact with literally hundreds of students as they pet the dog and tell us how cute he is, while he rolls over on his back seeking more affection. Few students can resist rubbing his tummy while engaging us in brief conversation.

I believe the students are aware, even if only vaguely, that we're here. I would have it no other way. Given a choice, I would choose again to live on campus.
