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
SENIORS CONT.





STORM CHASER AND HONORS STUDENT: SAM LEPPO FEATURE

Interview Conducted by Claire DeVinney

Sam Leppo is a junior Meteorology major in the Honors College who tracked and followed Hurricane Ida. He reflects on his experiences below.

Q: Hurricane Ida happened late this summer, and you were in New Jersey working on a meteorology project. Can you talk about how you came to be there and what kind of work you were doing?

A: "It actually was a thing that a couple of friends and I decided to do. We were looking at some data and some models, just seeing what was going on. We actually weren't going to go out to New Jersey at first. We started around Rising Sun, Maryland, and then we saw that there was a chance for some more storms out in New Jersey later that night, so we made the drive and we ended up chasing the tornado."


Q: What kind of effect did you see the hurricane have on the area?



A: "There was a bit of flooding. The tornadoes and the storms that spawned from the hurricane were the biggest things. The outer bands of the hurricane were spawning some storms, and with those storms, we were getting some tornadoes, and there was an EF3 (severe level tornado) in the area we were in. There was a lot of wind damage. There were some roofs that were taken off of houses. There was one house that was completely destroyed and a lot of power lines down."

Q: You ended up helping residents who had suffered home loss or home damage. How did you get involved in that, and what kind of work did you do?

A: "We ended up there before any emergency personnel because we were tailing the tornado. We were driving right behind it and ended up in the neighborhood. At first, we were driving around checking on everyone and making sure everyone was okay, which it seemed like most people were. A lot of people weren't home at the time. There was a

kid we were talking to that was on his way home from football practice. His car got lifted and dropped, and he said that he experienced weightlessness for a second. His car was badly damaged —the trunk was flipped over the back. We ended up giving him a ride home."

Q: What did you learn as a meteorologist and as a student from your experiences?

A: "On a personal level, I would say that this is something every meteorology major should experience. Obviously, be safe about it. Have a crew together and a good navigation system. I had four buddies in the car with me that were telling me which way to go and what direction to head, just to stay safe. Learn to stay on the southeast side of a tornado. It was worth it, and it was something that every meteorology major should get to experience."

Q: Anything else that you want to share about your experience?

A: "Listen to emergency personnel. Listen to the National Weather Service. If they issue a warning, take it seriously. There were a lot of people we talked to who said that they didn't believe it at first. They ended up being okay, but they did see the storm."
