ANDREW SLACK

Mr. Andrew Slack is a pioneer in transforming storytelling into advocacy and fandom into a force for human rights and social change. As co-founder of the Harry Potter Alliance, he spent a decade inspiring over a million fans to become activists, using the power of shared stories to connect people across cultures, build empathy, and spark real-world action. From linking The Hunger Games to economic inequality, Superman to immigrant rights, and Star Wars to democracy reform, his innovative campaigns have won major victories and fostered grassroots movements in over 30 countries—earning him fellowships at Ashoka, the Nathan Cummings Foundation, and Civic Hall, as well as Millersville University's Distinguished Civic Leadership Award.

Andrew's work has been featured in over 100 major news outlets, from The New York Times and The New Yorker to Comedy Central and People Magazine. Beyond storytelling, Andrew has helped reshape major philanthropic and civic initiatives. His ideas influenced a \$65 million MacArthur Foundation initiative on digital learning and civic engagement, and he has advised organizations such as Ford Foundation and Atlantic Philanthropies on using narrative strategy to advance human rights. He has served as a creative consultant with clients ranging from Netflix and the executive producer of a major Apple TV series to the Teamsters and a winning reproductive rights initiative in Europe.

As a narrative strategist for Avaaz, a global civic organization with over 69 million members, he mobilized Leonardo DiCaprio, Pedro Pascal, Meryl Streep, Mark Ruffalo, Don Cheadle, and Rosario Dawson, alongside political leaders, to champion prodemocracy, climate action, and human dignity. His advocacy for Indigenous peoples in the Amazon has not only drawn international media attention but also elicited responses from three sitting heads of state and helped prevent a "genocide bill" targeting Indigenous communities in Peru.



Andrew is also a content producer, with his videos reaching over 100 million views. He is the co-author of Save Santa's Home, a children's book that playfully inspires young people to advocate for climate action.

Ultimately, Andrew is dedicated to harnessing the power of stories, imagination, and human connection to build a more just and compassionate world.

He lives in Philadelphia, PA, with his wife and son.
