## **ADVICE FROM HONORS STUDENTS**

#### **Current Honors students share their summer opportunities and advice for incoming students!**



#### Elias Peluso is a senior majoring in Robotics and Control Systems Technology.

What is Elias doing this summer? "This summer, I am working as a paraprofessional at my elementary school's summer camp program, and I am returning to Millersville early this Fall to resume work as an Admissions tour guide on The Crew. Aside from this, I have not yet engaged in any robotics major-related jobs, but this summer I am beginning preliminary research for my robotics thesis project."

**Elias's advice for incoming students:** "To incoming students, my advice would be this: don't be afraid to ask for help. Whether you're struggling with course registration or simply need help working the oven, I have found that Millersville's community of students is exceedingly friendly and helpful. In addition to this, Millersville offers almost any resource you could need both online and in person. You may be surprised by both the amount and the utility of Millersville's events and offices."

**Elias's advice about the first semester:** "An important distinction I would like to make is that college is not like high school. While most high school classes are strictly cut and dry, college courses are much more diverse in structure depending on the

discipline and the professor. To be successful in your first semester, I would establish clear communication with your professors so you understand exactly what is expected of you and what the outcome of the course will be."

What is Natalie doing this summer? "I am currently working on my thesis project, which is studying social-emotional learning and instructional strategies in the English Language Arts classroom. In addition to my thesis, I am also taking a summer 2 class in Applied Linguistics to complete my minor."

**Natalie's advice for incoming students:** "Might sound a little crazy but bring rain boots! You will want them! More seriously though, college is what you make of it, so don't forget to step outside your room and make connections with fellow students and professors. Find a club or two to get involved in, and try to push yourself outside your comfort zones little by little."

**Natalie's advice about the first semester:** "Connect with your professors! One of the best things I did my first semester was starting to go to professors' office hours. They are there to help you, but can also be a great resource for your future (and maybe even a thesis advisor)!"





#### Rebekah Holmes is a junior majoring in Anthropology and Archaeology.

**What is Rebekah doing this summer?** "I am interning at my town museum, working in collection management, photography, researching, and database work. I also am working on small projects and exhibit work. The photo is me with a painting of our town legend, 'The Leatherman.'"

**Rebekah's advice for incoming students:** "Get to know the professors in your major. Having a connection with those in your field will be more helpful and supportive than any club or activity."

**Rebekah's advice about the first semester:** "Go to class and do your work. This is your introduction. It will be an adjustment, but going to class and finishing assignments will get you into a habit—one that your future self will appreciate."

Noelle Htwar is a junior majoring in Early Childhood Education and minoring in STEM Integration.

**What is Noelle doing this summer?** "This summer I am working on my thesis! I have decided to write a children's book highlighting families and their diversities."

**Noelle's advice about the first semester:** "Make sure to stay organized! Don't stress about your thesis but keep it in the back of your mind. If there is a topic you're really passionate about, start thinking how you could incorporate that into a thesis. The thesis is a lot more fun if you do something you are passionate about!"

## ADVICE FROM HONORS STUDENTS CONT.


Bronte Angelica Spidaliere is a senior majoring in International Business and minoring in Psychology.

**Bronte's advice for incoming students:** "I would say go easy on yourself. Show patience and kindness towards yourself and new faces you'll meet, as all incoming students are experiencing the same mixed feeling of nervousness and anxiousness, as well as excitement, and thrill in this new environment."

**Bronte's advice about the first semester:** "To ensure the successful completion of your first college semester, I recommend writing in a daily planner or journal for all your classes, appointments, events, extracurriculars, and most significantly, self-care time."

**What is Jillian doing this summer?** "This summer I am doing a few things related to life at MU. First, I have been doing academic research

for my thesis project - lots and lots of reading books and journals. My thesis project is focused on early European contact with Indigenous women in the 15th and 16th centuries. I am taking HIST 242: Soviet Union with Dr. Khiterer over the summer. Class just started this week, but I am excited for what's to come. What is Alanna doing this summer? "I just got back from Iceland! I took Dr. Litowitz's Summer 1 (P) course in Energy Sustainability, in which the last 10 days of class take place abroad. Nine other students and I traveled around the country in a 12-passenger van, staying in a new hostel each night. While here, I went on many hikes, played fútbol with local children, toured a glacier, went on a whale watching boat and horseback riding, and even tried fermented Greenland shark...a delicacy only found in Iceland.
