During his first visit, Noah served as a special judge for the **Entrepreneurship** program's annual 60 Second Pitch competition, where students give elevator pitches for their business concepts. During his second visit, Noah coached the students as they refined their presentations with honest, constructive feedback.

Feedback from students was overwhelmingly positive, with one stating "[H]e made me think a lot about where I want my life to go and to get serious about pursuing my passions."

After placing in the regional competition, students in the Middle Eastern Studies Organization (MESO) were invited to participate in the National University Model Arab League in Washington, D.C. in April. The students represented Lebanon, a small country on the Mediterranean Sea north of Israel and west of Syria.



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Oscar Award-winning screenwriter leads masterclasses

Academy Award Winner and University of Kansas Professor Kevin Willmott visited campus in November to inform and inspire AHSS' students.

Willmott and his co-authors, Spike Lee, Charlie Wachtel, and David Rabinowitz won an Academy Award in the category "Best Adapted Screenplay" for the 2018 movie "BlacKkKlansman." Based on the book "Black Klansman" by Ron Stallworth, the film is about the first African American police officer in Colorado Springs, Colorado becoming a member of the KKK as part of his detective work.

Willmott visited classes while on campus to speak on his areas of interest in writing, producing and directing films, as well as his interest in the history and representation of African Americans in film. Additionally, he spoke to faculty and students throughout the day, sharing lunch and dinner with faculty, students and alums in African American Studies, Media and Broadcasting, Public Relations, English, and Film Studies.

Willmott was invited at the suggestion of Dr. Rita Smith Wade-El, who found his "Confederate States of America" an important film for students in African American studies to see.


Noted painter Amy Sherald critiques student work

Professor produces award objects for Governor's Awards for the Arts

Prof. Heidi Leitzke, Assistant Professor of Art & Design and Director of the Eckert Art Gallery, was commissioned by the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts to produce six award objects for the 2018 Governor's Awards for the Arts.

Her project for the Governor's Awards for the Arts grows directly out of her recent work, inspired by the idea of what one might discover in a cross-pollinated secret garden.

Five of the awards were given out at a ceremony in Scranton. The sixth award became part of the permanent collection at the Pennsylvania State Archive.

New books by AHSS faculty

Dr. Ronald Frankum (History), a nationally recognized expert on Vietnam War, completed work on his 7th book titled "Durbrow's Vietnam War" and 8th book titled "The Vietnam War." Both books will be published in 2019.

Dr. Nivedita Bagchi (Government & Poltical Affairs) published a well-received book titled "Human Nature and Politics in Utopian and Anti-Utopian Fiction" with Rowman & Littlefield.

Two more books by our faculty are under contract — **Dr. Lowery Woodall's** (Communication & Theatre) book in media studies will analyze representations of diversity in professional wrestling programming and **Dr. Tanya Kevorkian's** (History) work will use archival materials to uncover the centrality of music in the urban life in Germany during the Baroque period.

AHSS Fellow named

Thanks to a gift from a donor, the College established a fellowship supporting a student engaged in a high-impact learning experience during summer. The selection committee received 12 applications and selected dual English and Anthropology major Jordan Traut for the inaugural fellowship.

As an AHSS Fellow, this summer Jordan will work toward completing her honors thesis on the development and influence of the universal flood archetype from ancient Mesopotamian

literature. Research, partially supported by the fellowship, gives her academic freedom that can't be compared to any classroom experience, and she can focus her work on literature she rarely has the opportunity to study in school.

PASSHE-wide student awards and prizes

Brittney Brown (Government & Political Affairs) and **Bevan Fields** (Government & Political Affairs) took 1st place and Sheriece Smith (Speech Communication) and Marwann Alston (Speech Communication) took 2nd place at the PASSHE Frederick Douglas Debate Competition.

Rendell Weaver (Business Administration) received 2nd place in the PASSHE Business Plan Competition with his concept called Clarae's Drive-Thru, a social enterprise coffee shop. Another student, Kyle Narber (Art & Design), placed as one of 15 semi-finalists with his concept called Knarbart Creative Services, a full-service creative agency.

Drew Martin (Philosophy) received an award for the Best Undergraduate Essay in Philosophy at the 32nd Annual PASSHE Interdisciplinary Association for Philosophy and Religious Studies Conference at Kutztown University.

\$155,000 grant from the Red Cross

Dr. Kirsten Bookmiller, Professor of Government, received a \$155,000 grant from the American Red Cross' International Services division to support her work as a Project Lead with the North American Humanitarian Response Initiative (NAHRI).

In this capacity, Dr. Bookmiller evaluated Canada, Mexico, and the United States' legal preparedness for incoming post-disaster assistance, organized a February 2019 experts meeting at Millersville with the Red Cross, government and World Health Organization representatives, chaired a high-level working group and represented the Initiative at global meetings, including at the United Nations.

NAHRI's presence at Millersville has provided invaluable opportunities for students, as an interdisciplinary research team of five students produced a first of its kind North American mutual aid literature survey in English and Spanish that was internationally distributed within the humanitarian sector.

Fine Art Metals student selected for prestigious exhibition

Art & Design major **Amy Edwards**' fine art metals work was accepted into the prestigious Mesa Contemporary Arts Museum's 40th Annual Contemporary Crafts exhibition, in Mesa, Arizona. This exhibition highlights the finest in contemporary crafts from across the country and has become a benchmark for innovation and quality. Only 53 pieces were chosen for the exhibit by artists representing 13 states.

Additional faculty recognition

Dr. Christy Banks (Music) was invited as the headlining guest artist for the Louisiana Clarinet Day in Lafayette, LA.

Dr. Robert Bookmiller (Government & Political Affairs) received a 2019 Congressional Research Grant from the Everett Dirksen Congressional Center, the second time a PASSHE faculty member has received such a grant.

Dr. Justin Garcia (Sociology & Anthropology) was selected as to be a Fellow at the Japan Studies Institute in the San Diego State University.

Dr. Gregory Seigworth (Communication & Theatre) was invited to serve as visiting lecturer at Aarhus University in Denmark in summer 2019.

Eckert Art Gallery originates intriguing exhibit of local alumnus' work

When **Ralph Henry Eck**, **Jr. '57**, an unknown, self-taught artist, passed away at the age of 84, he left his private life's work behind, mostly unsigned, with no directive for it to be preserved, shown or shared.

Discovered accidentally by curators Sarah Noble and **Heidi Leitzke**, Eck's eccentric life and work were presented in an exhibition this spring titled "Joy of a Bird: The Art of a Solitary Life" with the cooperation of his surving relatives. The collection of paintings, drawings, writings, cardboard objects, and sculptures tell the story of a man who created his work in secret, for his own enjoyment, in the basement of his childhood home.

The collection recently drew the attention of the Kohler Foundation, thanks to the exhibition and accompanying catalog and essay. The Foundation is in talks with the Eck family to acquire the entire collection, and intends to preserve the artwork and share it with generations to come.



Language & Culture Studies holds in-service workshop for secondary school teachers

Faculty and students in the Department of Language and Culture Studies held their annual in-service conference for teachers from the region with 67 educators in attendance. The conference, themed "Keys to Communication," was presented in conjunction with the Association of World Language Educators.

History takes note of professional development needs of area teachers

As they work to revise their curriculum, faculty in the Department of **History** hosted a forum with Hempfield School District History and Social Studies teachers to learn about their post-graduation professional development needs.

Government and International Studies bring highschoolers to UN simulation

Government & Political Affairs and **International Studies** collaborated with Penn Manor and Lampeter-Strasburg High Schools to host a one-day model UN Security Council simulation for 24 students. Planning is underway for expanded involvement with the simulation program to include additional high schools.

Music students collaborate with Music For Everyone


Tell School of Music students collaborated with Music For Everyone, a non-profit Lancaster-based organization, to advocate for and support school music programs. Music Education and Music Industry students assisted public school K-12 music teachers with ensemble and studio instruction and provided the technical assistance to record school performances.

AHSS faculty undertake sustainability projects

Students in **Dr. Justin Mando's** (English) classes worked on a project called "Susquehanna Storytelling" with the Susquehanna RiverStewards. The series of blog posts and videos aims to educate people about the Susquehanna River's importance to the local economy, environment and culture. Dr. Mando also organized several river cleanups with the Lancaster Conservancy, and received a Sustainability Champion award for his work.

Dr. Stacey Irwin (Communication & Theatre) began working with a group of students to transition the focus of *Project Green Lancaster* from long-form written content to mobile videos and social interaction in order to highlight how Lancaster County is advancing global goals for sustainable development. Irwin received a grant from Millersville University's Positive Energy Fund for this project.

Prof. Heidi Leitzke (Art & Design) is collaborating with the City of Lancaster to offer a public lecture by internationally renowned environmental artist Stacy Levy. Levy will be sharing insights into her process for integrating art into sustainable stormwater management. Leitzke also received a grant from Millersville University's Positive Energy Fund to support this project.



Improved theatre experience in Dutcher Hall

After considerable planning, Dutcher Hall's **Rafters Theatre**, underwent a significant facilities project to replace a major part of the theatre. The overhead rigging structure, where lighting and scenery hang for productions, was in need of immediate replacement. However, having a black-box theatre in the oldest building on campus posed many complexities in developing a solution that preserved the unique space and historical building.

A new custom overhead structure was designed and installed to modernize Rafters Theatre. In addition, the electrical system and lighting systems were updated to new state-of-the-art LED lighting, which not only contributes to sustainability goals but allows for greater student engagement with the design process and the technologies themselves.

The project was completed in time for students in the fall semester's Lighting & Sound course to use the updated facility and resources for instruction and practical projects. University Theatre's sold-out spring production of *Almost, Maine* made heavy use of this new equipment, allowing students to experiment with lighting techniques they could never undertake before—much to the delight of the campus and community audience.
