DR. SARAH **BROOKS AND BEYOND THE ED** PROGRAM

Dr. Sarah Brooks is an associate professor in the Educational Foundations department at Millersville University

of Pennsylvania. At the doctoral level, she teaches several educational research methodology courses, administers doctoral candidacy exams and supports the dissertation work of doctoral students. Dr. Brooks has chaired dissertations on topics ranging from teacher professional development experiences (Elementary Teachers' Experiences with Professional **Development in Inquiry-Based Science**

Education) to instructional approaches (Planning and Delivering Instruction in a High School Self-Paced Learning Environment) to student experiences (Girls' Lived Experiences in Nontraditional Programs in a Career and Technical High School).

Beyond the Ed.D. program, Dr. Brooks coordinates the Secondary and K-12 Professional Development School, a partnership between Millersville University and local school districts. Her focus is the preparation of secondary social studies teachers through coursework and supervised field experiences, and her research focuses broadly on the pedagogical practices that imbue social studies with meaning for elementary, middle level and secondary students. More recent work of Dr. Brooks has examined teaching about religion in the context of social studies, and in addition to several book chapters, her scholarship has been published in Theory and Research in Social Education, Social Studies Research in Practice, The History Teacher, Journal of Social Studies Research, Social Studies Journal, and High School Journal. Dr. Brooks also describes her research on the teaching of historical empathy, discusses its importance in teaching social studies and explains how it can be achievable in elementary and middle school classrooms.

Prior to starting at Millersville University, Dr. Brooks served as an assistant professor at Elmhurst College, Elmhurst, Ill. and as both an instructor and a university supervisor for the Curry School of Education at the University of Virginia, Charlottesville, Va. Dr. Brooks has previously served on the Executive Board of the College and University Faculty Assembly of the National Council for the Social Studies. Dr. Brooks taught seventh and eigth-grade social studies for five years in New Hampshire, Connecticut and Virginia. She holds a B.A. in history and secondary education from Gordon College, an M.A. in social studies education from the University of Connecticut and a Ph.D. in curriculum and instruction from the University of Virginia.





PAST EVENTS

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS

Between the dates of August 20 and October 4, the Office of International Programs and Services (IPS) collectively traveled to 11 nations and 21 cities to participate in 57 high school visits, 14 college fairs and 4 conferences/networking events with key stakeholders. Dr. Charity Alinda traveled to Nigeria and Ghana. Ms. Yang Zhang represented Millersville in Serbia and Colombia. Ms. Anna Bradford traveled to India, Nepal, Thailand, Vietnam, Malaysia, Indonesia and the Philippines. IPS was also in Costa Rica the second week of November for a series of fair and networking events with Education USA. While a majority of this trip was focused on the undergraduate market, five events had a strong graduate admissions purpose. In total, approximately 9,000 individuals participated in these events, with about 16% desiring to attend a graduate program and 30% seeking to start their university career in fall 2023. IPS expects to truly know the full impact of our efforts within the next three years. Our team looks forward to continuing the work in developing connections and relationships within these nations.
