Message from the Chair: Dr. Kelly Kuhns



Greetings from the Wehrheim School of Nursing (WSON)! With each newsletter, I'm challenged to find new ways to say – WOW, the WSON continues to grow and shine! This fall is no different! In the last edition of the newsletter, I was able to share that our February National League for Nursing Commission for Nursing Education Accreditation (NLN CNEA) visit went very well. Now I am able to proudly share that we have been fully approved and accredited by the CNEA through February 2029! Six years is the maximum accreditation period for new applicants to CNEA, so we are thrilled to have received this distinction.

Also in the Spring 2023 newsletter, I shared that for the past 9 newsletters, I was able to announce at least one new program/track each year – well, we can make that 10 years! This year, we are happy to announce that our MSN Nursing Informatics track has been fully approved. This 37-credit program provides students with the skills needed to interpret, analyze, and use electronic health record technology to promote quality and patient safety. The program has been developed based on Nursing Informatics: Scope and Standards of Practice (ANA, 2022) and graduates will be well-prepared for the informatics certification. The fully online Nursing Informatics program is available as an MSN track or can be taken as a post-MSN certification. Dr. Kelly Rotondo (Kelly.Rotondo@millersville.edu) is the program coordinator.

As I begin my fourth term (10th year) as chair and my 24th year at Millersville, I continue to reflect on all that we have accomplished since I started at Millersville in 2000. While there have been many changes to the curriculum, the faculty, the programs, and the University, one thing that has remained constant is our focus on student success. Our faculty are truly invested in the success of our programs, but more importantly, in the success of our students. One way we continue to grow in this area is through our commitment to continue to increase the number of students we support in attending and presenting at professional conferences, as well as through publishing. Among our DNP students who completed their degrees in Spring 2022, nearly all of them have published their scholarly project or had the opportunity to present it at a national conference. We are so proud of the work being done by our students and we want to continue to show others the amazing things you are doing.

STOP THE BLEED®

Minutes count! Over the last several months Dr. Kelly L. Rotondo and Professor Justin McFail have been teaching STOP THE BLEED® to the faculty and students at Millersville University. STOP THE BLEED® is a nationally recognized certification program to teach bystanders how to quickly respond in the event of a catastrophic situation. The program teaches medical and non-medical people how to quickly pack a wound, hold pressure, and apply a tourniquet to a bleeding victim. Students were given a chance in the classes to learn how to use these skills on a mannequin and were given the opportunity to apply a tourniquet. Students typically started out a bit uneasy, but quickly became enthusiastic about the new skill they had learned, that one day may save a life. Millersville University along with the Wehrheim School of Nursing hope to have the STOP THE BLEED® kits next to every AED in the future! Summer Science Programs at the College of Science and Technology at MU

6/29/23: Dr. Kelly Rotondo hosted Stroke- It's All about BE(ing) FAST at the Summer Science Training Program Workshop for 15 middle school students. They learned the signs and symptoms of stroke (BE FAST), reviewed anatomy with a cadaver brain, created a metal thrombectomy device and "retrieved" a clot from a simulated artery.

7/11/23: Professor McFail and Dr. Minter hosted Basic First Aid for the Outdoor Enthusiast and Basic First Aid for Trauma with STOP THE BLEED®. This was attended by 24 middle and high school students and four MU camp counselors. Throughout the full day clinic, students heard lectures about common outdoor emergencies and basic first aid including splinting, wound care, and scene safety. All were successful in obtaining their STOP THE BLEED® certification.

The Launch of Wehrheim School of Nursing's Telehealth Certificate Program

It is with great pleasure we congratulate the first cohort of the Wehrheim School of Nursing's Telehealth Certificate Program. The Millersville University students that completed the academic requirements for this additional credential were, Gino Martin, Jordan Miesner, Danielle Miller, Susan Sams, Alexandra Seiger, and Makenzie Strohecker. The telehealth certificate program is 3 courses, totaling 10 credits. Telehealth has expanded into being referred to as digital, virtual, electronic, and mobile healthcare. The courses are NURS 370 *Telehealth Foundations*, NURS 460 *Telehealth Policy, Advocacy, and Clinical Application*, and NURS 461 *Advanced Telehealth*. This certificate is open to any student and is a great addition for majors, such as nurses, allied health, psychology, social work, and business. ANA Hill Day

DNP students, **Jessica Borthwick** and **Sarah Keller** (pictured to the right) had the privilege of attending the American Nurses Association Hill Day in Washington, DC on Thursday, June 15, 2023. The day started with a conversation with Congresswoman Jen Kiggans, serving Virginia's Second Congressional District in the House of Representatives who is also a Geriatric Nurse Practitioner. Throughout the day, they met with staff from Senators Fetterman and Casey's offices, as well as numerous PA representatives. They were able to share statistics and personal stories about nurses' experiences with workplace violence and burnout, the current work environment in healthcare, and the importance of valuing nurses and APRNs as the indispensable members of the healthcare team that they are.



They advocated for the following specific bills:

- **Improving Care and Access to Nurses (ICAN) Act**, striving to remove federal barriers to full practice authority for Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (including physician authorization for DME and home health care for Medicare/Medicaid patients)
- **Workplace Violence Prevention for Health Care and Social Service Workers Act**, which would require the Department of Labor to issue occupational safety and health standards to protect healthcare workers from workplace violence
- **National Nursing Workforce Center Act**, providing federal legislation for Nursing workforce centers and establishment of centers in the 11 states that do not have one. Pennsylvania has the PA Action Coalition which has current initiatives in diversifying the workplace, expanding nursing education, and fostering interprofessional collaboration.

Dr. Lambert's passion for educating school nurses and supporting them in their role is evident through the receipt of this prestigious award.



GRAMBAU WINS NIGHTINGALE SCHOLARSHIP

Stephanie Grambau, BSN, RN, was chosen as the recipient of the Pennsylvania Nightingale Awards of Pennsylvania MSN Scholarship for 2023. Chosen from a large pool of applicants, Stephanie's significant qualities in leadership, professionalism, academic achievement, community service, and personal commitment to the profession of nursing put her above others as a worthy recipient.

In describing her career trajectory, Stephanie identified herself as a "jack of all trades, master of none" in that she worked in many different settings due to moving frequently while her husband served in the military. While she initially considered this a hindrance to her professional career, she learned that it has its benefits. Stephanie currently works as a Team Lead of Mobile Vaccine Clinics across a nine-county region in Southcentral Pennsylvania Medical Reserve Corp. She came into this position after working in various settings during the COVID pandemic. Her clinical unit was closed temporarily to move staff resources toward priority areas added due to the pandemic. Stephanie worked in COVID testing tents, provider offices, urgent care settings, and vaccination clinics for over two years.

After reflecting on these experiences and her prior career involvement across many different settings, Stephanie realized that she had a lot of beneficial skills! In her various roles, she was drawn to reviewing all aspects of patients' health rather than just the specific focus of the specific clinical area. Over time, she recognized that she could impact even more people as a Nurse Practitioner. This led Stephanie to Millersville University's Wehrheim School of Nursing where she started the Family Nurse Practitioner in Fall 2022. She anticipates graduating with her Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) in 2025.

Along with other scholarship and award winners, Stephanie will be honored at the Nightingale Awards of Pennsylvania Gala on Friday, October 27, 2023.

The Nightingale Awards of Pennsylvania started in 1989 when nurse leader Jane Felgen and other visionary leaders organized to recognize exemplary nurses in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by granting scholarships and awards. Over the past 33 years, over \$450,000 have been awarded in scholarships.



Faculty Retreat

The faculty of the Wehrheim School of Nursing rarely finds collective time to get together outside of Tuesday Faculty meetings during Fall and Spring terms. This past year, the WSON was challenged with placing all our MSN tracks (Nursing Education, School Nursing, Nursing Informatics, Nursing Leadership, and Family Nurse Practitioner) into fully online format proposals. This required complete revamping of our MSN courses,



including the sequencing, format, and content of each. Finally, with our newly acquired CNEA accreditation, the faculty needed to map our courses by program outcomes and course outcomes to satisfy accreditation requirements.

The faculty rented a beautiful colonial farm house known as the Stauffer House in Campbelltown for the weekend of June 2-4, 2023. Although the faculty could have fully enjoyed no alarm clocks, sleeping in, being lazy, and distractions from our colleagues, all of the participants engaged in three days of

course work and program overhaul! The faculty enjoyed brain-breaks that included yoga, charades, trivia, and lots of fine catering courtesy of the multi-talented Professor McFail. The restful, yet productive weekend was enjoyed by all. We were successful in mapping all our FNP courses and generating 6 new course outlines, outcomes, and syllabi. During this time, important course proposals, Board of Nursing requests, and other administrative tasks were also accomplished. Further, the nursing courses 501, 502, 511, 512, 513, 504, and 506 were updated and reviewed. The faculty and the retreat was a effective, but also a great team building experience. The 17th Annual Wellspan Health Collaborative EBP and Nursing Research Conference was held in Harrisburg on April 18, 2023. The focus of the conference was "EBP and Nursing Research: Finding a Better Way."

There were 333 registrants from across PA representing 12 different healthcare organizations and

educational institutions. This was the largest conference attendance to date. The keynote speaker, Dr. Lynn Gallagher-Ford, chief operating officer and clinical core director of the Fuld Institute for EBP spoke about "Evidence-based Practice; Moving the conversation to ACTION!". She also presented "A New and Essential Tool in your EBP Toolkit: The Jigsaw Journal Club for EBP" and "The Keys to Advancing Evidence-based Care; A Solid Plan, Engaged Leadership, and Intentional Infrastructure".

Wehrheim Wellness

Breast-A-Ville is an annual event held at Millersville University that has been created through the Breast Health Initiative to educate students on the importance of breast health and promote breast cancer awareness. The Breast Health Initiative is a program that was founded by retired professor Dr. Dennis Denenberg and retired professor Dr. Richard Frerichs. They began the event in honor of Dr. Deneberg's late sister and MU alumna Diana Denenberg Durand and Dr. Frerichs late wife Marsha Frerichs. Both women were diagnosed with breast cancer and battled for many years. Programs included in the Breast Health Initiative include Breast-A-Ville, the Diana and Marsha Breast Cancer Awareness Center, the Diana Denenberg Durand Spirit Garden and Diana's Dreamers.

On October 4, 2023, Millersville University held the 12th annual Breast-A-Ville-event on the promenade outside of the Student Memorial Center. Since the inaugural year in 2011, Breast-A-Ville has engaged students and the Millersville community in informative and fun activities to increase awareness about breast health and breast cancer for both men and women. Local health agencies and experts came from the surrounding area to serve as exhibitors at the event. The Wehrheim School of Nursing hosted a table where Dr. Michele Chronister (WSON faculty member) and Rachel Mowry (DNP student and WSON Graduate Assistant) provided education to attendees regarding self breast exams. The table also featured educational handouts and giveaways!
