

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


General Conference Instructions

Welcome to our 12th Annual Global Well-Being and Social Change Conference! We are pleased to offer a hybrid conference, welcoming in-person and virtual attendees. See instructions below on how to access all conference sessions.

Tips to make the most of a virtual conference

- **Plan it out:** Look through the program and decide which sessions you would like to view. Next, create a tentative schedule to watch the live sessions/videos and keep yourself on track.
- Pick the right spot: It is helpful to find a set-up that allows you to be engaged and attentive while watching participating in the session.
 For example, if you typically like to take notes, try to find a tables or place where you can comfortably write.
- Document feedback as you go: Make sure you are keeping a
 record of which sessions you've completed. This will help you
 quickly finish the form for CE (continuing education) certificates. Be
 sure to also record comments for the sessions while it is fresh in
 your mind so you can provide feedback at the end. Use the
 "Session Feedback" document as resource.
- Engage deeper by adding comments: Even in a virtual format, there are many opportunities to engage in the session. Utilize the chat feature and speak up when prompted by the presenter

From Baltimore and South

- 1. Take I-83 North to Route 30 East.
- 2. Exit onto Route 741 East and continue for about four miles.
- 3. Turn right onto Route 999 at the traffic light.

From Harrisburg and West

- 1. Take Route 283 East.
- 2. Exit onto Route 741 East and continue for about four miles.
- 3. Turn right onto Route 999 at the traffic light.

From the PA Turnpike

Traveling East:

- 1. Take Exit 19/247 (Harrisburg East) onto Route 283 East.
- 2. Exit onto Route 741 East, continue for about four miles.
- 3. Turn right onto Route 999 at the traffic light.

Traveling West:

- 1. Take Exit 21/286 (Reading/Lancaster) and follow Route 222 South to Route 30 West.
- 2. Exit onto Route 741 East, continue for about four miles.
- 3. Turn right onto Route 999 at the traffic light.

From Route 222 (Traveling South)


- 1. Take the exit for Route 30 West.
- 2. Exit onto Route 741 East and continue for about four miles.
- 3. Turn right onto Route 999 at the traffic light.


From Downtown Lancaster City

- 1. Take Orange Street west
- 2. Turn left on Charlotte Street
- 3. Bear right onto Manor Street (Route 999).
- 4. Continue on Route 999, past Route 741 (Millersville Rd.)

Finding Office 116 in Stayer Hall

- Enter the lobby and head left toward the elevator, but do not get on.
- 2. Follow the small hallway through a doorway.
- 3. The first office on the left is Room 116—you'll find me inside!





Final Steps (From Route 999)

- 1. After the second traffic light on Route 999, bear left onto N. George Street at the fork.
- 2. Follow N. George Street to a light, then turn right onto W. Cottage Ave.
- 3. Turn left onto Lyte Rd—Stayer Hall is the first large brick building on the left.



Title: Advocacy for Humankind

Andrew Slack is dedicated to harnessing the power of popular stories to inspire a more just, compassionate, and imaginative world. This passion has shaped a dynamic career spanning multiple roles.

As a narrative strategist for Avaaz, a global civic organization with over 69 million members, Slack has coordinated efforts with A-list celebrities—including Leonardo DiCaprio, Meryl Streep, Pedro Pascal, Mark Ruffalo, and Adam McKay—as well as elected officials, to advance pro-democracy, climate, and human rights campaigns worldwide.

As a content producer, his videos have amassed over 100 million views. One of these projects, Save Santa's Home, is a children's book he co-authored that takes a playful approach to empowering kids in climate activism.

Slack is also the co-founder of the Harry Potter Alliance (HPA), now known as Fandom Forward. Over a decade, he leveraged themes from Harry Potter to inspire hundreds of thousands of fans to become first-time activists, leading successful campaigns and establishing chapters in over 30 countries. His pop culture-driven campaigns—drawing connections between The Hunger Games and economic inequality, Superman and immigrant rights, and Star Wars and money in politics—earned him fellowships at Ashoka, the Nathan Cummings Foundation, and Civic Hall.



His work has been featured in over 100 major news outlets, including The New York Times, The New Yorker, Comedy Central, and People Magazine. A sought-after speaker, he has delivered talks on the power of storytelling for social change at TEDx Youth, SXSW, the American Library Association, and prestigious institutions such as Harvard, Yale, Columbia, and MIT, among more than 100 other venues worldwide. Additionally, he has contributed writings on civic imagination to The Los Angeles Times and CNN.

As a thought leader, Slack's insights and counsel have influenced the ways academics, nonprofits, and major foundations engage with fandom and pop culture. His pioneering work would not have been possible without the collaboration of brilliant colleagues along the way, and he looks forward to continuing to connect with new partners to craft better stories for a better world.

Title: Leading with Responsibility and Compassion: Lessons from the Herd

Heather Girvin, Associate Professor at Millersville University, teaches across the BSW, MSW, and DSW programs. She earned her Bachelor of Science in Sociology from Dickinson College and both her Master's and Doctorate in Social Work from Bryn Mawr Graduate School of Social Work & Social Research. With a background in child protective services, foster care, and outpatient therapy, Dr. Girvin's work focuses on supporting children and families. She has experience in residential programs, public child welfare agencies, and in-home services.

At Millersville, Dr. Girvin played a key role in launching and accrediting the MSW program and remains actively involved in its development. She teaches courses on diversity, cultural competence, child welfare, family violence, and social theory, emphasizing active learning and critical thinking to prepare students for professional practice.

Her research explores trauma, social justice, and systemic change, with a particular focus on children and families. She has evaluated child maltreatment prevention programs, developed trauma-informed interventions, and collaborated on global service-learning projects in South Africa, Haiti, Costa Rica, and Nicaragua. She is especially interested in the role of expressive arts in healing trauma and promoting social change.

Dr. Girvin's work extends beyond the classroom through numerous publications and presentations on child welfare, social work education, and cross-system collaboration. She remains dedicated to strengthening social work practice through research, innovation, and advocacy.

Findings revealed challenges in finding food, with communal eating, and regarding the risks associated with meeting daily food needs.






